Program

Rich Thomas - Recent & Future Trends in the Wine Industry

Rollie Atkinson introduced our guest speaker for today by stating, "Good afternoon fellow Rotarians, our guest speaker is...leaving?" Not really, it just seemed that way. **Rollie** rattled off a long list of credits and accolades attributed to Rich, most of which Rich admits are true. Retired Professor Emeritus of Viticultural Studies at Santa Rosa JC, where he taught since 1973, he consults, judges and is a





columnist for various publications. A 1963 graduate of UC Davis, Rich was born and raised in Sonoma County...he claims that's why Zinfandel and Sauvignon Blanc are his favorite wines. He has been judging wine competitions for 31 years, and is one of the founding fathers of the Sonoma County Wine Grape Commission.

Rich talked about the wine industry in general, with many pearls of wisdom spread throughout his talk, sprinkled with strong personal opinions (I don't like oak...If I want to taste oak, I'll chew on a toothpick), and comedic relief (What's the difference between the Pope and a winemaker...The Pope only asks you to kiss his ring!) Some highlights:

- This year is a sh---y crop...long hang time and low yield. Haven't picked a grape yet except champagne.
- Price is not a function of quality, but availability. It's gonna taste good at \$80 a bottle, no matter what! Price is what the traffic will bear.
- What makes a gold medal winner? 3 out of 5 judges like it...and then he added, maybe the next day their opinions might be different.
- There are too many judgments. There are 7 different judgments right here in this miserable little town. As a result, having a gold medal is only good marketing wise for about 8 days.
- Wineries are popping up like mushrooms after a summer storm. For example, in 2001 we had 1,450 California wineries and 2,900 nationwide. In 2011 we have 3,364 California wineries and 7,600 nationwide.
- My goal in life is to make wine available to everyone at a fair price.
- Napa is #1 in Cabernet Sauvignon. Sonoma dominates in everything else.
- We have a problem in tasting room personnel...they know their wines, but they don't know the people coming in...ie midwesterners prefer a sweet wine. Something we might think is great, they think came out of an animal. It's also the old versus the new, customer-wise...younger ones have different tastes.
- The DUI enforcement is going to get tougher. Tasting rooms should have breathalizers.
- The battle over water...frost protection vs fish.
- Too many appellations...ego driven.
- New packaging ideas:
 - A Pennsylvania winery (Yes, they have wineries in PA) sells wine in a gallon paint can, with a spigot.
 - Someone has come out with a "Tetra Pack", made of plastic.
 - A two liter pouch.
 - Screw Tops and the stigma against them is waning. A top Washington State winery has switched over completely to screw tops. You can create Pizazz, even with a screwtop he said, as he ran a screwtop bottle down his forearm with the panache of a top sommelier, unscrewing the top in the process and simulating the pour in an instant.
- Welcome to God's Country.



President Aleia thanked Rich for the informative and certainly entertaining talk and presented him with a speaker's gift of a donation to PolioPlus in his name. She then reminded us that the Morning Club's Cajun Festival is this Saturday, rang The Bell at 1:30 p.m. and wished everybody a great afternoon.



Last week's Rotary Fishing Trip was a resounding success. Although Rick, the Captain of the New Sea Angler, made the decision not to go after salmon due to the slow bite of the last couple of days, all on board did achieve full limits of rockfish. The ABC's of Rotary

#65: The Rotary Foundation's Beginning

Some magnificent projects grow from very small seeds. The Rotary Foundation had that sort of modest beginning.

In 1917, RI President Arch Klumph told the delegates to the Atlanta convention that "it seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." The response was polite and favorable, but the fund was slow to materialize. A year later, the Rotary Endowment Fund, as it was originally labeled, received its first contribution of US\$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA, which was the balance of the Kansas City convention account following the 1918 annual meeting. Additional small amounts were contributed each year, but after six years the endowment fund had reached only \$700. A decade later, The Rotary Foundation was formally established at the 1928 Minneapolis convention.

In the next four years, the Foundation fund grew to \$50,000. In 1937, a \$2 million goal was announced for The Rotary Foundation, but these plans were cut short and abandoned with the outbreak of World War II. In 1947, upon the death of Paul Harris, a new era opened for The Rotary Foundation as memorial gifts poured in to honor the founder of Rotary. From that time, The Rotary Foundation has been achieving its noble objective of furthering "understanding and friendly relations between peoples of different nations." By 1954, the Foundation received for the first time a half million dollars in contributions in a single year, and in 1965 a million dollars was received.

It is staggering to imagine that from those humble beginnings, The Rotary Foundation is now receiving more than \$65 million each year for educational and humanitarian work around the world.




