The 2016 Council of Legislation enables us for our 2nd century of service

While the enactments adopted by the 2016 Council increase clubs' flexibility in meetings and membership categories, they don't permit clubs to deviate from Rotary's essential elements:

- We are still business, professional, and community leaders. Our qualifications for membership have not changed.
- The Object of Rotary, our basic tenets, has not changed.
- Our essence statement — join leaders, exchange ideas, and take action — have not changed.
- Our values of fellowship, integrity, diversity, service, and leadership have not changed.
- The Four-Way Test, one of our most important distinguishing features, has not changed.

The changes the Council did make are not a threat to the quality of Rotary's membership. Instead, they empower clubs to adapt to a changing environment to remain relevant in our **second century of service**.

Our Service Directorate at the District level

For a number of years our District has been working on our Rotary District's Strategic Plan. Over time this plan and its component parts are modified. Service is one of the Core values. Service for us in Rotary is described as "Fostering a culture ... to address the needs of others." At the District we currently have 3 experienced Rotarians who are

These 3 Rotarians are available to encourage, inspire and support District-led, multi-club led and individual club service projects through chair and committee support, educational workshops focusing on service, team meetings, individualized support & consultation as needed. Indigenous Focus

As responsible for this area of service, Janet McLeod has been actively involved. The Rotary Club of Peterborough Kawartha where Janet is a member will be hosting the third annual Adventure in Understanding. This year a 3rd canoe has been added and 24 people will participate. Clubs sending students include Val D'Or, Yarmouth & Gravenhurst. As well there will be 4 new Canadians in the trip.

Janet is also looking for 4-5 Rotarians to sit on her Committee. In the past few months she and Don Watkins, a member, have spoken to the Rotary Clubs of Gravenhurst, Bracebridge Muskoka Lakes and Peterborough Kawartha. She has also encouraged all Clubs in the District to let her know what indigenous project they are taking on.

Janet continues to represent District 7010 on the HIP (Honouring Indigenous Peoples) Board in Toronto.

Rotary Fellowships: Mixing passion, friendship, and service

Friendship is one of the top reasons members join and stay in Rotary. To boost these ties, Rotary Fellowships offer members, spouses and Rotaractors the chance to connect with one another while enjoying their favorite recreational or professional pursuits. Over 60 Rotary Fellowships cover interests from tennis to wine, marathon running to cooking, scuba diving to recreational vehicles, jazz to computers, and more.

Rotary Fellowships arrange regional and international events, contests, and meetings where members bond and build lasting friendships outside their clubs, districts, and even countries. By connecting Rotarians, family members, program participants and alumni with shared interests, the fellowships extend the Rotary experience beyond local communities.

The Rotary Foundation

Our Rotary Foundation in 2017 will have been in existence 100 years "Doing good in the world". Established in 1917 with a donation of \$26.50, The Rotary Foundation is dedicated to advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace. Through grants and other resources, we as Rotary members can develop sustainable projects that promote peace, fight disease, provide clean water, support education, save mothers and children, and grow local economies.

Rotary's top priority is the global eradication of polio. Rotary launched its polio immunization program, PolioPlus, in 1985 and in 1988 became a leading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative along with the World Health

Organization, the United Nations Children's Fund, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and more recently, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Rotary has contributed more than \$1.5 billion and countless volunteer hours to eradicate polio. Through 2018, every dollar Rotary commits to polio eradication will be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, up to \$35 million a year. Since the initiative began, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases a year to less than 71 confirmed in 2015.

Last year 17 of our Clubs in District 7010 took advantage of Rotary Foundation District Grant funding to assist with 23 local and international projects. Six of those Clubs (BEL, Huntsville Lake of Bays, North Bay Nipissing, Peterborough-Kawartha, Wasaga Beach & Peterborough) each completed and reported on 2 humanitarian projects while another 11 Clubs (Barrie Huronia, Barrie-Kempfenfelt, Bracebridge, Bracebridge Muskoka Lakes, Fenelon Falls, Gravenhurst, Haliburton, Hearst, Midland, Sudbury & Timmins-Porcupine) finished up and reported on a single but very worthy project. Congratulations to all concerned Rotarians! Somewhere people are better off thanks to your efforts.

This year District Grants are also available. My 3 years as District Grants Chair is now finished with Kim Giffen assuming the position effective July 1, 2016. Kim and I have done a number of training sessions together and with lots of enthusiasm she is now looking forward to receiving District Grant applications.
