Notes from the Rotary Trail...

Greetings Rotary Family,

I can hear you already, saying that Rotary is all about fellowship; the fellowship Rotarians enjoy at the weekly meetings, at work projects, at fund raisers, at special dinners, and so on. There, as at all conventions, the House of Friendship is a great place to meet and visit with vendors, Rotary Districts, International Projects possibilities, Rotary Action Groups, Rotary Partners, and **Rotary Fellowships**. I highly recommend that you take the time to look on the internet at the 61 or so Fellowship Groups that bring Rotarians of the same interest together from around the

world. I truly believe that this is one of the ways that Rotary facilitates peace and understanding in the world, and all the



while Rotarians are fulfilling Rule #1, “Have Fun!” The Fellowship Groups range from “A”: Amateur Radio, to “Y”: Yachting, and everything in between. It’s really quite incredible. If you don’t see a fellowship group that speaks to your particular fancy, the instructions on how to start a Fellowship Group are right at your fingertips. You know me, I’m already considering starting the “Rotary Fellowship of Wilderness Horse Packing Rotarians”. Are there any charter members out there?

Greetings from Area 4. Oh, you don't know where Area 4 is? Well from Elko, just head west on Interstate 80, pass Winnemucca, skip through Sparks-Reno, climb the hill to Truckee, keep going, head down the face of the Sierra Nevada Mountain range, and slip off Interstate 80 on to State Route 20 heading west. Finally some 36 miles later you are at the western edge of District 5190 and are greeted by the Rotary Club of Penn Valley, the western most Rotary Club in the District. Area 4 is in the heart of the gold country and the historic sites are everywhere. You couldn't find a better place to visit.

The area known as "Western Nevada County" or Area 4 boasts the highest density of Rotarians of almost any place in the world. Five Rotary clubs with a total population of 290 members, a vigorous Rotaract Club, two interact clubs and a Youthact club. All together represent a Rotary membership of nearly 400 and with only 60,000 residence in Area 4 that equates to one Rotarian in every 150 people. (In Reno that would require about 1446 Rotarians to have the same density, or in Elko about 313 Rotarians) So if you are in this Area 4 and you run out of gas just hold up a sign that says "Rotarian" and very quickly you will get help.

The five Rotary Clubs, are lead with the oldest being The Rotary Club of Grass Valley chartered in 1925, followed by The Rotary Club of Nevada City, chartered in 1935. Then there was a long dry spell until 1990 when the 49er Breakfast Club was formed, followed by the Rotary Club of Penn Valley and finally in 2002 the Rotary Club of Nevada County South was chartered in a celebration that probably topped any every held.

As you would expect the Rotary emblem can be seen everywhere. For the past 85 years Rotary here has been doing good works in Western Nevada County and leaving behind a small emblem of their effort. The five area presidents meet monthly to coordinate work and events to maximize the effort and lessen the duplication of events on certain dates. Also the five clubs coordinate the efforts of Polio

Plus and work in harmony with one another to inform and do our part in helping to eradicate polio in the world.

In April the five clubs of Area 4 banded together to accomplish one of the largest work parties ever attempted in Western Nevada County. Nearly 250 Rotarians, Interactors, Rotaractors, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-Hers, and FFA members descended on the Nevada County Fair Grounds, to do a major clean-up, tree planting, painting, re-roofing project that has made the most beautiful fair grounds in America, even more beautiful. Lead by the Rotary Club of Grass Valley, it was a day of great accomplishment and great pride.

So, if you're heading west on Interstate 80 to come to the Lacy J. Dalton concert on Friday August 24, 2012, a benefit for our Rotary friend, Mike Johnson, just keep going and take that State Route 20 exit and visit the heart of the "Gold Country" and Area 4 where Rotary always welcomes you. And if you run out of gas, just hold up a sign that says "Rotary" and help well there before you can say, "Wow, darn nice country here in Area 4"

Scott Kellerman Receives Top Rotary Award

Longtime Nevada City physician Scott Kellermann, MD, has received one of the highest honors bestowed by Rotary



International, the Rotary “Service Above Self” award for exemplary humanitarian service.

Dr. Kellerman, a member of the 49er Breakfast Rotary Club of Nevada City, received the award on Saturday night (May 19) at the Rotary District 5190 Conference attended by several hundred people at John Asquaga’s Nugget in Sparks, Nevada. The award was presented by Jerry Hall, past vice president of Rotary International.

During the evening Dr. Kellerman traced his involvement in Uganda, from living and working in tents, to building a 112-bed hospital, schools and water and sanitation projects. The Kellermann Foundation has received local and international Rotary support.

“There is no one more deserving of this most prestigious Rotary International Award than Scott,” said Larry Meek, president of the 49er Breakfast Club of Nevada City. “I speak on behalf of my fellow 49er Rotary members when I say we are proud that one of our own was chosen.

“Scott, with the help of his wife, Carol, is an inspiration to Rotarians worldwide. His perseverance and dedication to this successful humanitarian effort has received the recognition it deserves.”

A longtime family practitioner in Nevada City and a former chief of staff at Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital, Dr. Kellermann continues to travel to Uganda, provide medical care and raise funds for the Batwa population. Over the years, his efforts have served more than 100,000 people.

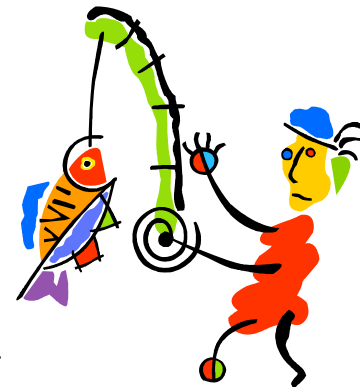
You can start planning now for the [2013 Rotary International Convention](#) which will be held in Lisbon, Portugal June 23-26, 2013.

The GSE Team will be traveling to India this January. Our District GSE Chair, Martha Greene, is beginning the recruitment process for the Team Leader. Details: In January 2013 our district will exchange a Group Study Exchange team with Rotary District 3150 in Southeast India. The major cities in that district are Hyderabad, Kamareddy and Gajwel.
