Announcements: Colin MacKenzie detailed where our recent leftover food had gone to various shelters and charities. Available Rotarians were invited to a build day on April 7 for the Habitat for Humanity home at 450 Wolfe Street from 9 - 12, when lunch would be provided by the recipient family. Eleanor Down said sign-up sheets for parking volunteers were on the tables for the Garden Show on April 13-15, which raised about \$4,000 for our club. This normally covered our Youth Exchange expenses, but would not next year (2018-19), as we were skipping a year on the program. Kevin Duguay said our Centennial Committee would meet soon, with those who had responded to his earlier messages. Willis Cleveland had been the first respondent.

**Program:** Lyn Kimmett and Vanessa Oake Hogan, cochairs of our 2018 32nd Annual Swimathon, provided wrap-up details. It appeared our club's largest - and wettest - fundraiser would gross just over \$51,000 this year, with a net after expenses of over \$48,000. **Bravo to all involved!** Lyn thanked all stakeholders and sponsors, including our premiere sponsor: Collins Barrow. Our top media sponsor was Corus Entertainment (CHEX TV, Fresh Radio, the Wolf). Various plaques

were presented at today's wrap-up meeting at 11:00 a.m., plus a cheque for 25% of the proceeds to Easter Seals. Peter MacLoghlin was the top fundraiser, raising \$3,470 from the 2 teams he headed. Team Mitchell was the best-dressed team. St. Anne's School was the top school fundraiser

Vanessa said she and her siblings were happy to have taken over from Carl. They greatly appreciated Rotary's ongoing support. She gave special thanks to Lyn, who was supposed to have retired as Swimathon Chair, but had to step up again.

Lyn thanked our 2 event photographers: Stephen Vass and Bill Crins. He said the event had 2 co-chairs at the start of the year, but both had to drop out due to work pressures, so he had to resume the chair. He thanked Jason Stabler and Mark Donohue for the work they had done at the start of the year. He repeated that **we will need a new Swimathon chair or 2 co-chairs next year,** as his doctor had ordered him to step down for health reasons. Next year's Swimathon date: February 15, 2019.

Rotarian Frank Parish, a polio survivor, told us what Rotary and the Swimathon meant to him. He always swam as a member of Team Rotary each year.

President Andi thanked all the volunteers from Century 21 who had participated. She led us in a standing ovation for Lyn for his dedicated hard work. She adjourned the meeting at 12:48 p.m.
