### Rotary's Contribution To The Level of Learning on the Planet Earth

So think about this – most Rotary Clubs give scholarships, right? It's a tradition in most clubs that goes back for many, many years. It fits into two different Avenues of Service: Community Service and Youth Service. And if your club is like my club, your scholarships go to college-bound students.

But there are other scholarships. For many years, The Rotary Foundation gave a scholarship they called the Ambassadorial Scholarship. This was given to a student who was pursuing higher education, usually post-graduate study, but was also available for undergraduate study. This highly-competitive program was only available to students who would study in a foreign country.

At some point a few years ago, the Ambassadorial Scholarship was replaced by the Global Grant Scholarship. This is a program strictly dedicated to post-graduate study with a Masters Degree as a goal, and the student must be already enrolled in a university overseas.

However, there's a whole 'nother dimension to this scholarship business that we in this country know very little about. In many underdeveloped countries, public educa-

tion goes only to the sixth grade. If you want to go on to middle school or high school, it's only available in private schools. And these schools can cost \$200 to \$400 per year – not much money for you or I, but in Liberia, Nigeria or the Sudan, it's an amount that is simply out of reach. But here come the local Rotary Clubs to the rescue, providing scholarships, not for college study, but for basic education; education that allows these kids to earn a middle or high school diploma.

When you think about the power of Rotary in the world, think about 34,000 Rotary Clubs in over 200 countries that have been providing scholarships for all levels of study for many decades. We have elevated the level of education on this planet exponentially. And in the process, helped peoples of the world become better citizens, better partners, better parents, better wage-earners, etc.

And we.....you and I.....are part of that.

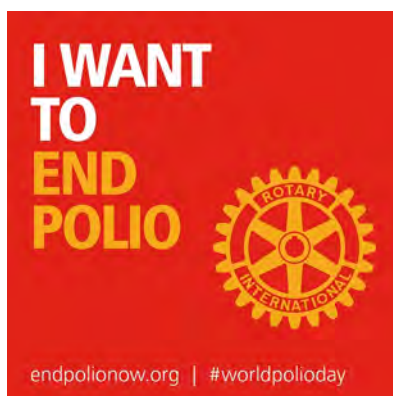

## The First To Be Injected With The New Polio Vaccine

February 23, 2015 marked the anniversary of the date in 1954 that a group of children from Arsenal Elementary School in Pittsburgh, Pa received the first injections of the new polio vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk. The initial success rate was between 60 and 70%. By August 1955, some four million shots had been given. Cases of Polio in the United States dropped from 14,647 in 1955 to 5,894 in 1956, and by 1959 ninety other countries were using Salk's vaccine. There is still no cure for Polio once it has been contracted, but the use of the vaccine has virtually eliminated Polio worldwide.

From an idea fostered by a single Rotarian from the Philippines grew the Polio plus Project. Due to our hard work millions of lives have been spared from this dreaded disease. Michael H. Karu, West Orange Rotary Club

## Returns By Popular Demand!

After the initial success and acceptance of the District-Wide 50/50 last year, we're bringing it back!

This is a project of the newly-created District Foundation – a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization formed by your district to help clubs with their fund-raising efforts.

The raffle is simple – we're printing 5000 tickets and hoping to sell all of them at \$20 apiece. And, in keeping with NJ raffle law, 50% of the proceeds will go to five winners as follows:

<b>1st Prize</b>	<b>\$33,333</b> or 1/3 of all proceeds
<b>2nd Prize</b>	<b>\$8,333</b> or 1/12 of all proceeds
<b>3rd Prize</b>	<b>\$5,000</b> or 1/20 of all proceeds
<b>4th Prize</b>	<b>\$2,000</b> or 1/50 of all proceeds
<b>5th Prize</b>	<b>\$1,333</b> or 1/75 of all proceeds

Your club gets the other 50% less a small percentage to cover the expenses (license fees and printing costs).

This fund-raising project is completely voluntary. Your club can choose to participate if you wish. No club or Rotarian is required to sell these tickets. And there is no commitment. Your club can take as many (or as few) tickets as you think you might be able to sell, and as long as you return any unsold tickets, there is no penalty for not selling them all.

Each Club President was e-mailed an explanation of this fund-raising project, and has the opportunity to request tickets.

The tickets will be available for distribution around the second week of February, and the drawing is May 8th in Morris Plains.

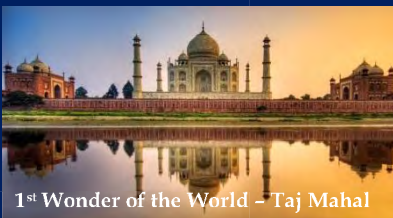
