Area 5 is the easiest assistant governor assignment in District 5190. Area 5 consists of 3 rotary clubs serving Auburn and the surrounding area. They are within a seven-mile radius. They are the Rotary Clubs of: Auburn, Auburn Gold Country, and Auburn Daybreak. Transforming the world in our local area and leading their clubs to excellence for 2011-12 is our presidential line-up: Auburn Rotary – Mitch Hanna, CEO of Auburn Sutter Faith Hospital, James “Jimmy” Mullinex, owner of the Master Technicians, and last, but certainly not least, Auburn Daybreak (small but mighty!) Dennis Williams, retired. Two of our Presidents are second-timers – Mitch and Dennis. They took to heart Cliff Dochterman’s speech “If I could be President again”. Thank you all for your service to your community through Rotary.

The close proximity of our clubs allows us to have meetings on a monthly basis. This provides a cohesive unit and good fellowship, too! It gives us a strong foundation for the clubs to support and collaborate with each other for community projects, events, and marketing. Area 5 has a great group of presidents that want to continue and expand on the theme of mutual support and the promotion of Rotary ideals in our community. Thank you, Bruce, and for the previous area presidents, for setting up the framework for these partnerships to be established and nurtured.

There are several ways the community spirit and partnerships are highlighted by the area clubs. One is done through sponsorships of our major events and programs. The clubs support Rotary events through cash sponsorships, attendance and/or participation at the event, and promoting all the good things Rotary accomplishes. The clubs partner to highlight Rotary in the local area along with club activities and events in a one-page spread in the local newspaper each fall.

The Rotary Clubs of Auburn, Gold Country and Daybreak partner and collaborate with the local Speech and Music contests. Gold Country Rotary Club takes the lead in the Speech contest and Auburn Rotary Club takes the lead in the Music contest. The clubs collectively provide the cash

prizes and participate as judges. Our area has also taken leadership roles at the district level for the Speech and Music contests at the District Conference.

The Area 5 clubs are excited this year to partner with Area 4 clubs to implement R.E.G.L.E. – Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership Experience. This program is expanding the eighth grade leadership program piloted in Reno to the Nevada County/Auburn areas. Over 40 students, representing 9 middle schools, will have the opportunity to learn more about themselves and each other. They will expand their leadership tool kit to lead where others are sure to follow. We are building our Rotary alumni one student at a time. Area 5 is sponsoring 12 students from 3 middle schools in the local area. Several of the area’s RYLA graduates will be counselors for this program. Thank you, Mike Johnson and Dean and Rochelle Whellams, for this fantastic opportunity.

New Generations month is a great month to highlight the Area 5 clubs. Each of these clubs emphasize youth and youth programs. Annually these clubs sponsor 6 RYLA students. RYLA district leadership and counselors has long been a standing tradition in Area 5. Auburn Rotary actively participates in the RYE program sponsoring 1 outbound and 1 inbound student annually and participates in RYE at the district level. High school scholarship programs are a major recipient of the areas fundraisers. Scholarships range from \$20,000 - \$30,000 annually. Auburn Rotary has a special fund established to assure a strong on-going scholarship program. Auburn Rotary sponsors Placer High Schools Interact Program. Each club in Area 5 emphasizes youth literacy programs – giving books to local schools and Boys and Girls Clubs, Apple Dumpling programs, Born to Read, Read to me programs with the schools and Boys and Girls Clubs, and more! If you view the budgets of these clubs, you will see sponsorships of many community youth programs. Area 5 clubs realize that youth are our future leaders.

You can see just a tip of the iceberg of what these three clubs in Area 5 accomplish in our community. But you question “How can they make that happen?” The answer is the major fundraising events!

The year begins with the Rotary Club of Auburn’s 29<sup>th</sup> annual “Spirit of the Community” BBQ. This year it will be held on Friday, September 16, 2011 from

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5:30 – 8:30 at Auburn Gold Country Fairgrounds. It is a family event with rock wall climbing, face painting, jump house, and raffle and auction items! Oh, and the food. OMG, if you have not tasted the world famous Auburn Rotary BBQ chicken, tri tip and salmon, you have not tasted BBQ. An event with over 1,000 people realizing revenues of \$40,000 plus.

We then move into October with the critically acclaimed 24<sup>th</sup> annual Oktoberfest hosted by Gold Country Rotary. This year it will be held on October 21<sup>st</sup> at the Gold Country Fairgrounds. They will serve traditional German dinner Bratwurst sausages, pork chops, sauerkraut, & more, along with Spaten German beer. Entertainment you won't want to miss with Oktoberfest music & folk dancers. There will be more music to rock your world! Join the over 500 people to have a great time!

## Sierra Foothills Rotarians Conduct Dental Clinics in Papua, New Guinea

Members of the 49er Breakfast Rotary Club of Nevada City will travel to Papua New Guinea in October to conduct free dental clinics in the schools founded by the late WW II veteran and philanthropist Fred Hargesheimer.

Hargesheimer, a longtime Sierra Foothills resident, was a U.S. Army Air Corps pilot who was shot down by Japanese forces in 1943. He parachuted to safety and survived 31 days in the jungle before he was rescued and protected by local villagers. Over the years, Hargesheimer returned to Papua New Guinea more than 40 times, where he built schools and economic opportunity for the people who saved his life. His work is chronicled in his book, *The School That Fell From The Sky: a WW II Pilot's South Pacific Tale of Grit and Gratitude*, which has been described as one of the best stories of the Pacific War.

Known to the native villagers as "Mastah Freddie (Master Freddie)," Fred Hargesheimer, lived in Grass Valley from 1978 until 2010 when he moved to Nebraska to be with family. He died Dec. 23, 2010 at age 94. He had sold his small Grass Valley farm and vineyard in 1995 and it has since become the Sierra Starr Vineyard. Larry Meek, president of Nevada City's 49er Breakfast Rotary Club, traveled to New Britain Island, Papua New Guinea, in April to make advance arrangements for the club's international project. "I think Fred would be very pleased to know that we are carrying on a part of his legacy," said Meek, who visited both schools built by Hargesheimer; the Hargy International School at Ewasse, and the second at Noau, near the site of Hargesheimer's plane crash. Meek also visited the Hargy Palm Oil Plantation, the region's largest employer.

"Our project began when Fred was here," said Meek. "We asked whether anyone had done a dental clinic at his schools and he said no. "We told him about our club's dental clinics in Mexico, Nepal and Uganda. He said it would be wonderful." Papua New Guinea is located in the southwestern Pacific Ocean, north of Australia. The nation includes the eastern half of the island of New Guinea and numerous offshore islands, including New Britain

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Island. It is one of the least explored countries on earth, culturally and geographically, with most people living in traditional villages. Many live in extreme poverty on less than \$1.25 per day. Forty-Niner Rotarians, spouses, dentists from other clubs and other volunteers make up the 16-member dental clinic expedition. Local Rotarian participants include Mike Ferguson, Ann Hendricks, Harry Auld, Hal DeGraw, Howard Wilson and dentists Barry Turner and Steve Leighty. The project begins Oct. 11 after the group arrives on New Britain Island, via Brisbane, Australia. The volunteers will stay and conduct eight days of dental clinics at the Hargy Plantation in Bialla. Dentists will also visit the Hargy School at Noau, about five hours distant. The volunteers will provide free dental checkups, fillings and extractions as necessary. Participants are each paying their own way at an approximate cost of \$4000 per person. Project support includes \$7000 from 49er Rotary's international project budget, \$1000 from the Granite Bay Rotary Club, \$1000 from the International College of Dentists, and numerous donations of supplies.
