Our club received several awards at the District Conference. A Gold Presidential Citation from International President Ravi Ravindan for meeting 7 of 7 goals set by RI. (only 4 of 42 clubs in our district received the award. The District Governor's Achievement Recognition (only 15 of 42 received this award. In addition two Rotarians in our Club received the District Governor's Special Recognition Award. Congratulations to Assistant Governor Rick Storey and Past President Alan Ingram. *Colin MacKenzie* he was injured while giving a squash lesson to Lais. She accidentally hit him with a racket that slipped from her hand. Colin exaggerated the injuries and made her feel bad before fessing up that he hadn't received any lasting injuries. Today's excess food goes to the Peterborough Youth Shelter. Rick Storey - Spelling Bee committee will have it's first meeting Thursday Nov 24th at 4 PM at the YMCA. New members are welcome to join the committee. Also the Rotary Easter Seals Children's Christmas party will be Sunday December 12th. The party is for kids to age 18 with some type of disability. *Doug* Armstrong chair of the Programme Committee thanked his coworkers for their hard work that resulted in him receiving the Rotarian of the month award. Our meetings are booked through January with a few openings in Feb and March. If you have any idea for a guest speaker call Doug. *President Bruce* reminded us that we need donations for the Auction.

Programme: For the second week in a row our speaker was introduced by Secretary Ken "the farmer" Tremblay. In retaliation for something the Pres did Ken advised of some of the hijinks at the District Conference. It seems Constable Rick was trying to take breathalyser samples in the lobby of the Marriott. Our hippy President was trying to sell marijuana in the same lobby. Ken held up a copy of the book "Sully". In it Sully credits his training with helping him decide in 21 seconds from the thump of hitting geese on takeoff to starting his landing procedures on the Hudson River. And this was the tie in to our speaker Mason Fraser who is a professor of flight training at Seneca College at the Peterborough Airport. Mason began his aviation career with his Private Pilot License at Spectrum College in 2003. He graduated from Confederation College in 2006 with a Commercial Pilot License. He returned to Spectrum Airways as an instructor and eventually served as Chief Flight Instructor until joining Seneca as a professor in March 2011. Mason holds an Airline Transport Pilot License and a Class 1 Flight Instructor Rating. At Seneca he has held various positions, presently focusing on Multi-engine, Commercial and Instrument Flight phases of training. He also manages the Flight Instructor Refresher Course on behalf of Transport Canada and offered to professionals in the Aviation Industry through Seneca College.

Mason gave us a history of the School of Aviation which started in 1968 at Buttonville Airport. Initially a Diploma programme it became a Degree programme in 2003. They currently have some 19 aircraft and 6 flight simulators. The Peterborough Campus also has it's own Maintenance Facility and staff as well as classrooms, offices etc.

There are normally 200 people in various stages of the programme. Students spend the first two years at the Toronto Campus before coming to Peterborough for flight training. Students will receive a Private Pilot License, Night rating, Commercial Pilot rating, Multi engine qualification, Group 1 Instrument rating and a "frozen" IATPL (International Airline Transport Pilot Licence). Frozen means they are qualified and have written necessary tests but must have additional flying hours. They also

provide Crew Coordination Training, Air Taxi training and Jet Transition Environment Training.

State of Aviation Industry: Trust Public trust level is at a record high as safety levels are high.

Mandatory retirement age was set at 60 in 2011, but changed to 65 after appeals. Normally there are 12 to 18 openings due to retirements per year. The next few years are looking at some 600 new openings.

Safety Levels are currently very high.

Technology switching from dial gauges to "Glass Cockpit" which is basically computer screen where pilots can place "dials" anywhere on the screen to suit themselves. Seneca provides training on both types of instrumentation but all new planes are Glass cockpit.

Global Industry - lots of opportunity due to retirements and industry growth.

Meeting the needs: Seneca has established partnerships to ensure students get proper training. Partners include Aviation Accreditation Board, International AABI Accreditation. Partnerships with Air Georgian, Jazz Air and Sunwing give students direct entry into left seat positions. Selected Education. They partner with the Department of Defence to provide jet training to future fighter pilots.

The Future: Programme expansion including a possible Diploma program for students who don't require the Degree.

Obtain additional aircraft and simulators. Campus expansion. Mason answered questions on the cost of the programme (about \$5,000 per semester x 12), salary ranges for grads, percentage of women in programme (25 to 30 percent) and background checks.

Mason was thanked by Peter MacLoghlin who advised we would be making a donation to Sleeping Children Around the World in his name.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:15 with this quote from Oscar Wilde "Some cause happiness wherever they go, others whenever they go."
