- Internalization is when people accept a belief or behavior and agree both publicly and privately.

Rotary Youth Leadership Award

R.Y.L.A. is an acronym for Rotary Youth Leadership Award. Our district conducts an annual RYLA conference in early June targeted at high school Juniors in our district. The purpose of RYLA is to emphasize leadership, citizenship and personal growth and aims to demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth, provide a conference for selected youth, encourage leadership of youth by youth and to recognize publicly young people who are rendering service to their community.

This year District 7470 RYLA conferences was held from June 3rd to 5th on the campus of Drew University. It gave the participants a flavor of what it is like to live on a college campus. There were over 50 students sent by 25 rotary clubs in our district. The program consisted of motivational lectures, group activities, leadership development, a time for fellowship and time to "hang out" and meet new friends.

Camper Bull of the Madison Club has been leading RYLA in our district for the last 10 years. This year he had a staff of 5 volunteers including: Adam Schulz, incoming president of Denville Sunrise Club, Barry Kroll, DGND, Carla Brady, Student Affairs Director at Drew, and Fred Hoshi and Lisa McMann. Bob Coultas, PRIDE, brought RYLA to our district in his year as District Governor in 1983-84. Bob continues to serve on the RYLA committee and is one of the most popular presenters at the event.

The local theme for this year's RYLA event was "overcoming your fears and accomplishing your dreams." At the end of the conference students were interviewed to get their impression and it was clear that the weekend was an overwhelming success. Lisa Jenkins stated, "I didn't think my life could be changed in a weekend but it was." "I can't believe how we came together as a group of strangers and now we have built lasting friendships." Sarah Bittner, Long Term Exchange Student for Germany, hosted by the Madison Club said, "this is one of the best things I have done in my stay in the United States."

The committee goal for 2011-2012 is to double the number of participants from 50 to 100. The cost of RYLA is fully paid for by local Rotary clubs. Clubs can choose the students they send or work in conjunction with high school guidance departments to select students. This program truly emphasizes Rotary's commitment to working with youth to develop leadership skills and a greater understanding and appreciation of Rotary. After all, these young people will be our future Rotary leaders.

My Finest Hour

Over my 34+ years in Rotary, I have been afforded many opportunities, some during my year as club president in 1983-84, some as District Governor in1997-98, and some in this remarkable two years as one of 17 Directors of Rotary International. In between those notable years, Ruth and I have traveled to many developing countries on four continents participating in humanitarian projects and polio National Immunization Days. All of these opportunities were notable in their own right, but none can compare with the very first child I immunized against polio in Cameroon, West Central Africa in February of 2003.

I had been involved in every aspect of PolioPlus since 1985, when I chaired the first fundraising efforts in my own club. We attended the 1988 International Convention in Philadelphia, still the most exciting of the 15 International Conventions we have attended. We attempted to go on an NID to Cote de Ivorie in 2001, but at the last minute were denied access to that country due to a military coup. So when we finally had the opportunity to join a primarily Canadian team, I knew it was going to be an emotional experience.

We were fortunate to have on that trip a Rotarian medical doctor, originally from Sri Lanka and now a practicing physician in Ontario, Canada. Dr. Summie had been on an NID in Nigeria the previous year, and became our mentor for this trip. She was very aware of what this opportunity meant to me, and I believe she was determined to ensure it was all I expected.

When I finally got that chance to immunize my first child, this little girl of 3 or 4 years of age, who had never before seen a white face in her little life, tipped back her head, opened her mouth like a bird and allowed me to squeeze those two precious drops of vaccine onto her tongue. Instantly, the emotion just welled up inside of me. Then I looked up and Dr. Summie was standing there. She smiled at me and said, "Now, that child will walk," and I lost it. And if I were telling you this story in person today, my voice might still crack from the incredible memory of that moment. It was then, is now, and probably always will be my Finest Hour in Rotary. As further evidence of what this moment means to me, I have carried the tiny vial that contained those first two drops I administered in my pocket every single day since 2003, now some 8 ½ years later.

My friends, we are so very close to finishing the job of eradicating polio, but we are not there yet. Rotary still needs each and every one of us to contribute time and financial resources to completing this last 1%. Some of you may yet have the opportunity, as I did, to experience that thrill of administering those two drops that will save a child from this horrible, crippling disease. Others of you will participate by contributing money to fund this most difficult last effort. Both are necessary and both are of equal importance.

I could ask for your support from your RI Board of Directors, which is fully invested in this effort, but I am not going to. Instead, I implore you personally from my heart to contribute what you can to ensure our success. There will be that day when every Rotarian who participates in any way will be able to say, "I was there. I was one of the Rotarians who made Rotary the only service organization in history to lead in the eradication of a devastating disease worldwide." Please be a part of that legacy.

RI President Kalyan Banerjee

Kalyan Banerjee, a member of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat, India, since 1972, is the 2011-2012 RI President.

Banerjee is a director of United Phosphorus Limited, the largest agrochemical manufacturer in India, and the chair of United Phosphorus (Bangladesh) Limited. He is a member of the Indian Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Chemical Society, a past president of Vapi Industries Association, and former chair of the Gujarat chapter of the Confederation of Indian Industry. He earned a degree in chemical engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur, in 1964.

Banerjee has served Rotary as a director, Rotary Foundation trustee, committee and task force chair, International Assembly group discussion leader, president's representative, and district governor.

The chair of the Southeast Asia Regional PolioPlus Committee, Banerjee has served as a member of the International PolioPlus Committee for many years and has attended international meetings with the World Health Organization and UNICEF in that capacity.

Banerjee is a Major Donor, Benefactor, and Bequest Society member, and has been awarded the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and its Distinguished Service Award.

Banerjee also serves as a trustee of Rotary club-sponsored trusts that support many educational and community development programs in India, including a 250-bed hospital.

He noted that Rotary's strengths include its ability to attract leaders from different vocations around the world, as well as its role in promoting peace. "Rotary needs to become the preferred organization for today's generation to join and participate in, to make the world better and safer and happier," he said.

Banerjee's wife, Binota, is a social worker and Inner Wheel club member. The couple have two children and four grandchildren.




