ADAC Automotive was established in a Grand Rapids, MI garage in 1975. Forty years later, ADAC is a global company with assets of \$1.8 billion and 7,000 employees residing in 17 countries around the world. How did this small business become a global competitor? Maybe it was the perfect mixture of hard work, dedication and strategic partnerships that created the second largest industrial employer in Muskegon County.

As ADAC grew, the company defined its values, focusing on people, products, profit and community. These values, the driving



force behind the company, shape ADAC's engagement within the communities they reside in and serve. A top priority is offering safe working facilities as well as safe environmental policies earning ADAC the title of Clean Corporate Citizens in all six Michigan facilities and the title of Best in Class Employer.

ADAC employs over one hundred engineers who are responsible for the design and implementation of the various products. "Our products aren't sexy, but they are necessary," Terry Leberfinger offered. Their customer list reads like a who's who of automotive makers and, if you own a car, you probably use one of their products each day. Key product categories include outside and inside door handles, painted trim, rear access systems and exterior mirrors.

Understandably, ADAC is proud of its

products, workers and the automotive industry. They currently employ about 1,350 individuals in Muskegon and focus on building a trained, highly-skilled workforce to meet the needs of the community and customers alike.

ADAC engages the community through philanthropic support of many agencies that serve their employees in various capacities. They are leading a new workforce training initiative called Talent 2025. Talent 2025 focuses on providing alternative opportunities to students who may not want to go to college, but are interested in skilled jobs offering competitive wages and growth opportunities.
