# Rotary Shred Fest Collects Record Amount

Baldwin Wallace University students, left, helped Berea Rotary collect 25,000 pounds of paper, 110 pounds of prescription medicines and more than 200 pairs of eyeglasses during the Shred Fest on May 4. Rotarians also assembled 200 goody bags, which were given to Fest donors. They were gone within hours.

The Shred Fest sponsored by the City of Berea and the Rotary Club of Berea May 4 collected more than 25,000 pounds of paper to be shredded and recycled by Cintas Corp. That sets a new record. Last year, Shred Fest collected 170 pounds of paper from local resident businesses. The event also collected 110 pounds of outdated prescription medicines, which were disposed of by the west General Health Center. More than 200 pairs of eyeglasses were collected to be distributed by Lions International.

The annual Shred Fest was in the parking lot of Roehm Middle School and was open to residents. More than 400 cars lined up through the drive lines where Baldwin Wallace University students and Berea Rotarians unloaded the vehicles.

Next on the agenda is the computer and electronics roundup sponsored by the City of Berea and Berea Rotary 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on June 8 in the parking lot of Berea High School. No television sets will be accepted but other electronic equipment, such as computers, cameras and cell phones, can be dropped off to be recycled. Other electronics equipment that can be accepted includes speakers, stereo equipment, video games, microwaves, computer cables, CRT monitors, servers, printers, DVD players, CD players, batteries, fax machines, any phone system, keyboards, copiers, floppy discs, power supply cords, mice, scanners, Palm equip-

ment and AC adapters.

There is no charge for these recycling events, but donations are accepted to support Rotary projects.

ROTARACT AUCTION SUPPORTS SHELTER BOX: The Rotary Club of Berea attended the annual auction sponsored by the Rotaract Club of Baldwin Wallace University. This year, Rotaract donated all the proceeds to Shelter Box USA. The students presented a multimedia program explaining Shelter Box and then conducted a silent auction and 50/50 raffle. Auction items included tickets to Lake Erie Captains baseball games, treats and a basketful of candy.

Right now, a 3D printer for the home costs between \$400 and \$5,000. A commercial printer runs several million dollars.

- able to walk and/or stand during the entire shift; breaks will be provided
- able to do some light labor (e.g., moving/lifting of chairs)

On Friday, May 10, Chagrin Valley Rotary Club members joined others from the Chagrin Valley to walk in the 2013 Chagrin Valley Relay for Life to benefit the American Cancer Society. The annual overnight event was held at the Kenston High School track. Despite stormy weather that threatened to derail the event, Rotarians showed up in force to walk, socialize and support the 10th Annual event in honor of Linda Hein, CVRC

Rotarian whose courage, unflinching optimism and faith during her battle with cancer inspires her fellow Rotarians. Linda was given special recognition at the event. The first lap, the Survivor Lap, with fellow cancer survivors and their caregivers.

Starting at 5:00 Friday evening until 9:00 Saturday morning, Rotarians signed up for a 90 minute time slot and walked the track, at times in pairs, with as many as four Rotarians in a time slot. Martine Scheuermann served as CVRC Relay for Life Team Captain, and with a blend of humor and determination she led the Club in raising \$4,000, far exceeding our team goal of \$2,500. Pitching a small tent near the Kenston football field and track, she spent the night at the Relay, catching an occasional nap, and walking at least one lap on the track with each Rotarian team! Dedication to a great cause!

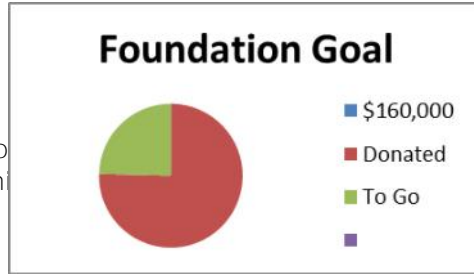
# Foundation Giving Figures Through April
