Notes from the Rotary Trail...

I was sitting here trying to remember what the month of May was in the Rotary calendar. I just couldn't come up with it, so I gave in and grabbed the faithful District Directory, turned to the pink pages in the back, and there it was...May is "**Attend District Conference Month**".

What, you don't believe me? Go look!

Okay, Four Way Test #1 failure here, but, May should be "Attend District Conference Month". I think it's a great idea and here are several reasons why:

1. The District Conference is about Rotarians, clubs, successes and celebration. (It's surprising that so many Rotarians are not interested.)
2. The District Conference has been promoted at the DG's official club visit, at District Leadership meetings, at PETS, at District Assembly, by mail, postcards, and email. (One often thinks that all the promo is for naught.)
3. District Conference is a good way for newer Rotarians to see the bigger picture and internationality of Rotary International. (Why doesn't club leadership promote this value and educational experience?)

The above are my personal thoughts. Let's take a look at what Rotary International has to say about the District Conference. We're in the 2010 Rotary International *Manual of Procedure*, (MOP), page 53. The first thing one notes regarding the District


Conference is that it is "required" by RI that every district has a conference every year. Next the MOP defines the "purpose" of the conference:

Purpose

The common purposes of the district conference are to bring together **all** (emphasis added) Rotarians in the district to:

1. Recognize the service projects and programs of the district,
2. Inspire Rotarians to greater involvement in service,
3. Share a vision of Rotary beyond the club level,
4. Enjoy a memorable fellowship experience, and
5. Provide opportunities to interact with Rotary leaders.

Let's now take a look at how these common purposes will be fulfilled in this year's "*Back to the Future in Rotary*" District Conference.

My three year term as Assistant Governor for Area 7 are coming to a close. I would like to acknowledge the clubs and Rotarians who have always been gracious and helpful to me. I have made a lot of new Rotarian friends during this time. I have especially enjoyed watching and being a very small part of all of the meaningful and significant contributions our four Rotary clubs have made to our Amador County communities. Thank you for that opportunity.

Area 7 consists of four Rotary clubs in Amador County: Jackson, Amador Upcountry, Ione, and Plymouth-Foothills. Again, this year the four clubs worked together in many community projects. Dictionaries were provided to all the 3rd graders in Amador County. All clubs continue to help the Interfaith Food Bank and Christmas to Remember to help our county during these tough economic times. Last year the four clubs sent 8 RYLA students and this year we are sending 10 students to RYLA.

The Jackson Club is the oldest club in Area 7 and they are celebrating their 60th Anniversary this year. They have selected “60 Years Strong” as the motto to celebrate this milestone anniversary. Last month the Jackson Club held their Foundation Dinner and had 9 new Paul Harris Fellows and 6 multi Paul Harris Fellows. They are the first club in Area 7 to have a Bequest member. Jackson is 100% EREY, 100% Sustaining, and 100% Paul Harris Fellow.

The Jackson club continues to be heavily involved with the Amador County Fair where they have a Wine Booth, Margarita Booth, and handle the Destruction Derby which is an event that is sold out every year. For years in October they have held a Bowlathon that is a major fundraiser for many community groups. Amador Lifeline was the recipient on \$3,896 from the Jackson club; half of the donation was from a Rotary District Simplified Grant. This money was sufficient to purchase six phone units used by the public to maintain independence rather than being at a nursing facility.

The Jackson club converted their International Project, Train the Trainers in the Use of Solar Cookers, into a Community Service Project. They trained local food banks and homeless shelter volunteers in the use of solar cookers and how to train others. As a result, solar cookers are now in use by needy individuals in two counties.

The Amador Upcountry Club continues to be very involved with the upcountry area of Amador County. The club has two major fundraisers each year: a crab feed and golf tournament. Involvement with the Food Bank continues through the collecting and delivering food each week to the food bank and local church. With two elementary schools in their community the club is very involved with Literacy with reading to the students in each school and donating the books that are read to the schools. The club continues to give support internationally to Kenya and conducts a sweet potato pie sale to help fund their commitment.

The Mollie Joyce Park baseball diamond the Upcountry Rotary Club renovated over the past several years was completed, dedicated and officially name “Rotary Field”.

During the Governor’s visit the Upcountry Club presented three Paul Harris Fellows. Upcountry has added two new members with a third in process. The Upcountry Club will achieve EREY this year. The Club was responsible for the Area Music Contest this year and it was a very successful event. The club continues to award high school scholarships.

The Ione Club continues to be a viable support club to the community of Ione. This year they have changed the format of their meetings to encourage members to bring their guests for more fun and fellowship. They have a dinner meeting on the first Thursday meeting with all other weekly meetings at noon on Thursday. This has been supplemented by booking speakers for evening meetings that may have greater appeal. These included Jean Irwin, Kevin Riggs from KCRA 3, and Dr. Bill Wittich. As Assistant Governor I have attended several of their evening dinners and can attest to the great programs and the energy that the club has. The Club was responsible for the Area Speech Contest this year and it was a very successful event.

One of the goals for the Ione club was membership. To date, they have 6 new members and anticipate 2 to 4 more new members by June 30th. The club contributed \$70/member to meet their third year commitment to the Bill Gates Annual Polio Plus program. They also contributed \$80/member (\$2,080) to the Rotary Polio Plus program. The club qualified for recognition for the District by meeting the EREY and average over \$200/member giving goals.

The Ione club holds three annual fundraisers: Crab Feed, and Cow Chip Bingo. These funds provide monies that

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Service projects will be the focus of the displays in the House of Friendship, will be recognized and awarded during the “Call for Recognition” awards, and will be common table talk during meals and times of socializing. Programs of the district will get attention via the Speech and Music contests, RYE and Interact attendance and involvement, keynote speakers, and breakout sessions.

Inspiration for greater involvement in service comes from our inspirational keynote speakers, the project displays in the House of Friendship, Rotarians sharing ideas and interests during fellowship, and spending time with the youth and all their energy.

Gaining a vision of Rotary beyond the club level is of paramount importance for an international organization. Listen to speakers share of Rotary service projects and the lives changed in faraway lands. Engage in conversation with the RYE students and the Group Study Exchange team. Visit with the Rotary International President’s Representative. Visit the project displays in the House of Friendship. Any or all of these activities broaden the Rotary vision.

We know a “memorable fellowship experience” awaits everyone who attends “Back to the Future in Rotary”. Let’s see...the High School Prom on Friday night. The “Enchantment Under the Sea” dance on Saturday night. Five meals and their accompanying times of socializing, the DG Hospitality events (which are open to all), sharing in the excitement of awards and recognition, and certainly the “House of Friendship” opportunities all point to fellowship, fellowship, fellowship.

Interaction with Rotary leaders will be maximized this year with our decision to hold all hospitality events in the ballroom foyer and House of Friendship rather than in private suites. Every Rotarian will have ample opportunity to meet and visit with the keynote speakers, the RI President’s Representative, and many other leaders in Rotary.

In case some of you have missed the list of keynote speakers who will be on hand to inspire and challenge us at the conference, let me share again. We have Dr. Scott Kellerman, founder of the Kellerman Foundation and champion for the health, education, and rights of the displaced Batwa Pygmies in Uganda. We have Brian Shul, severely injured

Vietnam War veteran who, overcoming great adversity, became a pilot of the infamous SR-71 Blackbird. We will be moved by Paul Kingsman, former Olympian and motivational speaker. We will consider “Our Story” with Rosemary Aragon on Sunday morning. Finally, we have the honor of having Rod Thomsom, RI President’s Representative, from British Columbia, Canada, who will share Rotary with us on several occasions.

I point all this out because it’s become evident that somewhere along the line I have had an unintended career change (without the accompanying salary increase). My new classification might read “Rotary Dentist” because I’ve discovered that motivating Rotarians to partake in district conference is akin to, if not even harder than, pulling teeth. But here I am, one last time. Actually **the** last time, I promise you, to say on behalf of our talented and tireless District 5190 Conference Chair and Committee, that the upcoming conference and celebration is for you and about you. As stated in the *Manual of Procedure*, the conference is for **ALL** Rotarians. It’s just around the corner so register now, on-line, and join us May 18-20 at John Ascuaga’s Nugget for a great time of time travel.

are returned to the community throughout the year. The steak & Lobster dinner net was \$8,388 and the Crab Feed net was over \$15,000 with a sell-out at 453 tickets. The Cow Chip Bingo fundraiser is coming up in May. So far this year the club has made \$14,890 in donations to name just a few organizations: Ione Picnic Association, Ione PD canine program, Ione Veterans Park.

The Ione club is changing out all of the lights from the previous District Simplified Grant project to LED lights to save energy and money. Over \$1,000 was spent to purchase the new lights. The current DSG project this year is to do a makeover of the library in Ione. The club has raised \$8,000 to go with the \$2,000 DSG, and the project will commence on May 4th.

The Plymouth-Foothills Club executed their first District Simplified Grant for permanent benches and tables for the new community financed play structure at Plymouth Elementary School. The club runs the farmers' market at McGee Park on Main Street in Plymouth on Thursday evenings in August and September. They will be sponsoring a outgoing RYE student this year and will be accepting a young lady from Germany arriving in August.

The Plymouth-Foothills club has added two new members this year. Every quarter the club holds at least one evening, social occasion. These have included a President's potluck—first for hopefully an annual event, a holiday/Christmas party at a restaurant owned by a member, and their Charter/Foundation night, at another member restaurant. The club continues to have excellent programs.

On going activities for the Plymouth-Foothills club have included: Amador County Fair steak sandwich booth, the annual Plymouth Flea Market in May, Plymouth 4th of July parade, Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets for the unfortunate. For last months Rotarians at Work Day they cleaned the public cemetery in Amador City.
