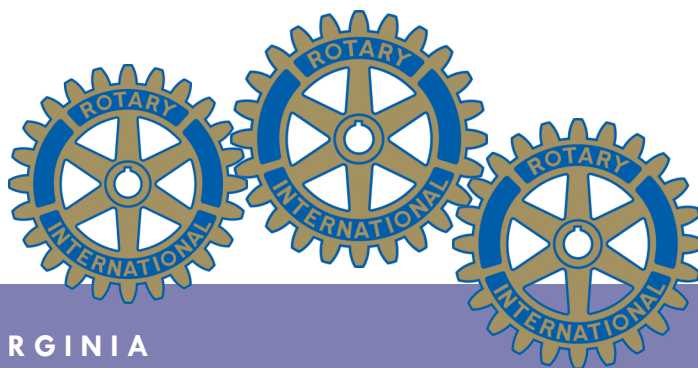

## Jennifer Kitrel, Loudoun Free Clinic Executive Director to Speak

Jennifer Kitrel has served as the Executive Director of the Loudoun Free Clinic since 2010. In this role, Ms. Kitrel is responsible for the strategic management of the Clinic, which delivers quality medical care to needy Loudoun County residents. Her responsibilities include day-to-day operations and administrative management, fundraising, community outreach, and representing the Clinic on various health safety net-related councils.

Prior to joining the Free Clinic, she was Regional Vice President for Onlife Health, providing employee wellness programs to large employers and public entities. Ms. Kitrel has over 15 years of experience in the managed care industry, working for UnitedHealthGroup in senior account management roles since 1997. She has a Master's Degree in Business Management and Real Estate Management from Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri, and is a Nationally Certified Massage Therapist. A St. Louis native, she has been a resident of Loudoun County since 2000 and resides in Leesburg.

The Loudoun Free Clinic, which was established to serve low-income, uninsured residents of Loudoun County, provides quality medical care at no charge to adults (age 18 to 64) with acute and chronic illnesses by relying almost entirely on volunteers - physicians, nurses, and others who give freely of their time - and on the generous support of our community partners and private citizens.

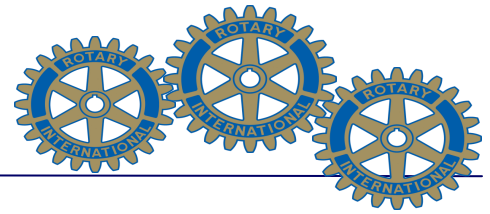
