"The Cities We Need"

Jane-Frances is a policy strategist and has led cabinet-level strategy work for the UK, Queensland, Victorian and Australian governments.

She also worked for the Vice-Chancellor at the University of Melbourne, the Chief Commissioner of Victoria Police, Noel Pearson at the Cape York Institute and the Boston Consulting Group.

The title of Jane-Frances's talk will be 'The Cities We Need'. She will pose 10 questions to be addressed, including what mix of housing types do we need? What geographic size and shape do we want our cities to be? How important is how our cities look? How do we ensure equitable access to employment and education?

Jane-Frances says, "Meeting the needs of real people could result in cities that look quite different from those we have now. How bold are we prepared to be to get the cities we really need?"

I can report though that he did tell a joke that everyone found amusing and I did cross fine him for dismissing me from a conversation about football!

Announcements:

Allan Driver reminded everyone about the DIK Working Bee on September 19th. It is a worthwhile day combining service with fellowship. Details are on the web-site.

Kay Stevens spoke on a variety of Subjects:

- Guess who's coming to dinner is one of the club's best and most popular social activities. This year it is being held on the 2nd of October. It is a perfect opportunity for everyone in the club to get to know each other a little better. Jen Warner is organising the event this year with assistance from Kay and Kathy. She is looking for more volunteers to host on the evening.
- Volunteers are required for the visit to Scienceworks on 23rd September. This visit has been organised for a group of women at Hotham Mission to enable them to socialise with women in our culture to promote cultural understanding. 10 female volunteers are required. Kay emphasised that females are required as volunteers only because we need to respect the culture of the asylum seekers.
- The Melbourne Marathon is on the 10th October and we are keen to get as many members of the club to participate in either the run or walk and it will be followed by a social BBQ afterwards.

President's Announcements:

- A correction to the announcement in last week's bulletin: David DeKretzner, Governor of Victoria, will be our speaker at this year's Paul Harris breakfast on 17th November (not next year in March).
- A district vocational day planned on 3rd October at Lancefield. President Anne King and director of vocational services, Justine Murphy, will be attending and anyone else in the club that would like to join them is most welcome. The price is \$60 and includes a meal and drinks as well as an opportunity to find out more about this "forgotten" avenue of service.
- The Rotary Club of Esentepe in Istanbul Turkey is promoting a Time Travellers Camp to be held in January and June next year. It is a 7 day extravaganza of food, palaces and history. They have also offered to host a week in April if the group of people participating in the RAPT visit to Gallipoli is interested.

Guest Speaker - Pat Boyle:

Pat is a mentoree in the police mentoring program this year with Kevin Love as his Rotary mentor. His talk was designed to provide us with some insights into his background in the Police Force. He has been in the force for 34 years with 25 years as a detective in various crime squads. During this time he has moved around many times through various restructures, but has specialist investigative experience in the area of kidnapping, extortion, aggravated burglary and in particular Asian Crime and Youth Gangs. He has experienced a diversity of cultures during his movements within the force and spoke highly of these communities- he emphasised that there are "bad and good eggs" in all cultures.

Pat was one of the first in the force to recognise that there was something

happening on the streets of Melbourne that seemed to point to the presence of gang activity. It took a few violent incidents to provide the evidence to convince others of its existence. This led him to an interest in criminal youth gangs and in 2005 he was awarded a Winston Churchill Fellowship to undertake a research project on the topic. His studies were undertaken in the USA, UK, Hong Kong and Canada, working with the relevant police forces and other non government agencies. He has been recognised as an authority on this issue and has spoken at various forums conducted nationally and in New Zealand on the subject of "Identifying Gang Presence". His paper which is available on the Churchill website has been read by numerous Law Enforcement Agencies, locally and overseas, and he has been complimented as to its accuracy.

Pat is currently undertaking a Masters of Research on the subject of identifying youth gang characteristics. It is a topic that has not previously been researched in Australia. He has also been heavily involved in the Victoria Police Blue Ribbon Foundation. For this and his extensive service to the investigation of crime he was recognized in the 2003 Queens Birthday Honours Listed by receiving the Australian Police Medal. He acknowledged that he leads a very busy life and is luckily supported by his partner, who is also in the police force and therefore understanding of the pressures of the job.

Disaster Aid Australia - Pakistan Update

You gave and we delivered!

"On 14 August, the need was to assist 6 million survivors who had been displaced by the catastrophic floods in Pakistan – today, the UN reported the need to assist 21 million survivors with shelter and clean water. Imagine every Australian needing a home and clean water just to survive!

Based in Islamabad, Disaster Aid Response Team (DART) team leader Larry Agee (USA) reports that the region of Khyber-Pakhtunkhawa is flattened and the devastation is the worst he has seen in five years as a humanitarian aid specialist.

"Our first tents were assembled in Chocki Town where everything was flattened except the school but the 275 students now have no school equipment" said Australian DART Peter Clouting who is on his third deployment. "The headmaster sought refuge from the floods on top of a mosque where he stayed for four days until a helicopter rescued him" he said.

"We have four DARTs on the ground in Islamabad and a further four more Australian DARTs assisting over the coming weeks with their objective to supply as much shelter and clean water to survivors as we can" **Jenni Heenan, General Manager of Disaster Aid Australia** said.

"Our fellow Australian Rotarians and their friends have worked together by fundraising and personal generous donations so that we could deliver what is needed – it is gratifying and humbling to know that together we are making a difference for these survivors" she said."
