## Happy New Year!

I am happy to report that I had three visitors over the New Year in Ecuador. My sister, sister-in-law, and my boyfriend made the trip from Albany out to Ecuador to take advantage of my tour-guide skills. It was a LONG trip, particularly because of the heavy storm, I think it was deemed a legitimate BLIZZARD, that hit the New York City area specifically. As many of you heard, read, or worse, experienced, some estimated that over 10,000 flights were cancelled. My boyfriend was one of the "lucky" ones – he only spent one night at JFK and flew into Quito about 36 hours late. My sister and sister-in-law spent two nights in JFK and a THIRD night at the airport in Ecuador's largest city, Guayaquil. It was a long trip and threw off some of the vacation plans, but considering, all were in good spirits and once in Ecuador jumped right into the holiday.



## Old Town and New Years in Quito

We spent several days in Quito and stuck around here for New Years. New Years is a fun time to be in Quito because of the "burning of the old year." This is depicted by rather large dolls stuffed with wood chips and wearing masks of figures from Nixon to Bart Simpson to Hawk or Bird like masks. These dolls are burned during the night of December 31<sup>st</sup>. We welcomed the New Year with a walk to a nice restaurant and some good food.



## Baños

For the first time since being in Ecuador, I took a trip to a 'tourist hot spot' called Baños, translated as Baths. It is a beautiful small town set in a valley and surrounded by awesomely green, tall mountains,

including the famous Tungurahua *Volcano*, which unfortunately was mostly covered by clouds while we were there. Needless to say, the town and landscape was stunning. Here, we took a tour and visited at least a half dozen waterfalls and crossed a river on what to US standards might be deemed a rusty suspended metal basket. The *Tarabita* fits about 25 people and is quite exhilarating. Check out the pictures. In addition, we did *canopying* or often called “zip lining” in English. This might be considered an extreme sport of sorts and, well, is terrifying but I managed to pull it off! I have included the great shots of the take offs of my sister, sister-in-law and boyfriend. It was really neat and I might be able to be convinced to do it again.



### Back to Normal

Folks here in Ecuador are back to work after the long holiday week. This means I will be continuing my interviews for my research and visiting Rotary clubs and participating activities. I have about 10 interviews left, which is great progress. I am here in Quito until March 1, wow have these nine months really passed by fast. Looking forward to really enjoy these last two months! ### Getting in all my Favorite Foods

Sadly, I have to start coming to terms with the fact that my time in Quito, at least for now, is coming to an end in March. What does this make me think about? That I need to get healthy helpings of all my favorite foods here before I am back in Albany! The fruits, the sugar cane sweets, the fried meats(!), soups and various fish dishes... all of which I am strategically making an effort to eat lots of before time runs out.

In addition, I need to make sure I get in all the famous museums and sites I have yet to visit. It is easy to take for granted special sites when you live here and you tell yourself

that ‘there is plenty of time.’ All of a sudden I am staring at only 6 weeks left. Lots to do! Many of my Rotarian friends have been good at directing me to what I need to see—museums and churches tend to top the list here! Stay tuned for more about getting these last spots in during my time here.

### *Hornado con Tortilla*

It is hard to name my one favorite Ecuadorian dish, but I would have give a shout out to a very typical dish called *Hornado con Tortilla*. It includes a Latin American staple, i.e., a good portion of potatoes as well as oven-baked pork, a salad with avocado and baked pig rinds. For some reason eating pork rinds seems acceptable for me in Latin America whereas in the states I would not even consider it. Pork rinds just make sense for this dish! In addition, one eats it with lots of hot sauce that really is not all that hot. The word *hornado* is related to the Spanish word for oven: *horno*. And the word *tortilla* might look familiar but the development of the dish has morphed from a flat patty-like tortilla of potato puree to just now being a healthy mound of potato puree or mashed potatoes. It is delicious.

The dish is prepared in bulk and often served in food markets for a few bucks. The meat is baked within the skin of a pig, head and all. The baked skin (pork rinds) therefore is really important to the overall dish. The entire pig is then displayed with the juicy meat for serving. Bright jalapeño peppers logged into the pig’s ears add color and character.



### The Middle of the World

I finally made it to one of Ecuadorian’s tourist hot spots – its Middle of the World site. Of course the country’s name suggests that, yes, the actual Equator passes through the country and I can vouch that it does. It is just about an hour bus ride outside of Quito to the site that is adored with a giant monument and plenty of spots to get some great photos. Here, you will see a classic tourist picture of me facing east to the camera with one leg in one hemisphere and one leg in the other. Sadly, since the construction of the Middle of the World site, with new GPS technology, we

have discovered that the middle of the world is actually hundreds of yards from the moment, but shhhh no one needs to know that.



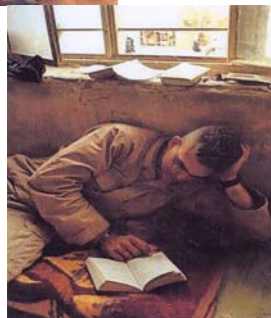

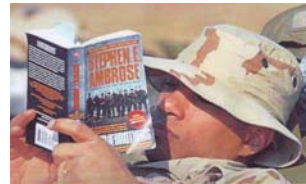

Ellen Keegan, a retired teacher, founded BOOKS FOR TROOPS in April of 2010, remembering the many times when books offered an escape from difficult periods in her life and wanting to offer the same escape to the troops.

*BOOKS FOR TROOPS sends care packages for the mind. We focus on one of the day-to-day sacrifices that the troops mention often – the lack of books.*

The troops often mention that one of the biggest enemies of their off-duty time is boredom. *Books can help to alleviate that boredom.*



Books also:

- 1) offer a means of escape from the horrors of what a soldier experiences daily;
- 2) bring them a sense of home;
- 3) produce a quiet way to reduce stress and relax;
- 4) offer a time to forget;
- 5) offer a distraction or something less stressful to think about;
- 6) use the mind in a non-life threatening way; and
- 7) give them the message that “you are not forgotten.”

We also include all forms of puzzle books in our book care packages, as well as coloring books & crayons, which are used to help the soldiers relate with the local children.
