He said our Board would discuss donating for long-term aid for Fort McMurray at its June 8 meeting and will report back. Individual donations can be coordinated through Ken Tremblay. John Thomas was in London, Ont., due to the death of his mother. *Brian Wilson* asked the members to approve a Board motion to provide MusicFest with \$10,000 for the 2016 season; moved by him and seconded by Susan Mackle. The funds would come from sales of 50/50 tickets at MusicFest; we usually raised more than \$10,000. Motion passed.

Happy & Grumpy Bucks: (With all the negativity in the world today, do we really need Grumpy Bucks at Rotary?) Frank Bayliss was happy to have achieved his first par playing golf in the Seniors League last week. Linda Mitchelson was happy to have spent 3 weeks in Zambia working with Global Village/Habitat for Humanity to build a house there. Martin "Birdman" Parker was happy for 4 days spent birding (surprise!) at Point Pelee National Park and for assurances from Supreme Court Justice Michael Moldaver that teasing a certain local judge about the Leafs was not a jail-able offence. He was grumpy at not receiving his bee for helping with the Spelling Bees. Rick Storey thanked everyone involved in our 3 Spelling Bees. He had attended the Canadian National Spelling Bee in Toronto, because MCing our 3 local bees simply was not enough spelling for him. (Can you spell "obsession"?) Jim Moloney was happy that the Zoo's lonely male Takin now had a companion, a yearling bull. (They were hopeful of receiving a female soon.) He was pleased to have served on the Spelling Bee committee, being very impressed with co-chairs Rick & Kim. Kevin Duguay had just returned from a week in Jamaica, where he achieved approval for a new community centre in Treasure Beach and would also be working on a new retirement home there. Betsy McGregor was happy to have delivered a framed photo of our club to Supreme Court Justice Moldaver in Ottawa, for her nephew being appointed special ambassador for Special Olympics Soccer, and for Ann Whipper sitting at our head table. Art Turner entertained us with a golfing joke, which even the non-golfers understood.

Program: Cal "Pierre" Langman, resplendent in his authentic Voyageur garb (except for the hat which was stolen from Davy Crockett) introduced our speaker: Jeremy Ward, Curator of our Canadian Canoe Museum. He had been involved with the museum for 2 decades, leading many projects and programs including TV documentaries. He researched and led a team that built an authentic 36-foot birch bark Voyageur "master canoe". He welcomed Bill Morris, Chair of the Museum Board, and Ann Whipper, widow of museum founder Kirk Whipper, who had started the collection with a single dugout canoe. The word CANOE spelled out the museum's core values: Collection, Aboriginals, National, Organization, Experience.

Jeremy's slide show included their exhibit on Sprint Paddling, showing the evolution of racing canoes from the 1890s onwards,

including 2 canoes from multiple-Olympic Gold Medalist Adam Van Koeverden (Andi's step-son) in which he won gold at the 2004 and 2008 Olympics. The museum was currently restoring a canoe from the American Revolution, brought here after spending over 200 years in England. Peterborough was once the global centre for canoe manufacturing; the museum had the largest collection of manufacturing records from the Peterborough Canoe Company.

Last year, the museum had 26,634 visitors, 4,150 students & youth visitors, 514 Voyageur canoe trippers, and 10 weddings (including Kevin Duguay's daughter). Jeremy outlined plans for the new museum next to the Lift Locks, using an Irish firm's design with the largest green roof in Canada: 2 acres! Government approval for the build was now being sought. A capital campaign was coming. Audience questions included the potential hazard of dozens of canoes with neophyte paddlers and dozens of power boats in the narrow canal. Voyageur Stan "Jacques" Pineau thanked our speaker.

All Rotarians were invited to a brief ceremony in Del Crary Park immediately following this meeting, where Mayor Bennett would formally declare Rotary Week. President Alan adjourned the meeting at 1:30 p.m., with this program-appropriate saying: "In life, it's not where you go, but who you paddle with."
