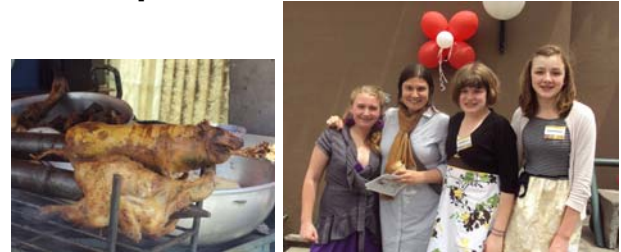
Cuenca, Ecuador

Last week in the mist of getting ready to head back to New York, I was able to fit in a final trip, first

because one of my great friends from College was coming (I had to show her a good time!) and second because there was an organization in Cuenca, Ecuador that I wanted to interview for my academic research. Cuenca is the third largest city in Ecuador after Guayaquil and then Quito. It is super beautiful. Most of the buildings are colonial with ceramic tile roofs and the city itself is well maintained and very clean. We were able to visit a National Park called "Cajas" and do some hiking, stroll around greenrooms filled with orchids, and even went to a Latin American "rock" concert. It was great to be a guide to my friend and I realized I really know a lot about Ecuador. I look forward to talking to more people about the Andes—politics and culture—when I am in the U.S.!

Ambassadorial Scholar in Australia

What a week!

It's hard to believe that I've been in Melbourne for almost a month, and it's only been a few weeks since my last update. Looking back it amazes me that I've not only started a new life here and a new phase (graduate school), but am doing so halfway around the world. Nevertheless there are some things about moving to a new place that are universal, and in the last few weeks I've found a place to live, opened up a bank account, gotten a new telephone number, have begun making new friends, learning more about Rotary here and meeting new people...in short, all the things you typically do when you move someplace new. But that's not to say my head isn't spinning from all the changes and events of the last month.

Monday, February 28th was my first day of class and tonight (Sunday night Melbourne time, about 16 hours time difference from upstate NY) has been my first chance to catch my breath. My classes are mostly in one building, which is in a very central part of the city. My classmates are very diverse and come from different parts of the world; in fact, just over half the students in my master's program are international. In addition to me, students come from Colombia, China, Malaysia, and the Czech Republic. We have about 20 contact hours with our professors, but on top of that there are additional seminars and lectures where we discuss topics related to our degree, Interactive Media and Animation. This week, someone from the animation industry spoke to us; next week we will be hearing from someone in web design. In addition to different countries, there are a lot of different backgrounds and interests amongst my classmates. There are a number of students with a strong animation background who are taking the course so they can improve their skills; there are a few people like me, who are interested in educational media; and then there are a number of people who come from teaching, IT, business, and fine arts backgrounds. Though everyone is very different, one thing that's common is that everyone is very creative and likes to approach problems in a very different way. In short, I think I will have the opportunity to learn as much from my fellow students as my professors. The workload is very intense, and I can't say I've gone to sleep at a normal hour this past week, but I'm learning a lot.

The other ambassadorial scholars here are also an

interesting group. Of the scholars, there is another American who is from Colorado and studying nonprofit management; a scholar from France; another girl from Canada who is studying engineering; and an economics student from Germany. Along with some of the outbound scholars, we'll be attending the district conference in Adelaide later in March. Adelaide is 9 hours or so from Melbourne - but in Australia, that's actually not considered too far out! Me and some of the other scholars met today to go over the presentation, which will be given at the conference and is about the Ambassadorial Scholar program. We only have about 10 minutes and we had a lot of ideas and things we wanted to say, but I'm sure we'll pull something great before the conference. Some of the speakers include Lord Jeffrey Archer (a novelist); Alexander Downer (Australia's longest serving Foreign Affairs Minister and a former Federal Opposition Leader), plus a number of other notable Australians and Rotarians. I will keep in mind the New Orleans event and let you know if I hear of any who are attending.

I'll let you know how it all goes and keep you posted. Till then, hope you're finally getting some spring in the capital district!

DISTRICT 7190 SHELTERBOX UPDATE

ShelterBox USA is on the map in District 7190, and not just among Rotarians. Following three television interviews and three newspaper articles (including The Daily Gazette and Times Union), the Greater Capital Region is responding to support the work of ShelterBox in Japan and other disaster locations around the world.

The seed for a standing ShelterBox Committee was planted a few months ago, receiving the enthusiastic endorsement of District Governor Dan Stec and DG-elect Bill Nathan. A Wine & Cheese Reception was held at Faddegon's Nursery on February 16 to get the momentum started. The first organizational meeting is scheduled for March 23 at 7:00 P.M. at Faddegon's. Anyone interested in coming on board to help us in our fundraising and awareness-raising efforts is cordially invited to attend. 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Literacy Project Opportunities for Rotary Clubs

According to the World Bank, 75 million children, 41 million of them girls, lack access to basic education. More than one in four adults, two-thirds of them women, cannot read or write. Access to education, particularly completion of primary schooling, increases child survival rates, reduces the spread of preventable disease, and increases people's ability to improve their economic well-being. March is Rotary Literacy Month. This is an excellent opportunity for clubs to focus their efforts on basic education and literacy, one of Rotary's six areas of focus. There are many types of projects clubs can undertake to increase literacy. Following are just a few examples:

The Rotary Club of Chula Vista Sunrise, California, USA and the San Diego Reading Association partner to encourage new parents to read to their children. The organizations deliver backpacks to new parents at local hospitals. The Rotarians and reading council members select baby books and nursery rhymes and provide related materials that emphasize the importance of

reading to babies for each backpack. The project serves five hospitals, 25 families in each, two or three times each year.

The Rotary Club of Piratini, Brazil recently conducted its second "Good Vision Campaign" to provide eye exams to low income students in public schools. 2,029 students were given eye exams, 246 were sent to eye doctor appointments and 233 received prescription glasses. Students diagnosed with visual pathology were sent to be treated by the public health service. Principals and teachers of the schools reported that the students benefited by the campaign have improved their academic and social performance. The Rotary Club of Laredo, Texas, USA and the Rotary Clubs of Reforma, Villa, and Nuevo Santander, Mexico, in partnership with the Amistad Reading Council and the Texas State Reading Association, applied for a matching grant that brought in \$20,000 to open up a library in an elementary school in Mexico. Spanish books appropriate for first through sixth grade were purchased and book shelves were built by a parent from that school. The project also provides teacher and parent training, which enables the students to get the most out of the books at school and at home.

For more project ideas and examples, refer to Rotary's publication Every School a Star: a literacy tool kit. To find an active literacy project in need of support, visit RI's ProjectLINK database and search for projects using keywords such as "education" or "literacy."

Rotary clubs can maximize the effectiveness of their service projects by collaborating with organizations to share resources and expertise. Rotary International has cooperative relationships with the International Reading Association and The Dollywood Foundation's Imagination Library. Many clubs have successfully worked with these organizations to promote literacy in communities around the world. Learn more about these relationships on the RI website. If your club or district has conducted an effective or innovative literacy project, please consider sharing your story by submitting a model project description for inclusion in RI's ProjectLINK database.
