The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

History of The Rotary Foundation

In 1917, RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed that an endowment be set up "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

Polio eradication is the most ambitious program in Rotary's outstanding history. For more than 20 years, Rotarians have led the private sector in the global effort to give every child a polio free world - a world free from both the crippling disease of polio and a brighter future where their individual potential has a chance to flourish.

More than 20 years ago more than 350,000 children each year would suffer the ravages of the vicious disease known as polio. When they survived they faced a lifetime of limited mobility, education, opportunities and possibly limited social interactions.

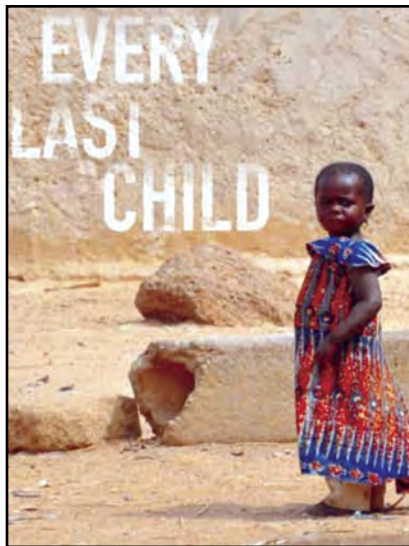
As of October 12, 2011 a total of 444 cases were reported globally compared to 717 at the same time in 2010. There remain four countries where polio has never been eradicated: India, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Nigeria, yet numbers in all those countries have steadily declined over the years.

Nine months have passed since India's only case of the wild polio virus for the year. India continues strongly committed to eradicating polio and has organized sub-national immunization days (SNIDs) throughout the country. The most recent one was held toward the end of September and more than 75 million children were immunized. November will see another SNID in India in other States.

Pakistan unfortunately has another 111 children stricken with polio this year compared to 78 this time last year. Pakistan now accounts for exactly one-quarter of all global cases in 2011.

One new case was reported in the past week in Afghanistan bringing the total this year to 37 compared to 18 same time last year. Insecurity is the primary culprit here and the Ministry of Public Health is working with WHO to try and resolve the problem. National Immunization Days are scheduled.

Thirty-four children in Nigeria have been affected, with the latest one reported on 27 August, with onset of paralysis!



Now's the time to learn about what the Foundation does...

November is Rotary Foundation Month, and I hope you'll focus on the Foundation with your club speakers and programs. How can our newer Rotarians understand the Foundation if we do not tell them what it is and what it does?

We are often not good communicators in Rotary, which is strange as we are business and community leaders. Maybe it is information overload or too much sport on television, but Rotary information is not a high priority for many Rotarians. For example, how would you answer these questions:

Is there an Ambassadorial Scholar in our district?

What is this Future Vision Plan, and what does it mean for our club?

What do we need to know about polio eradication, other than that it makes us feel good?

What is the difference between Group Study Exchange and vocational training teams?

I hear the words Every Rotarian, Every Year. What is that about?

How can The Rotary Foundation support our club's desire to help people outside our community?

What are Rotarians doing on issues such as HIV/AIDS and water and sanitation?

Nobody in my club reads the Foundation annual report. Where does the money go?

What is our relationship with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation?

The list of questions could go on, but the real question is, "What is our club doing to learn more about our Rotary Foundation?" If the answer is "not enough," now might be a very good time to start.

Did You Know... The Rotary Foundation and Future Vision launch two new Strategic Partnerships

The Rotary Foundation Trustees reached agreements with Aga Khan University and Oikocredit International to form the first strategic partnerships under the Future Vision Plan. Through these partnerships, the Foundation will offer packaged global grants to Rotary clubs and districts in the Future Vision pilot. Packaged global grants are opportunities for Rotarians to work with the Foundation's strategic partners on predesigned projects and activities funded entirely by the World Fund. These projects and activities support the areas of focus and can include scholarships, humanitarian projects, and vocational training.

Aga Khan University (AKU) is a private, not-for-profit university that promotes human welfare and development through research, teaching and community service initiatives. Through these packaged global grants with AKU, Rotarian-led vocational training teams will work with AKU faculty to design and provide training programs that will enhance the professional development of university-level nursing faculty in Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda. Packaged global grants will also fund scholarships for students to study nursing and midwifery through AKU's nursing programs in East Africa. These grants will support the maternal and child health area of focus. Oikocredit International is a Netherlands-based cooperative financial institution that promotes socially responsible investing. In this partnership, Rotary clubs and districts will work with Oikocredit affiliated microfinance institutions (MFIs) in a number of Future Vision Pilot Districts. Together, these MFIs and Rotary club members will identify local barriers to economic development and develop training programs to overcome those barriers. These packaged global grants will support the economic and community development area of focus and will soon be available online for Rotary clubs and districts in the Future Vision pilot.

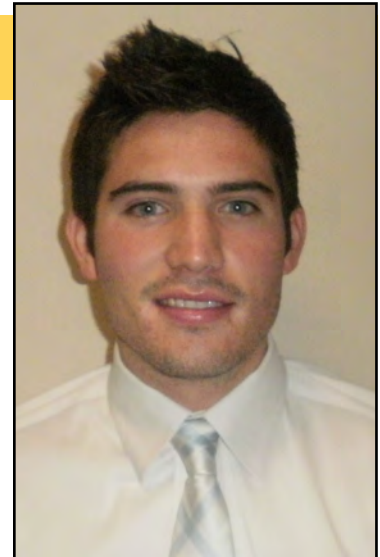

The Rotary Foundation has recently approved the application of Michael Clarke for a 2012-2013 academic year ambassadorial scholarship. Michael will be attending the American University of Beirut, Lebanon, where he will study Middle Eastern affairs and the historical development of the United States' relations within the Arab world. Specifically, he proposes to study issues in international development and conflict mitigation.

Michael is a 2011 graduate of Union College in Schenectady New York, where he created his own major entitled Religion and Politics, a major which cut across three academic disciplines - classics, history, and political science. He dedicated a majority of his academic career studying Islam, Islamic culture, and the Arabic language.

Hailing from Bloomfield, Michael was endorsed by the Newark Club and is fortunate to have Sophia Modu, President of that club, as his sponsor counselor. To Michael's credit he has already attended the Northeast Link orientation in Foxborough, Mass. While there, he made an acquaintance who put him in touch with her family in Beirut. Through that link he hopes to outline a project, with his host club, which he can begin working on before his departure.

appointed to "hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its property . . . as a single trust, for the furtherance of the purposes of RI."

Two years later, the Foundation made its first grant of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into the Easter Seals.

The Great Depression and World War II both impeded the Foundation's growth, but the need for lasting world peace generated great postwar interest in its development. After Rotary's founder, Paul P. Harris, died in 1947, contributions began pouring into Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

That year, the first Foundation program – the forerunner of Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships – was established. In 1965-66, three new programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

The Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants program was launched in 1978, and Rotary Volunteers was created as part of that program in 1980. PolioPlus was announced in 1984-85, and the next year brought Rotary Grants for University Teachers. The first peace forums were held in 1987-88, leading to the Foundation's peace and conflict studies programs.

Throughout this time, support of the Foundation grew tremendously. Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, it has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion. More than \$70 million were donated in 2003-04 alone. To date, more than one million individuals have been recognized as Paul Harris Fellows – people who have given \$1,000 to the Annual Programs Fund or have had that amount contributed in their name.

Such strong support, along with Rotarian involvement worldwide, ensures a secure future for The Rotary Foundation as it continues its vital work for international understanding and world peace.

Today there are more than 7,300 Rotary Club sponsored Rotaract Clubs in over 150 countries.

Rotaract can be a college based program, a community based program, or a mix of the two. Rotaract meetings feature many of the same things that Rotary meetings do - guest speakers, discussions, visitations to both other Rotaract clubs as well as their sponsoring Rotary Club, and fellowship. This year's goal is to have the existing Rotaract clubs meet and, perhaps, plan some joint projects and/or programs. Additionally, there is a need to expand the number of Rotaract clubs.
