Within days of the devastation that occurred as a result of Hurricanes Irene and Lee, the Northville Rotary authorized a \$1000 donation to the flood victims in Middleburgh and Schoharie. The check was delivered to Rotarians from Middleburgh Club. A number of our members had seen the devastation first hand and conveyed the incredible losses and needs of the people living in the Schoharie Valley. Jim Casey our President, along with Rotarians Bob and Beth Smith traveled to Middleburgh with food and the check. The money was to be used to purchase gift cards to be distributed to those who were affected by the floods so they could purchase what they needed the most.

The Northville Rotary also joined with the Rotary Club of Mechanicville and eight other Rotary Clubs in donating \$100 towards purchasing new warm winter coats for children in Schoharie County who had lost so much as a result of this disaster. Through a Rotary grant, the District will be able to match this money and 100 new coats will be purchased through a partnership with Operation Warm.

## First Report | By Bat-Erdene Gombosuren Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar 2011-12 1 From Mongolia to United States of America

I have been admitted at University at Albany, SUNY as a MRP (Master of Regional Planning) student. As an Ambassadorial Scholar I always focus on the knowledge and skills of urban and regional planning that I can bring home to Mongolia. MRP program at SUNY Albany focuses on professional planning practice, researching and publishing on planning-related issues, and applying planning methods to improve the quality of life in communities and regions – for my case that would be Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia specifically the poor area called ger district. Studying in a graduate school in United States as an international student, I find it not easy. One of those classes that I took for the first semester was History and Philosophy of Planning. In this class it would talk more about American history which I have very limited understanding. I did have some problems following the lecture, but I have talked with the professor and we came up with a way to work it out. Indeed, I am very glad that I have done that. He was glad that I was interested in his class and eager to learn more. During the class of Planning Processes, Plans, and the Design of Communities we would normally talk on the situation or the scenario or even the whole comprehensive plan of certain towns in the United States. However, I would always connect that information back to Mongolian situation or scenario. That way I was/am able to think what I could do when I get back to Mongolia. I started making notes of different things that I should keep in my mind as a professional planner.

My sponsor Rotarian Marc Watkins helped me to prepare for my study in the United States tremendously. He is the past president of Rotary Club of Ulaanbaatar. Since he was from New York City it was very helpful to understand the

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American culture, what to expect and what not to expect. I worked with him about two and a half years even before I applied for Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship. He's also one of the reasons that I am a Rotaractor. Things that he has taught about United States helped me a lot to understand people and their culture in America, especially in New York State. However, there are many more things that I don't know and I am eager to learn about those.



The day that I had visited Albany, NY, my host districts governor and my host counselor picked me up at the bus station. That was very welcoming. The district governor Bill Nathan has invited me to the Yankees game in New York City. We went to the Yankee Stadium in the Bronx, NY and it was very interesting to see one of those biggest stadiums and one of those greatest baseball teams - New York Yankees.



After a few weeks I got an e-mail from Rotary Club of Schenectady that they wanted me to speak at their club meeting. The specific date was set and my host counselor and I went to that meeting together. It was a great success. Thanks to Rotarian Dick Blackmer of Rotary Club of Schenectady.

My host counselor has been very helpful so far. He and I went to their club meeting to introduce myself and to meet my host clubs Rotarians. The exact date for me speaking at Albany Club is been set on November 16. One of the interesting activities as an Ambassadorial Scholar was to attend Northeast Link orientation for inbound and outbound Rotary scholars in this area. I met many different scholars from all over the world – South Korea, Japan, Australia, Italy, and of course United States. It was held in Holiday Inn in Boxborough, Massachusetts. Getting there on time early in the morning was quite adventurous. However, with good coordination between Rotarians who were organizing the event and my host counselor I made it there on time from Albany, NY without any problem. Lots of good practices of scholars have been shared among us. I find those very helpful.

My first impression about United States was very interesting. I came through Los Angeles to visit my friend there. In other words I made a stop in Los Angeles,

CA for a few days on the way to Albany, NY. My friend and I went to the Griffith Observatory. On the same day we decided to drive down to Las Vegas, NV. I have checked out how American entertainment city looked and it was a lot of fun. However I did not gamble at all which I am still happy about. Afterwards, I flew to New York City. And I spent there about two weeks discovering the capital of the world as they say. Eventually, it was time to go to Albany, NY. After all those big cities Albany, NY was a great contrast. I still find Albany as an interesting town to discover and learn as a planner. Adding on to that let me list down the cities that I have visited so far. Those are:

- Utica, NY
- Boxborough, MA
- Worcester, MA
- Amherst, MA
- Northampton, MA
- Providence, RI

Most of them were visited for American Planning Association's different chapters' conferences. As a graduate student in planning field there are many chances to attend conferences and those are always helpful.

The first few months of my host country have been great so far. I do enjoy living in the United States.

However, one of the things that I realized was I should know and learn more what to do so that could make my experience here even better and comfortable. Thanks to the Rotary Foundation and Rotarians here in my host country and back home for allowing me to study and experience the different part of the world.

### Visits Lake George Elementary School

In preparation for her arrival the entire school came together working collaboratively to design projects around Palatini's famous books. Allison Darbee, art teacher at Lake George Elementary, worked with each level to create different art projects. Students made clay sculptures of Palatini's well-known character "Oliver" who has terrible "bedhead", while other grades created their own variation of her famous character "Moosestache". In music class, Ken Schenk worked with his students on creating a tune to go along with a verse in Piggie Pie, which they shared with Palatini on the day of her visit. She was very impressed and loved the idea of putting music to her stories! In Physical Education, Heather Usher, read the authors unique version of the "Farmer in the Dell" and then taught children in the lower grades how to play the timeless game of "Farmer in the Dell". Of course with all the preparation going on throughout the school, you cannot leave out the sharing of Palatini's stories. Bridget Crossman, Library Media Specialist, pushed into classrooms and shared Palatini's stories with each of the classes. By the time Palatini arrived the school was buzzing with excitement.

On the day of Palatini's visit, she met with each level and presented a custom performance for each level. The author discussed everything from how she comes up with her ideas to how a book gets made. The students learned a great deal about creating good characters and the process of writing, but the thing that most students took away from her presentations was the experience of being read to by Palatini. As Jon Marchello, Intermediate II student said to Palatini, "You do voices so well, you should make cartoon movies." One of the highlights of the author visit was a special lunch with Margie Palatini. The author had lunch with 10 students, during which she shared some of the books she is working on, discussed details about her writing, and took part in question and answer type conversation with the students. The students created a special menu for Palatini based on different themes from her books, which she was delighted about.

After a busy day of presenting and enjoying lunch, Palatini signed and personalized over 200 books for the students of Lake George, which was a perfect ending


