Michael Roux is Chairman, Asia Business Group, KPMG; RI Group; Roux International Pty Ltd and Victorian Opera. He is also Chairman of ADC Forum, senior advisor to the World Economic Forum, advisor to the President of Rwanda and Honorary Consul-General for the Republic of Rwanda. Previously, he was Vice-Chairman of Citigroup, Director of Deutsche Bank, Director of Deutsche Asset Management, Deputy Secretary of the Victorian Treasury, Director of the Office of State Owned Enterprises and Director of the Office of Trade and Investment. He has also been Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Transport Accident Commission, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Accident Compensation Commission, Chairman and Managing Director of the Road Traffic Authority, Executive Chairman of the Victorian Government Housing Authority and Director General of the Department of Employment and Training. He has been a member of the National Training Council, the National Occupational, Health and Safety Commission and the Victorian Public Service Board. Meeting Report Tues, 13th July

Sergeant's Session:

Average takings from club fines were reported to have been 50 cents per person, therefore it was proposed that members contribute \$2.50 per fine this Rotary year.

Sergeant-At-Arms Herb Greenwood asked questions about the early days of the Rotary Club of Central-Melbourne Sunrise so that the people seated each side of the person providing the correct answer would be fined, hence doubling the funds raised.

Club Forum:

Alan Freedman - Assistant District Governor praised the Rotary Club of Central-Melbourne Sunrise as being a flagship club. He advised that this year's Group Study Exchange will be from Texas as the District was endeavoring to link every Club with a club in Texas. It was announced that the 79th District 9800 Conference will be held in Adelaide from 31st March to 2nd April 2011 amongst the 'Billion Star Splendour' of the city of Adelaide and surrounds. Alan also mentioned that due to privacy policies the 'Networker' would not be sent to all members, however members can send an email via the Website to be included on the email distribution list.

Anne King - Club President highlighted that Rotary is the world's largest service club and presented a YouTube Video entitled 'What is Rotary'. A copy of this video may be viewed on our club's website. RI President Ray Klinginsmith has oversight of plans and objectives, costs, fundraising and where we are heading.

Tom Callander - Vocational Committee (on behalf of Director Justine Murphy) emphasised the committees desire to re-energize Vocational Services and to celebrate vocation through mentoring, recognition and service programs including: Victoria Police Leadership program, SIFE - Students in Free Enterprise, organising a range of speakers during the month of October (Vocational Month), identifying inspirational vocational speakers, investigating the concept of a Skills Bank, Member Behind The Badge talks, mini debates and coordinating visits to two nominated workplaces of interest. Budget \$1,000

Tony Thomas - Director, Community Service Committee spoke on proposed activities for his committee in the coming Rotary year including: a working bee for the Regina Coeli Homeless Women's Centre, COZ, involving schools in the Christmas hamper drive, Friendship Exchange (two hosts required for October UK visit to Melbourne), Homeground Tower, Women with Mental illness and the establishment of a new Probus Club in Melbourne CBD. Budget \$5,000

Michael Lapiña - Director, New Generations Committee advised that his committee would provide an update on proposed ideas in September (New Generations Month), but were looking at ways to work with sister clubs (Echuca-Moama) and involving them with District program such as the UHS Maths prize, Youth at Risk, Youth Leadership Award, National Youth Science Forum, Siemens Summer Science School, the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment and Model United Nations. Budget \$9,650

Alan Driver - Director, International Committee discussed maintaining continuity of Club Projects. Specific attention was drawn to the Osaka - Hommachi 20th Birthday celebrations in April 2011, the Echuca - Moama Steam Rally, building relationships with the Rotary Club

of Paraque Southwest Manila, Philippines, assistance provided to International House, involvement in the RAMS Adopt a village in PNG program, and sponsoring one box per year for Disaster Aid Australia at a cost of \$1,200. Other programs discussed included Micro loans, Indigenous therapy and Solar power for the Philippines, Donations in Kind activities in March and September, guest speaker Trish Franklin (July 27 2010), Water Filter Tech. Project Laos, Rotary Friendship exchange, Peace Tour. It was noted that succession planning was particularly critical for this committee. Budget \$9,000

Herb Greenwood - Chair, Marketing/Fundraising Committee informed members that the fundraising committee meets 2nd Wednesday of every month. He stressed that fundraising should be a focus of Rotary Club members in order to support the club's projects and programs. Some proposed fundraising activities for the coming year included a rubber duck race and EBay sales. The committee was keen to attract younger people to club through some of their fundraising activities.

Foundation Committee pilot program details to be advised.

The **Club Administration Committee chaired by Bruce McBain** incorporates the Web Committee, coordinating guest speakers and fellowship function, as well as the management and monitoring of club membership activities. It was announced that the 2010/11 Rotary Year the Sergeant-At-Arms role will be filled by a different person each month and that a club survey would be conducted to establish where we want to go as a Club in the future.

Our Community Services Committee has organised a working bee from 8am on Saturday, July 24th to clean up the garden at the Regina Coeli Homeless Women's Centre in North Melbourne (across the road from the Children's Hospital) and could use a couple of extra volunteers. Job duration: about 3 hours. The jobs include re-erecting a 3m section of fence; levelling and paving an area for an outdoor table and chairs; sundry mulching and weeding and a bit of pruning. The facility is a small residence complex which caters for approximately 24 women facing mental health, addiction or abuse issues.
