

District 7470 received top honors for being the District that contributed the most to Polio Plus in Rotary Year 2012 -2013 from the 58 Districts in our Zone. District 7470 is part of Rotary International Zone 24, 32 which includes 58 Districts covering all of Canada and the Northeast. The award was given at the annual Zone conference held in Cherry Hill, New Jersey from September 18 – 22, 2013. Contributions for our district exceeded \$140,000.

A special thank you to all individuals and clubs who contributed to support the eradication of Polio through the Polio Plus program.


WORLD POLIO DAY: OCTOBER 24, 2013

Since its launch at the World Health Assembly (WHA) in 1988, the Global Eradication Initiative (GPEI) has reduced the global incidence of polio by more than 99% and the number of countries with endemic polio from 125 to 3. More than 10 million people is walking today who would otherwise have been paralyzed.

This is an amazing result. Nevertheless; there is still a threat to the global community of ongoing poliovirus transmission in the last three endemic countries and the risk of circulating vaccine derived poliovirus.

WHA declared ending polio as a "programmatic emergency for global health public health" and the need for a comprehensive polio endgame.

The four main objectives of the endgame strategy are: Stop all wild polio transmission by the end of 2014 Hasten the interruption of all poliovirus transmission and help strengthen immunization systems Certify all regions of the world polio-free and ensure that all polio-virus stocks are safely contained Ensure that a polio-free world is permanent and that the investment in polio-eradication provides public health dividends for years to come.

Cassandra Graham - Assistant Governor, 2009 Rotary Club of Irvington charter member, club Conference, Rotary Foundation, and Walkfest Chairperson and a New Jersey native of the Newark, East Orange, and Orange public schools - earned a B.A. from Cornell University, M.A. in Early and Elementary Education from Seton Hall University and is pursuing a Ph.D. at Seton Hall in Higher Education. As an administrator with their Pre-Medical/Pre-Dental Plus Program, Cassandra is, "honored 'to assist in providing opportunities to qualified New Jersey students historically denied access to careers in the health professions, and aid in their preparation for acceptance into medical, dental, veterinary, and other graduate and professional schools.' "



Her volunteerism includes the Educational Opportunity Fund Professional Association of NJ, United Way of Essex and West Hudson Celebrity Reader, YWCA of Essex and West Hudson past Treasurer and Board of Director, camp counselor and youth Sunday School instructor. To Cassandra, "Service above Self and The 4-Way Test should be demonstrated daily in how we treat others, not acts for self-glorification or only spoken words." 2013 Zone Institute

The 2013 Zone Institute (which is like a district conference on steroids) for Zones 24 & 32 was held last week. Rotary International President Ron Burton spoke about his experience in Rotary and the theme of his year which involves membership. Past Rotary International Vice President Bob Scott gave a status report on Polio Plus. He explained that although the number of case is dropping, the campaign is facing greater challenges; including new outbreaks, the killing of ten aid workers last year and difficult access to the remaining endemic areas. The good news is the end is in sight with just 3 countries remaining. District 7470 received an award for Polio. The biggest question seems to be in a post Polio world what will be Rotary's focus? Will it be Peace, Alzheimer's , Water , Aids, or You choose. The next Zone Institute will be in Toronto, Canada October 13th, 2014.


