And putting on his Assistant District Governor hat he presented Past President Bruce Gravel with a Presidential Citation from the DG for our Club's work last year. Joe McCulloch: Rotary will be working at the Foodbank at 4:45 tonight and probably retiring to The Porch and Pint afterwards to discuss further good work in the community. He also mentioned that the school breakfast program has been asked to provide 5 sandwiches daily for kids who don't have a lunch. We could use assistance to make these sandwiches. It'll only take about 15 minutes or so. Call Joe if you can help. Ken Tremblay: Was pleased to have attended the recent District 7010 Conference but was disappointed by our Club's low participation level. Think about the International Convention in Toronto. Also there is a leadership conference in North Bay in April 2018 for anyone who wants to learn more about how Rotary operates. Jason Stabler: Our BIGgest, wettest, wildest FUNdraiser, The Carl Oake Rotary Swimathon (32nd edition) occurs February 16th, 2018 at 7:00 AM at the YMCA. They need more committee members. There is a committee meeting on November 3rd at 7:30 AM at Ricky's All Day Grill. Jason is also our Social Media contact person. Send him pictures and info on Rotary stuff that you want on social media. If you are having problems with Facebook or other social media he'll be glad to help. Bruce Gravel: Thanked Rick for the award. Also advised that our 2nd biggest and driest (physically) fundraiser will be held January 27th, 2018 at PGCC. The auction committee was having a meeting directly after our meeting so if you're on the committee and this is the first you hear of it, then you missed it. Bruce also advised that the Paul Harris Award Night will be Nov 20th at PGCC.

**Programme**: Our guest speakers today were Lynn Zimmer, Executive Director of the YWCA, Meagan Laplante Executive Director of YES, Christian Harvey, Reverend & Director of The Warming Room and One Roof Community Ministry, and Bill McNabb Executive Director of the Brock Mission. The topic of our meeting was Housing, Poverty and Homelessness in Peterborough.

Lynn Zimmer advised that after using other buildings, having a purpose-built property was amazing. She thanked Rotary for their funding of the children's room but advised that due to overload, it was occasionally used as an emergency shelter. She felt the housing issue was very much an income issue. They deal with women and families. Women in general earn less than men and are more likely to be victims of abuse and violence. She is watching the pilot programs for a guaranteed income s she feels this has hope for alleviating housing and poverty problems for their clientele.

Bill Mc Nabb advised that the Brock Mission and Cameron House operate on a 24/7, 365 a year basis. They provide food and shelter as well as laundry facilities and clothing to those who need their services. Their clientele demographic has changed in the last 20 years. Initially they were mainly event/casual homeless. These are people, who due to a major event i.e. job loss, illness, find themselves unable to pay rent and have lost their home. They need temporary support and then get back on their feet and move on. Now their clientele is mainly "chronic" homeless. These are people who face mental health challenges or addiction problems. They face extreme challenges finding suitable safe, affordable accommodation. Brock Mission is in the process of tearing down their current facility and having a custom built facility with a 30 bed shelter mixing short and longer term accommodation.

Rev. Christian Harvey advised that the Warming Room is open from October to May and works with other shelters taking people they can't accommodate. The One Roof Community Centre serves some 7,000 meals per month. Regarding homelessness, most people think it is a problem caused by people making poor decisions while really the problem is insufficient income to acquire safe, secure housing. The community does not push its politicians to solve the problem so it continues. He also felt a guaranteed income would go a long way to solve the housing problem. The Ministry's housing program deals with landlords to acquire low cost accommodation and then provides it to their clientele.

Meagan Laplante told us that the YES shelter serves young people aged 16 to 20 as well families needing emergency shelter. They have noticed 77% increase in need for family accommodation. There are now more 16 to 18 year old individuals needing shelter while 5 years ago it was mainly 18 to 20 years, up to 12 months. Youth are provided with counselling and support and access to education to get their high school diplomas. They can always use food donations.

Questions: Rotarians asked how the shelters work with Peterborough Housing to accommodate their clientele. How is Brock funding their new building? Actually, Peterborough Housing will construct and own the new building and lease it to Brock Mission. Brock will however require funding for its leaseholds and will start a fundraising campaign soon. From whom do they receive their primary funding and who provides better support? The YWCA is primarily provincially funded and the province provides a higher level of funding than municipalities. One Roof is about 60% municipally funded and 40% community fund raising support. The YES shelter is municipally funded with community fundraising support for the transitional housing. Bill McNabb pointed out that the province closed its mental health "institutions" in 1998 without giving the inmates sufficient training to survive on their own in the community. They also did not give community groups such as shelters sufficient support to deal with the increase demand on their services.
