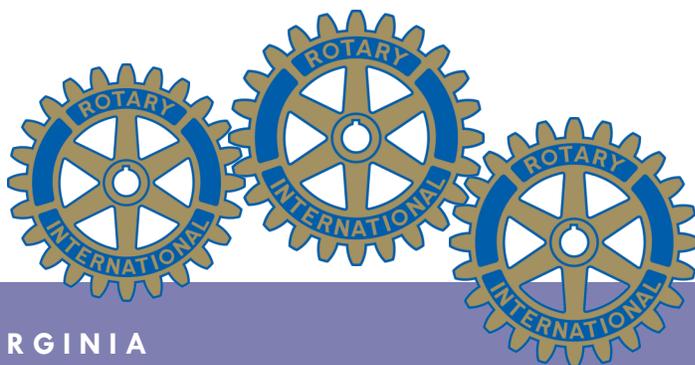

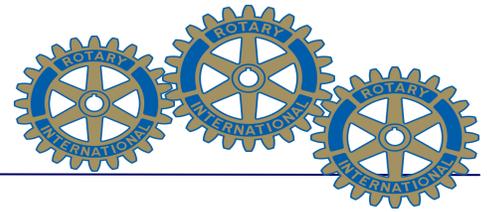

## Plans for Interact Club Underway

In April, Rotary International adopted “New Generations” as its fifth avenue of service. New Generations isn't just important to the future of Rotary but also our communities and the world. New Generations Service acknowledges the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. Programs include RYLA, Rotaract, Interact, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

The Rotary Club of Ashburn is taking steps to help promote this new addition to the avenues of service by creating an Interact Club with Broad Run High School. Although still in its infancy, the Club hopes to have the Interact up and operational this school year. A gift of \$500.00 from Capital One Bank was presented to the Club on Thursday, September 9, by Rotarian Sam Wiley, to help with the start of the Interact Club.

Interact is Rotary International's service club for young people ages 12 to 18. Interact clubs are sponsored by individual Rotary clubs, which provide support and guidance, but they are self-governing and self-supporting.

Club membership varies greatly. Clubs can be single gender or mixed, large or small. They can draw from the student body of a single school or from two or more schools in the same community.

Each year, Interact clubs complete at least two community service projects, one of which furthers international understanding and goodwill. Through these efforts, Interactors develop a network of friendships with local and overseas clubs and learn the importance of

- Developing leadership skills and personal integrity
- Demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others
- Understanding the value of individual responsibility and hard work
- Advancing international understanding and goodwill

As one of the most significant and fastest-growing programs of Rotary service, with more than 10,700 clubs in 109 countries and geographical areas, Interact has become a worldwide phenomenon. Almost 200,000 young people are involved in Interact.
