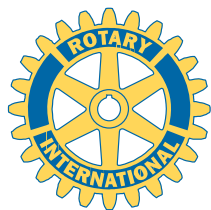

We are a diverse area. Three clubs are located along Highway 50 and the 4<sup>th</sup> in the mountains between Highways 50 and 80. Our memberships range from 61 to 13 and yet the spirit is more than alive and well in every club. It is a pleasure for me to serve and support the dynamic Clubs of Area 6.

**Cameron Park**

The Rotary Club of Cameron Park is, as always, up to its eyeballs in Service Projects both near and far. Last year saw the Club completing a 60-seat amphitheater to serve as an outdoor learning center. This project is affiliated with the Rotary Club's Community Observatory at Folsom Lake College's El Dorado County campus. This club also participated with the Rotary Club of Penn Valley in an International Service Project to provide new student desks for a high school in Costa Rica. The Club has also just received word that its multi-year Philippine Water Project was just completed in late 2011 and early 2012.

This year's efforts for the Cameron Park Club include a Community Service Project which will include the restoration of an historic spring at Veerkamp Park on the grounds of the Community Observatory. This project will include a gazebo type structure to compliment the grounds and area.

The Club's impending International Service Project will be a joint venture with the Rotary Club of Cartago, Costa Rica. This project includes the renovation of an existing shelter for indigenous Indians in a nearby mountainous region of San Jose, Costa Rica. A brand new second shelter will also be constructed. The natives come down to the outskirts of town monthly to sell and trade goods as well as to receive health care. They travel on foot for 8-12 hours each way from their mountain villages in order to spend the night in what is a currently inadequate and dilapidated shelter.

The Cameron Park Rotary Club is now in the process of approaching other District Clubs to obtain partner Clubs for this International Costa Rican Service Project. One of the reasons the Club selected a project in Costa Rica is because it is relatively convenient and it allows Club members to be able to travel to the site and physically participate.

**Georgetown Divide**

Georgetown, chartered in 1948, is located on the Georgetown Divide and has a rich mining history. The Divide is a destination for equestrians, boaters, fishermen, and jeepers tackling the world famous Rubicon Trail.

Club President Mike Monroe leads a membership involved in restoration of historic mining equipment and assisting in community service projects such as a Kid's Fishing Derby in June and a Santa Visit Program in December. Fund raisers include a BBQ and Street Dance in June, Margarita Booth at the County Fair in June, Hamburger Booth at Founder's Day in September, an Auction in November and a Crab Feed in February of each year. **Placerville Rotary**

Placerville Rotary has been busy this year achieving its number one service goal of completely renovating Placerville Rotary Park. The project, conceived by Rotarian Ron Thompson, includes renovation and expansion of the restrooms and snack bar areas, and replacement of aging bleachers, lighting, concrete walk ways, and picnic grounds. All of the new construction is 100% ADA compliant. Placerville Rotary and members of the local business community have contributed \$120,000 to make this project successful, and ready for the 2012-13 Little League opener!

Additionally, our club recently hosted the 2012 Bon Voyage fund raiser. The event was attended by over 400 guests, and netted over \$25,000. Proceeds are earmarked for the funding of youth activities and the Placerville Rotary Park renovation project.

In closing, the seventh annual Placerville Rotary Lobster on the River fundraiser is being planned for fall of 2012. It is an absolutely exquisite affair, with guests dining on steak and lobster along the shores of the beautiful American River in Coloma. 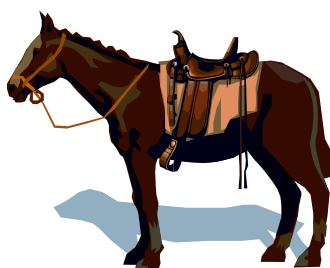

**District 5190 Interact Students Conduct Clinic in Rural Mexico**

Members of the Nevada Union High School Interact Club in Grass Valley have returned from a week in the mountains of Colima, Mexico where they participated in a literacy and dental project for children in local schools and migrant camps.



The 22 students were accompanied by Jim Adams, Interact adviser for the sponsoring 49er Breakfast Rotary Club of Nevada City; Lindy Beatie, the club's president-elect; and a small group of parents.

They traveled 1700 miles to the tiny town of Cofradia, in the State of Colima, north of the capital city of Colima.

At 4000 feet, Cofradia sits in the shadows of the active, 14,000-foot Colima Volcano.

During the Feb. 18-25 trip, the Interact students visited several schools and migrant camps, providing books and showing local children, including migrant farmworker children, how to brush their teeth. They administered fluoride treatments and provided vision and health information.

Their visit was part of an ongoing program called Project Amigo, a non-profit organization which is sponsored by Rotary and was founded 25 years ago to encourage local children to live healthy lives and pursue higher education. This was the third NUHS Interact Club visit to the area.



Nevada City resident and NUHS freshman Eden Baker, daughter of 49er Rotarian John Baker, participated for the first time. She said the visit was gratifying, educational and humbling.

“People in Nevada City say that times are tough and they don't have anything,” Baker said. “There, the people live in shacks with dirt floors, and they really don't have anything. But the people are so happy and grateful. They're proud of who they are and what they have.”

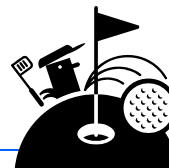
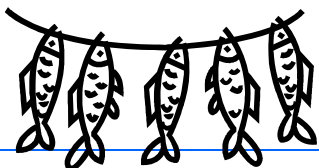
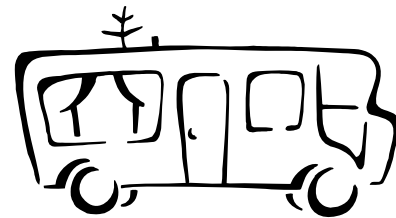
Rotary D5190 Family Weekend

**The Nevada City Rotary Club's Special Foundation Fundraising Programs –By PP Bob Buhlis**

President Carolyn Inglis of the Nevada City Rotary Club purchased three cowboy boots after the 2010-11 Conference Rotary Round-up dinner. Two of them, one adult and one child size, have been used to collect loose change for the club's "Give Polio the Boot" *End Polio Now* program. The adult boot is placed at the weekly club registration table where members are encouraged to empty

their pockets and purses of loose change and place the coins (and bills!) in the

boot. The boot has also been placed at tables and counters at Nevada City Rotary events, such as a Christmas street faire in town, a Chamber of Commerce table top mixer, and at their annual Nevada County food booth fund raiser. The “baby boot” has been circulated at club meetings for additional opportunities to contribute. To date \$583.39 has been collected in our *Give Polio the Boot* campaign to support their commitment to RI.

To encourage every member to contribute to the Paul Harris Foundation, the Nevada City Rotary Club instituted

a *Keep the Change* program. Once a month, members are encouraged to pay \$20 at the lunch registration table instead of the regular \$12. At the end of the year, members who participated each month for twelve months with an \$8 a month donation will have \$4 added to their contribution which will qualify them as EREY and Sustaining Member Rotarians. About half of the membership is meeting their PHF obligation through the *Keep the Change* program.

The Nevada City Rotary Club also has a *Match It* policy. For every \$100 or more donated to TRF, a member receives points to match their dollars. This has been especially popular when RI has matched Polio dollars with points making a \$334 donation to Polio Plus with points between RI and the club to qualify for a PHF.

Additionally, the club selects a "Rotarian of the Month" - a member who has gone the extra mile with his or her commitment to Service Above Self on a project or event. The member is given 100 points towards their next Paul Harris and a Certificate of Appreciation.

**Rotary Club of Reno New Generations changes name to Rotary Club of Reno Midtown**

Reno Midtown’s members approved the change in their club name in response to Rotary International’s renaming of the Youth Services avenue of service to New Generations. The members hope that the name change will avoid confusing the avenue of service with the untraditional format of the Reno Midtown club. The club breaks the mold of a typical breakfast or lunch club by meeting Mondays at 6 pm at Bangkok Cuisine and other local venues throughout the community. [Check their website for locations.](#)
