Speaker: Mike Morgan, Langley School District Principal for Indigenous Studies, in charge of reconciliation.

Mike described reconciliation as the establishment and maintenance of trust and respect for relationships between aboriginal and non-aboriginal people. And he should know raised in Haida Gwaii as a non-aboriginal kid with white and indigenous relatives, Mike grew up speaking Haida and hearing family members from both cultures agree and disagree about the possibility of reconciliation.

He says reconciliation is a relationship we're all in and the best hope for it to work starts in the schools - with conversations that extend from the classrooms to students' homes. Many parents aren't comfortable hearing what their kids are saying, and some call Mike to complain - which, to Mike, is a great sign that the program is working, that discussions are taking place. Mike commended Rotary members Cecelia Reekie and Paul Guiton, who are part of the **Reconciliaction** group in Langley and work diligently on the admirably named reconciliaction.
