Announcements: Colin MacKenzie: Habitat Youth council comes here often and one student, Kirsten Mangold, went on to study at Mount Alison where she has been named Athlete of the Year. The food donation last week went to Peterborough Youth Services and this week the recipient will be the Victorian Order of Nurses drop-in centre. Rick Storey brought along a show and tell which was a lending library with a Van Gogh theme painted by students at the Montessori School. Our District has an award for the best lending library and this one is in competition with fourteen others. The Peterborough Retirement Residence on Water Street will be the location of this one. On the Spelling Bee front he said that he is in need of five volunteers for the French Spelling Bee this Saturday at Trent from 7:45 to 9:15 am. He assured prospective volunteers that they do not need to speak French. Alan Ingram told us that on Saturday he and a number of Rotarians were involved in food packaging at the Wellness Centre. Each package feeds six people and costs about 27 cents per meal. 200,000 meals was the target for Saturday. Ken Tremblay said that two dozen people want invoices for dues but Ken would prefer the pre-authorized route and he urged members to register for that. Bruce Gravel mentioned that we have signage at the entry to the City on a list of all of the various clubs in Peterborough. We used the classic logo on the sign. He was also happy to see our Rotary Spelling Bee get tremendous support from CHEX and The Examiner. The Swimathon cheque presentation is in Snap'd magazine. The Rotarian magazine this month has an article outlining 20 things to know about Rotary and included the fact that Canada has the highest proportion of women in Rotary Clubs, apart from the Philippines. Bruce went on to let us know that information about the BEL golf tournament went out by email and that a sign-up sheet for the Tri-Club fundraiser at the Axe Club on May 7 was at the Registration Desk. Kerri Davies needs more volunteers for the Garden Show.

Happy Bucks: *Jason Stabler* is getting married this Sunday at The Pig's Ear and he noted that it was in the media a lot but he was not fined, and not fined for not wearing a pin. He also noted that a Clubrunner app is available for your mobile device. *Lloyd Graham* let us know the sad news that his mother cannot go home, he survived the launch of the French spelling bee on Saturday, and his team lost the old timers championship by two points. *Ken Tremblay* made a presentation at our Club and now it has been picked up and printed in a leading journal. *David Abramsky* was happy to be back after being away for six months.

Program: Bill Lockington, a local lawyer and superb photographer, gave us presentation on Business Succession Planning. Bill spoke about the transition of ownership within a family-owned business. Succession means the transfer of wealth, labour, management, and decision-making. There are one million small businesses in Canada which is 98% of all businesses, but less than 20% of family businesses will be transferred to other family members. He talked about notable family-business failures and the reasons for some of the failures. One reason is often that the number of people who rely on a family business broadens and the business cannot supply everyone. Other factors are a lack of preparedness, a sense of entitlement, and a lack of communication. There is a need for planning for succession using business principles and there is a lack of trusted succession advisors. Succession should be seen as a process and not a date or event. Following his talk Bill fielded questions from the audience.

The meeting was adjourned at about 1:25 pm.
