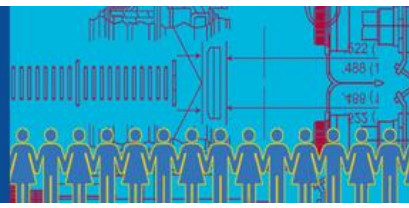
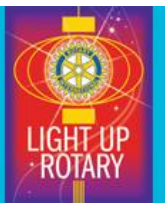

Turning an avocation into a vocation

Kevin Noon didn't start out sharpening knives for a living. He earned degrees in geology and physics. Obtained his marine steam engineers license. And was a police officer for 9 1/2 years. When he was laid off from his job in 2007, he had to decide what to do with the rest of his life. Knife sharpening was a hobby taught to him as a youth by his father. His wife suggested he start doing it full time - and get paid for it. That has worked out rather well.

Heinen's Supermarkets hired him to work the circuit of their many stores and he sets up shop at various Farmers' Markets in the area. He also runs Noon Sharpening out of his Northfield home. Noon

demonstrated his skills to Berea Rotarians on Tuesday.

"Sharpening is simple," Noon told Rotarians. "It's all about the angle." Different angles are needed for different tools and just the right angle is needed to make sure the blades are honed correctly. Noon said at one time 98 percent of all sharpening stones were made from Berea sandstone.

He sharpens a wide variety of tools: kitchen knives, scissors, garden tools like pruners, lawn mowers (blades must be taken off the mower), woodworking tools, sewing tools and salon shears. He does food processor blades and blender blades, axes, shovels and chisels. No chain saws or electric hedge clippers.

Noon uses a 1923 Singer treadle sewing machine that he says he picked up out of the trash. He reconditioned it and inserted two sharpening wheels. He transports it to about 40 gigs a month.

Growing Your Club - 7 Tips

As we begin the New Year it is a good time to review our membership strategy on how to attract new members. Here are just a few tips for you to consider in growing your club.

- **Develop referral sources:** Network with friends, neighbors, business associates and co-workers. Referral

sources are an excellent resource. If you use the proper approach, you will get leads on prospective members. On the other hand, if you focus solely on individual members, you will not develop leads!

- **Diversity in growth:** Target classifications that are not currently represented in your club. This is a great opportunity to bring to your club new ideas and a variety of new positions.

- **Diversity in Growth Prospect List.** This spreadsheet lists 102 positions that may not be represented. It is an excellent tool in helping you identify potential members. If you do not have this, please contact your Assistant Governor. (distributed to all AG's in October 2014)

- **Invite a friend/neighbor to join you at a service activity:** This will provide insight into Rotary's contribution to your community. As follow up, also invite them to a social

function or club meeting.

- **Younger members:** Adding younger members is essential to the future of your club. Make membership more attractive by waiving or reducing the application fee or annual dues.

- **Past speakers:** Contact previous past speakers who you feel may be a good fit for your club. They represent an excellent pool of potential members, are knowledgeable in their field and may have numerous contacts. If they have no interest, please ask for referrals.

Always wear your Rotary pin: When asked "What is the pin for?" What's Rotary? Suggest you include in your response two things:

1. Rotary has enriched my life and made it very gratifying!
2. It has made me more of a complete person!

Congratulations! You have now created interest and positioned yourself to get to know the prospect, introduce the benefits of being a member and discuss what Rotary has done for you.

Elected for his third 3 year term as a Director was District 6630 PDG and past President of the RC of Conneaut, Jack A. Young. There are two separate Boards who work together to support the children of the dump in surrounding communities in Nicaragua.

According to PDG Young there was a meeting of both Board of Directors in Chinandega during the recent trip to Nicaragua in December to discuss how both boards could continually strengthen the success of the Betania Trade School, local community schools and their mission

Over the past 8 years, District 6630 Rotarians and Friends of Rotary have been responsible for sending various items such as Emergency vehicles, medical supplies, school supplies, etc. valued over 500,000 dollars to Nicaragua. 

Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) workshops I and II will be held on Saturday March 28th from 8:00-4:00.

Would you like to sharpen your leadership skills and learn more about Rotary at the same time? Then Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) workshops may be for you. Each of the three RLI courses focuses on a different set of leadership skills and Rotary programs and practices. They are facilitated by Rotarians trained in participatory learning techniques.

RLI Workshop I topics include Insights into Leadership, My Rotary World, Engaging Members, Our Foundation, Ethics - Vocational Service, and Service Projects. Those who have completed Workshop I are eligible for Workshop II, with topics Strategic Planning and Analysis, Targeted Service, Club Communications, Team Building, and Attracting Members. Looking ahead, Workshop III, for those who have completed Workshops I and II will be offered later in 2015. Topics for that

workshop include International Service; Effective Leadership Strategies; Rotary Opportunities; Public Image and Public Relations; Rotarians, Vocational Service and Expectations; and Making a Difference.

The cost of each workshop is \$75, which includes continental breakfast and lunch. District Governor Mike Davanzo has arranged for \$25 of the cost to be covered by our District. Your Club may cover the remainder.

Watch your email for an announcement of the location of the March 28th sessions and the opening of registration.

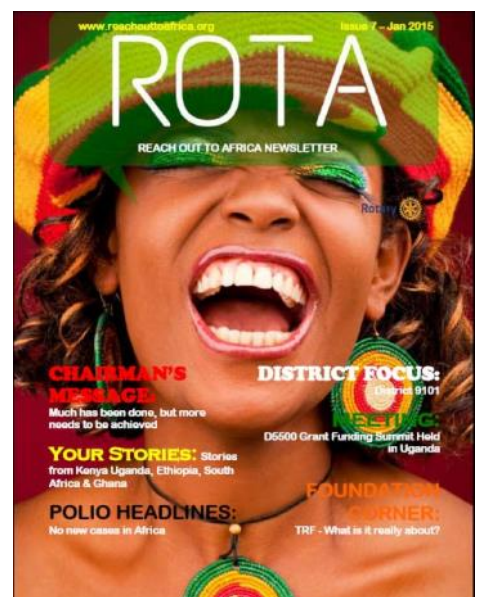

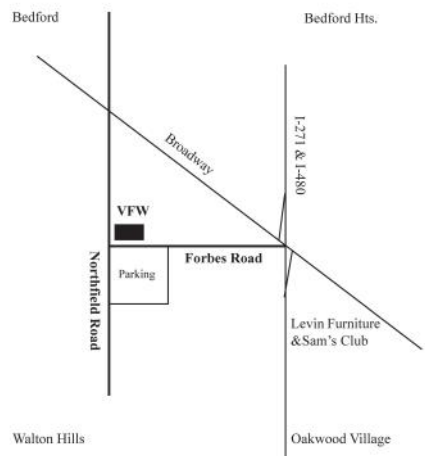

Preparation for the 4 Way Test Speech Contest

By now each Club should be planning for the Local 4 Way Test Speech Competition event. This is the precursor to the District event which is now scheduled for Saturday April 11th, 2015 in Aurora, Ohio. The Local event is where it all starts and it is up to each Club to prepare the students for this event. A good place to begin to prepare the student(s) for this event is to schedule a sit down meeting at the school with the student(s) and their faculty advisor. This is important because the students will need to have guidance for preparing their speeches. In addition, they will need a basic explanation/history of the 4 Way Test. This history can be found on the District web site or by Googling the Rotary 4 Way Test Motto.

Students should attempt to present their topics without the use of notecards. While the judges at the District level are instructed to overlook this specific detail, the use of the notecards can be a distraction. A brief moment of hesitation to glance at notes can and will affect their overall delivery and might possibly cause a less than perfect presentation.

“Auditing” Your Club's Fundraising Activities

Last fall, the Foundation Resource Development Committee of the Rotary Club of Hudson introduced a plan to determine the strength of its many and varied fundraising activities and utilize its members' talents and resources most effectively. Several weeks ago, the plan took shape as committee members personally interviewed members who had chaired events and initiatives designed to raise funds or a variety of purposes, and prepared a “hardcopy” and online survey for all other members. The survey asked participants to:

- Identify their involvement in fundraisers
- Rank their effectiveness
- Offer recommendations for enhancing existing events and launching new ones.

The results of the survey will be supplemented by an internal review of fundraising gross and net profits, number of volunteers and volunteer hours, and community impact over a seven to ten-year period, and by benchmarking activities with other clubs in the District. A final report including findings, conclusions and recommendations will be delivered to the club in March.

Such an audit works on a number of levels. Members have the opportunity to better understand and become more involved in all-important fundraising activities, stagnant activities can get a shot in the arm, and those that are clearly in decline can be replaced with new ones.
