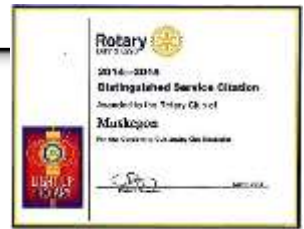

Last Week's Program

EWP at 40 Years Old

After 40 years in existence, Every Woman's Place/ Webster House Youth Services is ready to continue its legacy of helping individuals and families in distress – with a little help from its friends, that is.

Amanda Robertson, director of development, right, provided an overview of the organization's services, challenges and evolution as it enters its fifth decade of service.

Every Woman's Place and Webster House Youth

Services strengthen families in Muskegon, Newaygo and Oceana counties. Every Woman's Place provides services for victims and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. [Webster House](#) works with youth to bring families closer together.

To illustrate the organization's services, Amanda related two stories: one of a woman named "Rachel"; another, of a 15-year-old boy, "Adam."



Rachel, a single mother, had a stable, healthy life in Florida, when she met a man who proposed marriage. He had been offered a job in Muskegon, and the blended

family moved here to start a new life. Slowly, at her new husband's insistence, Rachel became more isolated. He forbade her from talking to neighbors, then from

holding a job. He became violent, and she lived in fear for her life every day.

Adam, 15, found himself homeless after his parents divorced. Initially, he coped by "couch-surfing" – sleeping overnight at friends' homes. But those options finally were exhausted. He admitted to one of his teachers that he had nowhere to go.

Amanda said that, without the services of Every

Woman's Place and Webster House, and the donors and volunteers that nourish the organization, we would never know how Rachel and Adam's stories ended.

She Found a Way

Rachel picked up an Every Woman's Place business card that she found in a restaurant. With the help of EWP staff and volunteers, she got a personal protection order against her abusive husband. With help, she was able to return with her daughter to Florida, where she is back living near her parents, and now has a bright future.

After counseling provided by Webster House, Adam was able to work through his trauma and return to his mother's home. He worked hard to graduate from high school, where he was so well respected

that his classmates asked him to speak at the ceremony. Adam is now serving his country as a U.S. Marine.

Amanda said the organization has served 130,000 people over its 40-year history. And its services depend on members of the community willing to donate money or time.

Over the decades, they've added programs including: counseling for nonresidents of the organization's shelter; a legal center to help abused spouses obtain personal protection orders; and prevention programs such as the hugely popular Girls on the Run program to help girls build self-esteem and make healthy choices.

Every Woman's Place/Webster House has raised \$1.3 million toward its \$3 million capital campaign for maintenance and upkeep of its building, which is almost always filled to capacity.

Its annual fundraiser, "Power of the Purse," is 5:30 to 9pm, Oct 8 at The Event Center at Fricano's Place, 1050 W Western. It's an evening of style and accessories featuring a silent and live auction. Tickets are available at www.everywomansplace.org.
