



Speaker: Maxine Meyer, SOVA Resource Manager

Mauricio introduced Maxine, who has spent the last 10 years working at SOVA, helping those in need. "SOVA" is a Hebrew word that means "eat and be satisfied," Maxine told us in her introduction of the organization. Since its start in 1977, it has been non-sectarian, serving *all* the disadvantaged populations within the county. Those they help range from infants to the elderly, from every ethnic and religious background. And they are working hard to meet the rapidly growing demand for services caused by our current economic climate.

Maxine showed us an 8 minute video of SOVA's history and current operations. Much more than a food pantry, SOVA provides free groceries and an array of supportive services to over 12,000 individuals of all ages, ethnicities and religions in an average month, with numbers as high as 15,000 in August and November. (The number was 5000 in 2008 before the economic downturn.) At three centers in the Los Angeles area, they offer free, nutritious food and free on-site services, including food stamp enrollment, legal advocacy, job counseling, nutrition counseling, information and referrals to a wide range of services.

Now part of Jewish Family Services (JFS), the oldest charity in Los Angeles, SOVA benefits from contributions through them from the Jewish Federation, as well as the public, churches, synagogues and grocery stores. Not long ago most groceries were trashing food still on the

shelves on their “sell by” date; now many give them to food charities. SOVA has been fortunate to get wonderful fresh food from Trader Joe’s in Toluca Lake, Gelson’s, Target and a few other stores, so that they can, in turn, provide fresh food to their many clients. From 800 – 1000 pounds a day come from Trader Joe’s alone, picked up by volunteers. When food donations don’t cover needs, SOVA will buy items such as meats, eggs and peanut butter – protein is considered an essential – using donated funds, and buying in bulk at a discount. (Why large individual donations are better in cash.)

Most of those clients are among the working poor, with most or all of the adults working but at low-income jobs, and with large, often extended, families. They would rather not have to ask for help, but too often the food runs out before the next paycheck, or they have to chose between feeding their families or providing medicine. SOVA helps fill those gaps, and in a way to maintain their clients’ dignity. There is very little red tape: on their first visit clients provide a picture ID and a birth certificate for any children. They may need to show the ID on the second visit, but not after that. Clients work with a volunteer to select their own food, which is then bagged by another volunteer. People get only what they want and will use. If they have special needs, those are honored, whether the food needs to be vegan, gluten-free, kosher or some other special type. Everyone is given fresh fruit, vegetables, pastries and eggs.

With only two paid staff, SOVA is big on volunteerism. Hundreds of people of all ages work together each week to support the program and the community, including many former clients. With our diverse population, it can be very comforting for a client to find someone with whom they can talk in their own language and explain their needs, whether Russian, Armenian, Farsi, Korean or Spanish.

As supplies permit, SOVA gives a book or two to the kids who come with their parents for food, figuring that people who don’t have money for food are not buying books, either. Literacy is a key skill for elevating people out of poverty.

One way SOVA earns money for its programs is by renting out pre-made centerpieces – lovely wood, copper or woven wicker “baskets of hope” filled with non-perishable food items, wrapped in cellophane and tied with ribbon – for organizations or individuals to use at parties. They cost less than many other decoration choices, and the cost is tax-deductible. (We used SOVA’s centerpieces at last year’s District Foundation Luncheon.) After the event, the baskets are delivered to families in need.

In thanking Maxine for her presentation, Jim noted that his Masonic Lodge had donated over 20,000 pounds of food to SOVA. He said they also spend \$20,000 each month for food, up from \$10,000 just a few years ago, and still can’t keep up with the demand.


