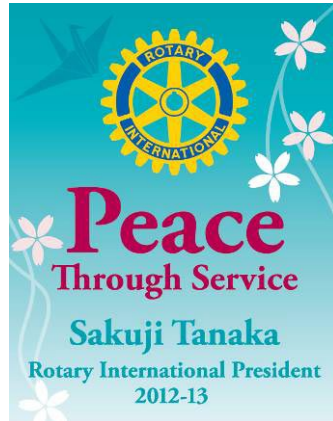


DISTRICT 7850, GOVERNOR'S NEWSLETTER – 2 January 2013

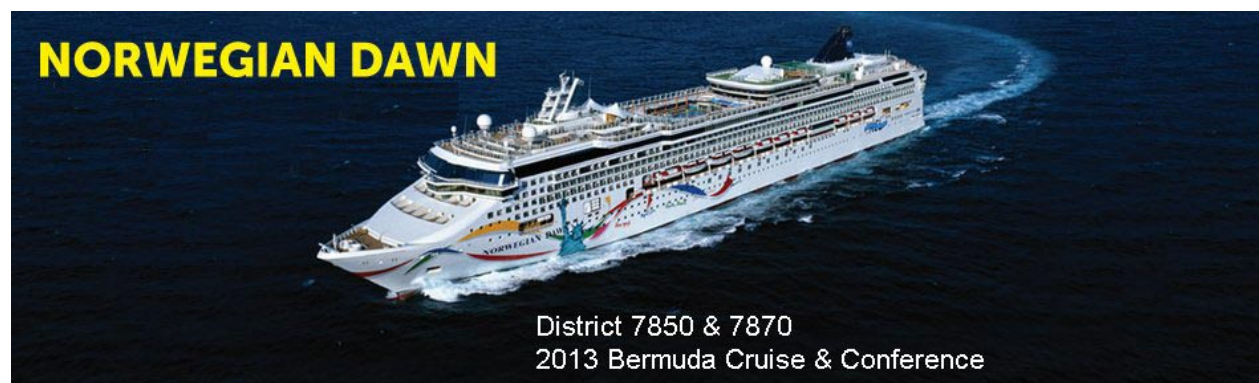
Steve Usle, with his son Justin, drove the donations to Belle Harbor, NY, an area that experienced significant storm-related loss.

Service Projects Database (Linda Gilbert, chair)

As we prepare for the launch of Future Vision in July of 2013, clubs will need to work more collaboratively with other clubs in the coming years. One tool that we have been building these past six months is an inventory of the Local Service Projects, International Service Projects and Fundraising Projects. To date we have a total of 105 projects from 12 clubs...56 are local projects, 11 are international projects and 38 are fundraising projects.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT:

District Policy for Family Plan Members

District Governor and Membership Chair Sonny has proposed a method of encouraging family members of Rotarians to join Rotary, by offering reduced District dues. Participating clubs will be asked to also offer a reduction in club dues. A draft of the plan was sent to the clubs for their review.

Membership Seminar Make up Dates: For those who missed the membership seminars in December, there are two make up seminars that will be held on January 12th. One in Montpelier at 9 AM and another in Lincoln-Woodstock at 1 PM. Assistant Governor Gilles Gravel will also be holding a seminar for the Quebec clubs on 2 February.

CLUB EXTENSION (Past District Governor Bill Thompson, Chair)

The Ossipee club, currently operating as a satellite of the North Conway club, now is about to reach the requirement of 25 members to charter. We hope and expect that this will happen soon, certainly within this Rotary year.

Work continues to form a Young Generations club in Addison County, Vermont. This effort is spearheaded by Middlebury President Jason Schnoor.

We have identified contact information for the Chambers of Commerce in Granby, Cowansville, Magog, and Knowlton, Quebec. We will soon contact each of them to try to set up meetings where we can promote the formation of Rotary clubs in their communities.

E-Club Formation: Each District is authorized to form 2 E-Clubs. If anyone in the District would like to volunteer to investigate how to set up an E-Club, please let Bill Thompson know. We don't need to reinvent the wheel. We can learn from contacting other E-Clubs to see how they did it.

for these grants.

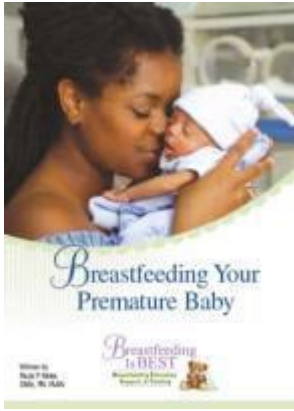
Other Rotary Foundation News



2011/2012.

The Rotary Clubs of Burlington (International Partner), Middlebury, St-Hyacinthe and Lebanon Riverside have already made contributions to do a literacy grant in South Africa. The Rotary Club of Burlington is still accepting donations to help assure our Clubs can contribute US\$5,000 to this grant. We are partnering with District 9320. This is the Group Study Exchange Team's District from

The aim of this project is to teach reading in the mother tongue plus at least one additional provincial language by making use of *Literacy For All*, a reading program built around progressive sets of readers for each grade. The advantage of the program is that it was developed by South Africans for South African circumstances. The sponsor provides material in the official languages (Setswana, Afrikaans and English) of the province and teachers are trained to teach reading in all three. 61% of South African children cannot read at the end of Grade 3



Maternal Child Health Matching Grant:

The Rotary Club of Sherbrooke is investigating pursuing a Maternal Child Health Matching Grant with Turkey for the promotion of breastfeeding and the use of breast milk for sick and preterm infants. We would be partnering with the Group Study Exchange Team's District from Turkey that was here in 2010/2011. Help Wanted – Two *Future Vision* Foundation Sub-Committee Positions

In preparation for our transition to the *Future Vision* plan, we are recruiting for two positions. Although the official start for the role is 1 July 2013, training will be held in January at the District Team Training

Seminar.

Global Grants Chair: Global grants will offer a minimum World Fund award of \$15,000 or a project budget of \$30,000.

The Rotarian assuming this position must be willing to:

- Be comfortable dealing with change and new processes
- Become a district expert and resource for Foundation global grants.
- Follow and enforce the terms and conditions of grant awards; disseminate and conduct club education on the terms and conditions.
- Help the District Foundation Chair create and implement a district policy that outlines the distribution of grant funds for clubs.
- Work with the district Foundation chair and stewardship chair to:
 - Ensure implementation for proper stewardship and grant management practices including reporting to the Rotary Foundation on all grants.
 - Establish accurate recordkeeping systems.
 - Attend various district training meetings.

Stewardship Chair: The stewardship chair is responsible for ensuring the careful management of Rotary Foundation grant funds and for educating Rotarians on proper and effective grant management. The Rotarian assuming this position must be willing to:

- Assist with the implementation of the clubs memorandum of understanding, including the development of the financial management plan.
- Help qualify clubs, including assisting with grant management seminars.

- Ensure implementation of proper stewardship and grant management practices for all grants (Global and District Managed), including reports to The Rotary Foundation on the various grants.
- Monitor and evaluate stewardship and grant management practices, including reports to The Rotary Foundation.
- Ensure that everyone involved in a grant avoids any actual or perceived conflict of interest.

Create systems to resolve any misuse or irregularities in grant related activities, report any misuse or irregularities to The Rotary Foundation, and conduct initial local investigation into report of misuse.

POLIOPLUS – Pakistan Fights Against Fear and Mis-information

It is with heavy hearts that we learned just before Christmas that attacks against health workers in Pakistan that left nine people, mostly young women, dead in and around Karachi. Amidst the sadness of the losses, there is hope. Many of Pakistan’s leaders speak out in support of the polio eradication campaign and these young health care workers motivated to help children avoid the tragedies of polio. Reuters reported that an alliance of Pakistani clerics would hold demonstrations across the country against the killings of polio eradication campaign workers.¹ “The attacks prompted the Government of Pakistan to temporarily suspend the vaccination campaign due to the concerns over the safety of health workers. Rotary is deeply concerned that such attacks deprive at-risk children of basic life-saving health care services, including polio vaccinations. I know that Pakistani Rotarians, supported by Rotary members worldwide, will continue to do their utmost to create a safe environment so that these dedicated health workers can reach the nation’s most vulnerable children with vaccinations and other vital health interventions.”²

Here in Canada and the United States, let us continue to support the efforts of brave and selfless volunteers and health care workers around the world whose efforts help us cover the “the final inch”.

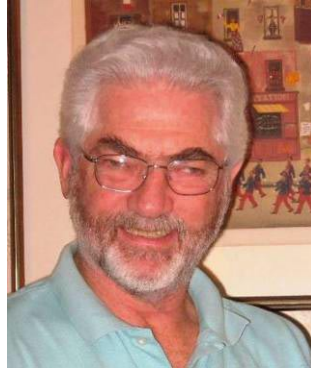
