# Larry's Libretto ---Rotary's Contribution to Peace on Earth



More than 16 years ago the Hospital for Special Surgery (HSS) in New York City needed a home for six months for a girl from Kosovo who had lost both legs to a landmine explosion, so that she could continue her medical treatment and perhaps get fitted for prosthetics legs to hopefully learn to walk again.

Montclair Rotarian Juliana Belcsak and her husband took Ibadete into their family. "We were delighted to watch her grow into the beautiful woman she is today. It was a long, difficult struggle for Iba; she needed to adjust emotionally and physically to a new life. Her night-mares were fierce sometimes."

The Montclair Rotary Club and the District Rotarians all welcomed lba for many years to all their activities which was very important for her. Iba made lasting friends with many Rotary Exchange students and local Rotarians. She attended Montclair High school and graduated from Georgian Court University. Today, through the contiguous support from HSS, Iba, now 29, not only has "beautiful legs" but now also works as a Research Assistant at that Hospital. Without our Rotary Families, Iba would not have been able to stay in the USA.

#### 2-1/2 Year-Old Almir – Back Home Safe, Healthy & Happy

Nusetre Shala was a very frightened young mom when she arrived in this strange land in early December. Traveling from Prishtina, Kosovo with her young son Almir, she was putting the life of her little boy into the hands of strangers – strangers in a country that where she comes from is often thought to be the bad guys.

Almir was born with multiple congenital heart defects – defects that prevented him from living a normal life or having a normal life expectancy.

Those defects were corrected surgically by Dr. Sunil Malhotra of Children's Hospital of NJ at Newark Beth Israel Medical Center. Members of the Morristown Rotary Club sponsored Almir's surgery.

By the time Almir and his mother left for home on January 18th, they had been guests in the homes of four different Rotarian families: Brian and Becky Romanowsky of Whippany, PDG Jim and Susan Allison of the Madison Club, Rick Porter and his wife, Kate Davidson of Maplewood and Ed and Elsie Malicki of Morris Plains.

Another success story in the ongoing saga that is Gift of Life – "Saving the World – One little Heart at a Time."





# **Generous Contributions To The Rotary Foundation Are Essential To Securing And Growing Rotary Programs Throughout The World**

#### **Paul Harris Fellow**

A Paul Harris Fellow recognition is an acknowledgement provided by The Rotary Foundation. There are several levels of individual recognitions given by Rotary International but the most frequent recognition is a Paul Harris Fellow. There are multiple ways in which an individual may receive a Paul Harris Fellow. Examples are listed below.

An individual can make an outright contribution of \$1,000 to the Foundation and receive a Paul Harris Fellow recognition.

When an individual's cumulative giving reaches the \$1,000 level, Rotary International automatically sends a PHF recognition to the Club President for presentation. Additional PHF's are given for every \$1,000 contribution, i.e., PHF+1, PHF+2, etc.

A club may give a Paul Harris Fellow recognition by contributing \$1,000 in the name of the recipient. Many clubs use this recognition to recognize outstanding club service or a significant Rotary milestone i.e., anniversary, birth, memorial, etc.



#### **Paul Harris Society**

Membership in the Paul Harris Society is based on a gift of \$1,000 a year to the Annual Programs Fund of the Rotary Foundation. Although there is no ongoing obligation, Rotarians are encouraged to renew your their membership each year until they become a Major Donor. These annual donations to the Paul Harris Society may be made is a single gift of \$1,000 or as installments. Payments must be complete by the end of the Rotary year, June 30th.

You don't have to be a Paul Harris Fellow first in order to become a Paul Harris Society member. If you are not already a Paul Harris Fellow you will become one as soon as you fully fund your initial Society pledge.




# Bowling Highlights

## **Returns By Popular Demand!**

After the initial success and acceptance of the District-Wide 50/50 last year, we're bringing it back!

This is a project of the newly-created District Foundation - a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization formed by your district to help clubs with their fund-raising efforts.

The raffle is simple – we're printing 5000 tickets and hoping to sell all of them at \$20 apiece. And, in keeping with NJ raffle law, 50% of the proceeds will go to five winners as follows:

Your club gets the other 50% less a small percentage to cover the expenses (license fees and printing costs).

This fund-raising project is completely voluntary. Your club can choose to participate if you wish. No club or Rotarian is required to sell these tickets. And there is no commitment. Your club can take as many (or as few) tickets as you think you might be able to sell, and as long as you return any unsold tickets, there is no penalty for not selling them all.

Each Club President was e-mailed an explanation of this fundraising project, and has the opportunity to request tickets.

The tickets will be available for distribution around the second week of February, and the drawing is May8th in Morris Plains.
