"While the speakers and small-group sessions present a lot of information about Rotary – the organization and what it stands for in the world — the main take-away message was that, in spite of the fact that there are 2.1 million members worldwide in 35,000 clubs, who volunteer 24.3 million hours a year, the most important part is what happens in each individual club.

doing the legwork.


Social Committee: March 30
