

HISTORY OF BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY

ORGANIZATION PERIOD

Jan. 14, 1981 to June 27, 1981

Bellingham Bay officially joined Rotary International the evening of June 27, 1981.

Our "charter night" was a festive occasion with many visiting Rotarians joining our own charter members at the Bellingham Holiday Inn. District Governor Chuck Wong of Richmond, B.C., presented us with our official charter from Rotary International, and then Jack Wagner, our charter president, individually recognized each of our charter members.

We were originally 30 in number. It was a night to remember. Much planning and activity went on long before the club's official recognition. The Bellingham Rotary Club, under the leadership of President Jim Caldwell, saw the need for a new club in Bellingham and started the momentum from which our club developed.

President Jim and Bellingham club members Dick Keating, George Graham and Harte Bressler provided us with expertise and encouragement as we began making plans. Originally, seven members were named by Bellingham Rotary to be the nucleus of the new club: Jack Wagner, Bob Swank, Roy Huartson, Bob Auld, Bob Rice, Richard Brumenschenkel and Bob Newell.

The first planning meeting was held Jan, 14, 1981 at the Elks Club. We began to learn about Rotary and to select charter members. Our goal was 30, which we reached before we applied for our charter.

One of our first actions was to add Harte Bressler to our growing nucleus. Harte was secretary of the Bellingham club and gave us some instant expertise in Rotary. Some of our early meetings were devoted to learning more about Rotary from such visiting Rotarians as then District Governor Chuck Wong, Past District Governor John Busted, Past District Governor Bill Keenlyside, Jim Caldwell, Curt Cortelyou, and Bellingham Rotary club incoming President Dave Nichols.

Agreeing on a name for our club took some careful deliberation. We also had, to decide when and where the club should meet. Our first meeting place was the Regency Room at the Leopold Hotel. This proved to be a fine location until Oct. 5, 1982, when, because of circumstances beyond our control, we were forced to move to the Leopold's Crystal Ballroom. This proved to be a short stay as the huge ballroom was not suitable for a club our size. After several "tryouts" in other locations we moved to our present location, Bellingham Towers' Washington Room, on Jan. 4, 1983.

**HISTORY OF THE FIRST YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY
July, 1981 through June, 1982**

Our first year, under the leadership of Charter President Jack Wagner, Vice-President Bob Swank, Secretary Treasurer Harte Bressler and board members Richard Brumenschenkel, Roy Huartson, Jack Keith, Curt Smith and Chuck Olson, was an outstanding one. Several important traditions were started. An excellent "Soundings" weekly newsletter was written by editor Jack Keith, "Bucks in the Bay," where members donate a dollar or more to honor their accomplishments or favorite sports team, developed into what continues to be a highlight of our meetings. The "rose sale," our major fund-raising event, was begun under the direction of Barney Yorkston and his committee. Our "classic" social events began with a family get together at Snow Water on Aug. 8, 1981, and a wine tasting party at Don Gustafson's on Dec. 2, 1981. The annual Christmas program with our wives and children also was instituted.

Perhaps the highlight of our initial year was the visit of District Governor Jack Hotel!. We definitely showed our "rookie" status: from the district governor swearing in of new member Laury Evans with right hand raised), to our crazy evening banquet at Sarducci's, where no one knew exactly what to do. Those of us who attended won't forget it.

HISTORY OF THE SECOND YEAR FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY July, 1982 through June, 1983

Our second year under the leadership of President Bob Swank, Vice President Curt Smith, Secretary/Treasurer Harte Bressler and board members Fred Haskell, Roy Huartson, Jack Keith, Don Gustafson and Chuck Olson was a growth year.

The club made an important decision to broaden its membership base. Jim Wells headed a special committee to develop a list of potential members from vocational classifications not represented in the club. The special efforts of the club to bring in new members were successful. Twelve new members joined Bellingham Bay Rotary that year.

Bellingham Rotary Club's Curt Cortelyou was District Governor in 1982-83. Harte Bressler doubled as the district secretary. The district conference was held in Bellingham in April, 1983. Bellingham and Bellingham Bay co-hosted the 500 Rotarians and their spouses who attended the conference. We all worked hard and put on what has been called "the best conference in years." Jack Keith received an award for the district's best club bulletin.

Our "classics" continued at Fred Haskell's (summer) and Canada House at Western (winter).

**HISTORY OF THE THIRD YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY
July, 1983 through June, 1984**

Our third year saw us shift into high gear. President Curt Smith, Vice President Harte Bressler and Secretary/Treasurer Bob Rice, with board members Jim Wells, Dave Ennen, Barney Yorkston, Don Gustafson and Fred Haskell continued to encourage membership growth.

Ten new members joined us as we reached a total of 54 members. President Curt attended the International Rotary Convention in Toronto. (It took us three years to raise the money!). Bucks in the Bay continued to grow . . . the traveling Peace Arch was mailed back to Canada . . . the summer/fall classic was held at Craig Smith's on Lummi Island under somewhat drippy conditions, the winter classic was a big success at Fred and Darcy Haskell's, the Huskies got preferential treatment. District Governor Norm Armstrong made his annual visit. Visitors flocked to our weekly meetings in the Washington Room as our reputation for having the best food and the most fun grew.

**HISTORY OF THE FOURTH YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY
July 1984 through June 1985**

Our fourth year continued to see healthy growth. With President Harte Bressler, Vice President Don Gustafson, Secretary/Treasurer Bob Rice, and Directors Jim Wells, Dave Ennen, Barney Yorkston, Dale Heisinger, and Bob Plumb. The club grew from 54 to 65 members, a rate of 20%.

There was once again great fellowship at the summer classic at the Haskell lake property, and the winter classic with wine tasting held at the Bradys. Bucks in the Bay kept flowing in with the able help of co-sergeants-at-arms Ted Czajkowski and Russ Van Buren.

District Governor Ralph Crawford paid us a very enthusiastic visit and gave our club very high marks for its involvement and effort on our projects. It was a great year for the clubs participation in the Rotary Foundation. A new first began in our club with 20 members each contributing \$50 for a Paul Harris Fellowship drawing. Paul Youssef was the lucky first. Roy Huartson and Harte Bressler were both surprised when they were made Paul Harris Fellows. Roy by his wife Anne and Harte by Metcalf, Hodges & Co. A very special Paul Harris Fellow award was made to Galen Biery at an evening Valentine's Day meeting with the wives at the Country Club. District Governor Ralph was on hand to take part. President Harte attended the International Convention in Birmingham, England while incoming President Don Gustafson prepared to do the same in Kansas City.

The club had the pleasure of hosting Chris Goddard, an exchange student from Australia. President Harte had his share of trouble with a wingless Eagle on the American flag.

The club contributed to the renovation of the local Boy Scout office and continued to sponsor the Galen Biery historical preservation project at Western Washington University in conjunction with the Pacific Northwest Study Center.

**HISTORY OF THE FIFTH YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY
July, 1985 through June, 1986**

The fifth year for Bellingham Bay Rotary Club was a year of firsts under the leadership of President Don Gustafson, Vice-President Chuck Olson, Secretary/ Treasurer Greg DePaul and Directors Laury Evans, Bob Newell, Jim Brown, Dale Heisinger and Bob Plumb and included:

- (a) The first Black Mouth Fishing Derby Fund Raiser;
- (b) Publication of the Roster, with photographs; and
- (c) Another outstanding year of membership growth from 65 to 76, or an increase of 17%.

Co-Sergeant of Arms Jim Wells and Bob Plumb kept fellow Rotarians on their toes on a weekly basis generating tremendous comradery and fellowship.

District Governor Mel Spowart paid us an early visit in October of 1985 and was quite pleased with the club's achievements and growth pattern. As usual we had our evening social event for ourselves and the District Governor, which was a rousing success.

Participation by club members was at an all-time high in the 1985-86 year at our numerous events, including the Summer Classic on the Nooksack River at Dick Metcalf's Summer retreat, the Winter Classic which involved a wine tasting party held at the Bob Plumb residence, new member orientation meeting held at Sarducci's Restaurant for all new members and, of course, our Black Mouth Fishing Derby and Rose Sale.

The Bellingham Bay Rotary Club again participated in the Rotary Foundation with its annual drawing where 20 members each contributed \$50 for the Paul Harris fellowship. Ron Buatte was the second year winner in this event. Chuck Olson attended the Rotary International Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada and treated the Bellingham Bay membership to a glowing report of Rotary International and the convention itself.

The club donated funds to numerous needy causes in the area and performed one of the few hands-on work functions in conjunction with the Young Life Organization, consisting of tree trimming and cleanup along the Boulevard.

The 1985-86 year was concluded with two major events, including the noon meeting excursion tour to the Intalco aluminum plant and the four club joint evening meeting to bring in the incoming officers and directors of the four clubs in Whatcom County as well as inducting Dick Metcalf as the new incoming District Governor.

**HISTORY OF THE SIXTH YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY
July 1, 1986 through June, 1987**

Our officers for the year were: President – Chuck Olson, Vice-President – Dale Heisinger, Secretary/Treasurer – Kevin Bryant. Board members were Don Gustafson, Bob Moles, Jim Brown, Bob Newell, Ted Czajkowski and Lawrence Evans. The club voted to add an additional officer so that the incoming President would not be Program Director the year before being president. Bob Plumb was elected as second Vice-President and Program Director for the 1987-1988 year.

Highlights of the year included a joint banquet of the four Whatcom County Rotary Clubs to install Dick Metcalf as District 504 Chief and to install new officers for each club. International Rotary President M.A.T. Caparas visited Whatcom County and another County wide banquet was enjoyed by all. The 504 District conference was hosted by Whatcom County North with an assist from the other three county Rotary clubs. Next year District 504 will be split into two equal districts.

Charitable funds were raised through our annual Rose Sale, Salmon Derby, Bucks in the Bay and Raffles to allow our club to make financial contributions to Rotary International Polio Plus program, Rotary Foundation, Whatcom County Museum, Operation Santa Claus, Western Center for Early Learning, Whatcom County Boys and Girls Club, Coalition for Child Advocacy, Bellingham District Middle School Leadership Conference, Western Washington Basketball program, and Young Life Leadership Conference.

As a result of contributions to Polio Plus, Bellingham Bay Rotary awarded three Paul Harris Fellowships. Recipients were Jim Caldwell, Jack Wagner and Jim Wells.

Bellingham Bay Rotary hosted exchange student Rikke Peterson and her active attendance at our meetings was appreciated by our club. We sent Amy Wellman to Japan under the exchange program and Hunter Hodge was chosen to go to Brazil next year.

President-Elect, Dale Heisinger, and his wife, Jane, represented our club at the Rotary International Convention at Munich, Germany in June and he was installed as President July 7, 1987.

**HISTORY OF THE SEVENTH YEAR
FOR BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY Club
July 1, 1987 through June, 1988**

The seventh year of Bellingham Bay Rotary began with a reorganization of the Board of Directors, adding an additional member. The officers were: President, Dale Heisinger; Vice-President, Laury Evans; Program Chair, Bob Plumb; Secretary-Treasurer, Al Knutson; Past President, Chuck Olson. The Directors were: Club Service, Ted Czajkowski; Community Service, Brent Walker; Vocational Service, Byron Elmendorf; International Service, Bob Moles. Other members who contributed significantly to our weekly meetings were: John Sleeth, accompanist of our National Anthem; Gerald Baron and his Soundings editors; Mike Fournier and his Sergeant-at-Arms brigade; Tim Lann, our spiritual leader.

Thirteen new members were added to our roster including our first woman member, Orphalee Smith bringing our total membership to 84. Our attendance increased from 76% to 80%.

Our Rotary International commitment to eradicate polio worldwide generated a total contribution of \$6,000 with an additional \$3000 pledged through 1989. From these contributions, Paul Harris Fellowships were awarded to Barney Yorkston, Dave Ennen, and Ken Graham for the work they have done on behalf of our club. An additional \$1,000 was raised by the efforts of Roy Pearson (Fund-Raising chairman) and the generous donations of fellow Rotarians and contributed to the Rotary Foundation for which Bob Swank received an additional Paul Harris Fellowship Award.

Rotary's International Student Exchange was well received as we sent Hunter Hodge to Brazil and hosted Paul Therkelsen from Australia. Our commitment to our community continued as we allocated funds to the following:

1. \$140 scholarship to WWU Conference on Attention Deficit Disorder.
2. \$500 donation to Sehome High School in support of their Youth Activities Program with an additional \$500 per year for 2 years pledged.
3. \$200 donation to WWU Athletic Dept. during their Community Service Night.
4. \$350 to the Sheriff's Dept. for Operation Santa Claus.
5. \$500 for WWU Scholarships for graduates of Sehome and Bellingham High Schools.
6. \$250 for Voc-Tech scholarship.
7. \$1,000 to Youth Leadership Conference sponsored by the Bellingham School District.

Our major project, however, was the contribution of \$10,000 and the organization of strategic committees in a Bellingham campaign for a community swimming pool. Chairmen Mike Fournier and Craig MacConnell, Chuck Walter and Harte Bressler along with fellow Bellingham Bay Rotarians accomplished an outstanding campaign. Although the bond issue was defeated, Mayor Tim Douglas and the City of Bellingham, in deep appreciation, acknowledged the service and effective contribution of Bellingham Bay Rotary in the 1988 Swimming Pool Campaign.

President-elect Laury Evans and his wife Mary attended the R.I. Convention in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in preparation for his year as president beginning July 1988.

Other members who contributed significantly during the year included John Sleeth – Club Bulletin, Tim Lann – Invocation, Russ VanBuren, Harte Bressler, Bob Newell and Dennis Archer – Sergeants-at-Arms and Roy Huartson – Club Roster.

Membership totalled 85 at June 30, 1989. This included 9 new members taken in during the year. Attendance averaged 81.5% for the year, and 13 members maintained perfect attendance.

A successful Rose Sale, headed up by Bill Fox, increased cash on hand to \$6,954.59 as of June 30, 1989.

The International Student Exchange Program saw Paul Therkelsen return to Australia and the arrival of Fernando Periva from Brazil. The club sponsored Anita Luitweiler, outgoing exchange student to New Zealand.

The Polio-Plus International Campaign concluded, raising \$219 million and exceeded the campaign goal of \$120 million. The club contributed \$3,000 this year, the last installment of our pledge of \$9,000.

Paul Harris Fellowships were awarded to Linda Goodrich (athletic director at WWU), Jack Keith, and Alan Knutson, Byron Elmendorf and Barney Yorkston, Sr.

The Rotary Foundation, with its many ongoing programs, requested additional funds, and with the leadership of Steve Kimberly, combined to raise \$2,050 for the Foundation.

Fred George, the District Governor, visited our club in September and District Governor representative, Bill Dyke also visited several times during the year.

Our Group Study Exchange went to Mexico and Rotary Information Day was held in October. New member orientation was held in January. Three applications to RYLA and the Group Study Exchange from Mexico was here and Secretaries Day in April. District Conference in Harrison Hot Springs, British Columbia, in May.

The club recognized the passing of second-year president, Bob Swank.

Several of our committees made major contributions to our goals and the success of our tenth anniversary year as a club. Chair Jerry Simmons led the Foundation Committee to the best fund raising year in our club's history for the Rotary Foundation. We raised almost \$6,000 with 80 percent of our members contributing and started nine new sustaining members who pledged \$1000 each to the Foundation. Our Community Service Committee led by Dave Harding helped us provide major support for the D.A.R.E. Program by providing D.A.R.E. T-shirts to almost 800 Bellingham students who completed the fifth grade program this year. The Membership Committee led by Dave Ennen developed new procedures for bringing in new members which included and improved understanding by new members of the traditions of Rotary and the expectations of them as Rotary members. In addition, the Membership Committee developed improved procedures for encouraging members to fulfill Rotary attendance requirements, Bob Moles led the World Community Service Committee to find us a quality WCS project and helped the club to commit a decent level of funding to the project—a workshop for the Handicapped Boy Scout Camp in Nigeria, Africa. Jim Olson led the Fund Raising Committee to another successful Rose Sale with excellent support from several top notch committee members and many of our club members who sold lots of beautiful roses.

Our club provided significant financial support to the Children's Museum Northwest "Brainteasers Exhibit," the YMCA Middle School At-Risk Student Program, Project Santa Claus and the downtown Bellingham tree replacement project. We supported the first Eastern European exchange student to come to Bellingham in cooperation with the Bellingham Club — Peter Polak from Czechoslovakia.

Mike Fournier won the jelly bean contest and a trip to Hawaii for his family.

District Governor Mel Hollinger visited in November and encouraged us to pursue our goals. President-elect Brent Walker and his wife Cherie attended the Rotary International Convention in Mexico City. We stabilized our membership at about ninety-five (95) members and had no trouble implementing Governor Mel's theme to have fun while we were getting it done.

4. Conduct 3 new member indoctrination programs during the year.
5. Have better programs than ever before.

All of these goals shared one common objective: to move our members from being relatively passive to being an active group. Each member of Bellingham Bay can look with pride at the progress we have made in achieving these goals. We have a stronger commitment by all members to active participation in the affairs of and activities of our club. Our improved attendance is the best of all 42 clubs in our entire district. We have made significant contributions and commitments to bettering our community.

For example:

- \$1,000 and several hundred pounds of food to the food bank in two separate efforts

- \$2,000 to help Mountain Rescue purchase a new rescue van for use in its lifesaving efforts

This year, Vice Chairmen were utilized in all the committees to try to improve and promote continuity and coordination from one year to the next and I think this has proven to be a good move as it appears that this will provide greater continuity in the future.

Two new committees were added this year: (1) Low cost housing and (2) International projects. Low cost housing was chaired by Bill Geyer and International projects was chaired by Dan Wilkerson. They both accomplished a great deal this year and the Low cost housing project is one of those that will be discussed under our financial commitments for the future.

Another goal for the year was to have greater fellowship. Indeed, we had a wonderful Winter/Spring Classic at Fred Haskell's lake home. Another innovative feature this year was the Inaugural Golf Tournament, organized by Skip Manning and the Fellowship Committee, followed by family barbecue attended by over fifty people which proved to be highly successful. We were very active in the Exchange Student Program in that we had Michi Matsuda from Japan who provided many challenges for her host families to include the Satusheks, Pierces and the Beckers. We were also involved in sending an exchange student, Sonjy Lemmon, to Belgium.

The other significant organizational facets of the club included setting up guidelines for incorporating new members into our club and we did reach our projected number of 100 members. The real success story lies with attendance in that we have hit an all time high for our club of 86%. However, the area that is most encouraging is, after much work by the board and then thorough questionnaire and total membership participation, we have set financial goals for community efforts to include supporting the community swimming pool, the YMCA, the DARE program, transitional housing, Children's Museum, Jr. Achievement and Bosnia Relief. To these efforts we have committed ourselves \$35,000 per year for the next five years which is more than twice what we have contributed in the past and we will be challenged to be able to raise that amount of money for these extremely worthwhile efforts.

The rose sale proved to be our most successful ever, netting approximately \$19,000. Additional fund raising efforts will be completed for the end of the calendar year 1993. In addition, we were able to

supply pictures for the Lighthouse Mission through finances from the club and Skip Manning's efforts. I am pleased to announce that we had five new Paul Harris Fellows from our club to include Kevin Bryant, Curt Smith, Ted Czajkowski, Chuck Olson and Bob Plumb.

With all of these great accomplishments this past year, it is easy to see there was a large contribution made to our club's success by every member of the club and our future looks very bright.

The officers and directors of Bellingham Bay Rotary looked to continue the plans and objectives of the Club that had been developed over the prior two years. These include:

- Maintaining a quality membership base, with a high attendance rate, and providing opportunity for everyone to participate in a variety of club activities.
- Continue the five-year major contribution program which included funds for DARE, the community Pool, Whatcom Family YMCA, and continuing to search for a transitional housing project.
- Establish a variety of fund-raising activities that would provide the Club with the ability to raise \$35,000 annually.

With regard to membership, a survey indicated our members wanted to keep the club size between 90 and 125 members. The emphasis was then placed on identifying quality new members and asking their sponsors to assist in getting them assimilated into the Club. The membership hovered around 100 for the entire year, and overall attendance was slightly in excess of 85%.

The club provided its annual financial support to DARE and the Community Pool. A transitional housing project was identified, but the membership voted against participating. However, the fund-raising activities were not to be reduced.

In order to meet the fun-raising goal, three new areas were identified and implemented. A \$50 per member assessment was started in 1994, and the Club's first "County Store" was held and netted approximately \$3,000. A license was obtained to allow the Club to operate a raffle, which was organized but held after the end of the fiscal year.

Bellingham Bay Rotary served as the last Club for the Foundation Dinner in October 1993, hosted an exchange student from Brazil, and was able to ship medical supplies to Russia with the help of Gerry Simmons and Bellingham Cold Storage.

In Summary, the Club continued along its planned course, with some minor variations. The membership base is very solid, and the Club is successful in providing services for a variety of needs. I greatly appreciate the opportunity to have served as President.

The positive aspects for the year were due in no small way to the efforts of the committee chairs. Harte Bressler and the Membership committee effectively processed and brought in seven new members. The Soundings and Sergeant-at-Arms committees, chaired by Dale Heisinger and Dale Brandland respectively, provided weekly recognition, fellowship, and even entertainment. Jim McCallum made sure that the weekly programs were meaningful and enjoyable. Nels Olds and Matt Barnhart, fresh on the heels of their past year's success, again took on the main responsibility for the club's main fundraiser, Block Party '98. On the international front, the club joined with other area clubs as a participant in the "Children of Russia Projects." Our club's \$2,500 contribution was combined with the Bellingham Club's donation of \$2,500, along with a Foundation matching grant that resulted in a \$20,000 effort to increase new born baby care through the purchase of incubators in concert with our 'sister' club in Nakhodka, Russia.

Thanks to Bob Yost, the club increased its number of Paul Harris Fellows by 18. Using Foundation credits as a matching incentive, sustaining members were able to take advantage of getting a PHF for half the cost. As a result, the club's overall contributions to the Rotary Foundation increased greatly, for which the club received recognition from District 5050,

Block Party '98 was a wonderful event for the community. The headliners were the Doobie Brothers and they put on a great show. Nels Olds and our hired director Steve Woods again facilitated a day-long event with lots of activities for all ages, concluding in the evening with great music. Other bands included Fat James and the ever present Swamp Mama. It was recognized however that the event had become way more than something a few individuals and some hearty volunteers could pull off year after year. The club undertook a process to redefine the event and to bring it back into a more manageable undertaking, with much more direct involvement by more members.

To conclude the year, District 5050 Governor Hardy Staub, on behalf of Rotary International President Glenn Kinross, presented Bellingham Bay Rotary a Presidential Citation. Our membership grew with a net gain of 8 new Bellingham Bay Rotarians. This group included new Rotarians and a number of "veteran" Rotarians who chose our club as their new Rotary home.

We provided support for D.A.R.E., The Boy's and Girl's Club, The Bellingham Festival of Music, The Whatcom Museum, The Bellingham Mavericks, The Sehome H.S. Electric Car Team, The Whatcom Family Y, The Upper Room and Sib Shops. Our total community support was close to \$18,000.

On the international side we supported a prenatal vitamin international project for our sister club in Nakhodka.

We provided over \$6,000 toward the work of the Rotary Foundation. We honored five people as Paul Harris Fellows. We initiated an Educator of the Quarter award. Through matching grants we were also able to participate in international projects involving land mine eradication and relief for victims of Hurricane Mitch in Guatemala.

Community service projects included our annual bell-ringing project; a food drive and running the hot dog stand at the Special Olympics competition in Lynden.

Fellowship events included another fine golf tournament and, with the hospitality of Denise Bosman, a great wine tasting party.

Our major challenge involved our annual Block Party. After two very successful years (1996 and 1997) the financial results of the 1998 event were well below those anticipated for the risk level the club chose to take. Higher entertainment costs, lower than anticipated ticket sales and lower than anticipated sponsorship levels all contributed. Subsequently, we set out to redefine the event.

When the dust of Block Party 99 settled there were many successes. We definitely learned how much effort it takes to produce such an event. Groundwork was laid to organize future Block Parties and we were financially successful in relation to the level of risk involved.

Our weekly meetings were well attended at 75+ %. John Templeton and his program committee brought us an excellent variety of high quality programs. Dean Brett and his Sargent at Arms "bandits" did their usual great and entertaining job.

We undertook two in-club research projects. One was to review the past and present of our club and determine ideas for the future. The second project involved researching the establishment of a club endowment fund. Both of these committees laid groundwork for what is hoped will be valuable additions to our club's legacy.

My major regret was that I was not able to utilize the experience of our past-presidents soon, nor often, enough. We were able to gather this august group in March with the temptation of a free breakfast. This meeting proved to be extremely valuable to all us "non-past presidents" who were in attendance. **HISTORY OF 24th YEAR
BELLINGHAM BAY ROTARY CLUB
JULY 1, 2004 THROUGH JUNE, 2005**

This past year has been one of the best of my life. My connections to Rotary have played a very large part. The Club sent me to PETS and to the Rotary International Convention in Osaka, Japan where I met Rotarians from around the world. I met members of the international Fellowship of Motorcycling Rotarians in Chicago. I went to other Rotary meetings across this country. The grant is now awaiting funding.
- This current year we began work on the second grant for a similar water project in Copan, Honduras starting off with a resoundingly successful fundraiser, and strong interest from several other Rotary Clubs already.
- The process was begun to identify and sponsor an Ambassadorial Scholar, and the first application is eminent.
- The Youth and Vocational Service Committees did outstanding work, giving out a record amount of scholarships, working with high school students in the mock interview process.
- We began recognizing weekly program speakers with certificates acknowledging \$50 contributions made in their names to our own Bellingham Bay Rotary Foundation. Club members stepped up to create the certificate.

During Tim McEvoy's year as club president (2008-09) with a project started by Orphalee Smith, BBRC used our accumulated RF points to award a Paul Harris to all of our members in an effort to become a 100% Paul Harris Club. In Rotary Year 2009-10, then President Tonja Meyers expected to receive this recognition on behalf of the club at the District 5050 Foundation Dinner. We did not. In my year as President I undertook to discover why BBRC had not been awarded the Paul Harris club designation. Researching our club records I discovered that there existed a significant discrepancy between the active member record for BBRC with Rotary International and the BBRC active member record with the Rotary Foundation. Both official member lists did not indeed match our actual membership; particularly the membership list held by the RF. It proved impossible to reconcile the two lists and as such prevented our club from becoming a 100% Paul Harris club. The point became moot as the Paul Harris Club designation was replaced by the RF Board of directors later.

Tresha Dutton, Glen Groenig, Mike Hammes, Terry Brown and Jill Reid. Sgt. At Arms Flo Simon made weekly fines a painless and hilarious exercise. Bill Gorman served our District #5050 as Assistant District Governor.

Special emphasis was placed on development of strong committees and dependence on their work. The Club enjoyed an impressive list of accomplishments as a result. A few of the highlights included:

- Youth Service Chair Tresha Dutton and her committee established guidelines for our Interact Club Faculty Facilitator, sent a young person to RYLA, awarded five scholarships, honored nine Students of the Month from Squalicum H.S. under the leadership of Mike Bates, sponsored a Rotary Student Exchange candidate who will travel to Bolivia next year, and chartered a Rotaract Club under the leadership of Pete Charron, naming Kendall Olson as the Club's first President. Additionally Bill Gorman organized the "Youth Engaged in Service" (Y.E.S.) Program and led a group of young people on a work trip to build a school in Copan, Honduras.
- A Past Presidents Advisory Council" was formed, led by its first Chair Tonja Myers.
- Charitable Giving Grants totaling \$17,500 were awarded to thirteen organizations; Brad Cornwell Chair.
- Under the leadership of Vocational Service Chair Glen Groenig, a "Business Promo Minute" was initiated and offered weekly for a \$20 donation, giving a member the opportunity to inform the membership of their business or profession, raising \$751 designated to support scholarships to Whatcom Community College or Bellingham Technical College.
- Terry Brown's Community Projects Committee's recommendation to reserve this year's funding for a greater impact on a future year's project was accepted, and \$55,000 was set aside for that purpose.
- International Projects Chair Mike Hammes and his large committee identified five projects to pursue which included a clean water project in Trojes, Honduras, an AIDS prevention project in Lesotho, Africa, two school projects in Copan, Honduras and an anti-slavery support project championed by Jim Johnson. \$66,329, which included \$12,900 of club funds, was raised to support those projects.
- A "Short Program" was initiated and included at each Tuesday meeting providing Rotary related information.
- Bellingham Bay Rotary Club Foundation reached a funds level of over \$300,000 and expanded the Foundation's use for funding international projects.
- Successful primary fundraising events included the annual Grape and Gourmet night at the Silver Reef Events Center and Brewers By The Bay at the Depot Market Square. Additionally, the Ciao Thyme dinner for International Projects and our annual Food Bank Holiday Turkey Drive led by Mike Hammes each surpassed all previous year's funds raised.
- Eddie Hansen's Fellowship Committee organized great events including a Bellwether dinner followed by a Mount Baker Theater Beatles Tribute, a Bellingham Bells Baseball Night and the annual Crab Feed held for a second time at Margarita Vartanyan's Estate Winery. Additionally, Sarah Rothenbuhler continued her excellent job of organizing three Rotario Dinners held at the homes of Bryant Engebretson, Andy Clay and Terry Brown.
- Jill Reid became the Club's first "Social Media Manager," establishing and keeping a Club Facebook page current and informing both members and the general public of club programs and activities.



When I was approached back in the early Spring of 2019 to step into the ascension to become the President of Bellingham Bay Rotary Club I was honored and excited to be considered. The President-Elect at the time told me I would have the opportunity to attend Presidents Elect Training (PETS) with the District's other presidents elect to learn more about how Rotary operates in our District and how to operate our Club but the opportunity to get the full meal deal was to attend the RI convention in Taipei, Taiwan in June of 2021. Little did we know what was around the corner in 2020.... COVID!

As with everyone, every aspect of our lives, including our Rotary lives changed. For all of the Rotary year before I became President, I had a great opportunity to learn how to make virtual Rotary meetings work from then President Mike Bates who mastered our meetings like a host of the Hollywood Squares. The PETS experience was different too, it was a few hours weekly on Zoom with other PE's for about 3 months learning a ton about what Rotary was about. There was no trip to Taipei for the RI Convention either so I didn't get the full meal deal about Rotary as the RI Convention was also cancelled.

While this was a different pathway than past BBRC Presidents, I look back on the past twelve months and am proud how our board worked together through this challenging year, shared thoughts and opinions on when and how our club is to get back to "normal" Rotary meetings. The key aspect I knew, everyone was working with the fourth point of the Four Way Test in mind... *Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?* but I had an incredible support from the board and numerous club members as we managed as a Club to make it a great year regardless of what was going on.

- The 2021/22 Rotary year basically kicked off the very last of June 2021, on the hottest day ever in Bellingham, with the dedication of the Docks for Kids at Bloedel Donovan Park. This culminated a total of nearly five years of work by our members in raising the funding and working with the City of Bellingham spearheaded by Dr. Eddie Hansen and Bill Geyer. Mayor Seth Fleetwood along with Chief of Police Flo Simon, and Councilmember Pinky Vargas all joining in the dedication with club members



- In mid- August BBRC embarked on the first Stan Dyer Day of Service. Tony Freeland led a group of courageous Rotarians to dig, cut, pull and eradicate a massive number of wild blackberries at Memorial Park. This endeavor did require as second day of service where we were joined by our Rotaract Club in finalizing the project.



- BBRC and Rotaract members in the early Fall as we began writing cards and notes expressing our gratitude and to thank our PeaceHealth care providers who are on the front lines of the pandemic caring for sick community members.
- October we were able to resume our Student of the Month program where we recognize some of the incredible students who are already setting an example of service above self. I sense all of us love the second Tuesday of the month when we get to meet and hear from the Squalicum HS student identified by the counselors.
- Whatcom County experienced record flooding in November and our Club stepped forward to help. At one meeting we donated the Bucks in the Bay for Flood Relief efforts which generated \$2000 and our BBRC Foundation approved a pledge of \$5,000. Bellingham Rotaract also contributed by hosting a bake sale up at WWU as they raised money for flood relief.
- BBRC member Mike Hammes led our Club in the **Turkey Drive 2021: Rotarians Feeding Their Hungry Neighbors** which generated more than \$32,000 for 2,000 turkeys for distribution by Bellingham Food Bank for those in need for Thanksgiving,
- In late November, BBRC held it's first gathering since the pandemic with a member social at the Bellwether Hotel. We had a good showing of members as it was so great to see one another, some folks not in person since prior to the pandemic. We were all surprised as member Mike Hammes graciously and inconspicuously picked up the tab for the Club's social.
- After 672 days of not meeting as a club we were able to host an in-person meeting on January 11th with a great turnout, mainly because Chief Flo Simon was our program. This was short lived as the COVID rates increased and we returned to Zoom land two weeks later.
- In conjunction with neighboring Rotary Clubs, BBRC provided mentors for the Whatcom CC Bachelors in Business Administration's Organizational Leadership Program. This was an ongoing project working over the winter quarter with students.
- BBRC's Community Grants Committee originally had \$15,000 budget for distribution, however our Club was the beneficiary of two generous gifts, one of \$10,000 from John Bosche and \$1550 from Martin Meade allowing for our Community Grants Committee to provide 19 grants ranging from \$1000-\$2500. These grants made an substantial impact for the local program recipients.
- In February BBRC received District 5050 Award for Community Service Project for our Docks for Kids project. BBRC also earned a Rotary Citation for achieving goals that strengthen our club. Goals include increasing Club membership, developing sustainable service projects, giving to The

Rotary Foundation, and building awareness of Rotary in your community, the credit really goes to past president Mike Bates.

- Following a great presentation from BBRC Rotaract President Reece Carpenter on the Clean Stove's Project, BBRC members working with the BBRF provided \$1,000 in funding for their project.
- March saw COVID infections decline to a level to allow us to resume weekly meetings, and it was so great to get to see one another, shake hands, and share the fellowship we had missed for the nearly past two years.
- Late March saw our club stepping up to help the Ukrainian war humanitarian efforts dedicating \$1240 from Bucks in the Bay.
- In early April we had a great visit from District Governor Bev Harrington and pressed upon us to be patient as we recover from the pandemic and highlighted the Days of Service District 5050 grants.
- The highlight meeting of the year was held and organized by Mark Turner in mid-April as 17 of our small grant recipients attended our meeting and discussed their programs and how our grant assisted them in their endeavors. Amazing to hear the impact these groups make with limited resources.
- District 5050 Days of Service- WeGrow Project is our identified project that all the Whatcom County Clubs along our Rotaract members to be involved in the project. This project will be preparing the WeGrow gardens with installation of a drip irrigation system for their beds, connect shed gutter to rain water catchment, build a new portable shed ,build a washing station and assemble two fruit boxes and build 4 benches. This is a sustainable garden that students from Options HS learn basics of horticulture, team work and how to market their produce, as well as donate fresh produce to the Food Bank.



- BBRC had its first Corporate Membership with the Port of Bellingham becoming our only new member during a challenging year. We also had two former BBRC members, John Sleeth and Dr. Ed Zech who passed on during this Rotary year.

I have to be honest, I was wondering if we were ever going to get back to “normal” Rotary meetings but as we move into the 2022-23 Rotary Year I am more than optimistic BBRC will persevere and continue to make an impact on our community. I have greatly appreciated all the kind words of encouragement and support during this more than challenging year. Thank you for this opportunity to work with such a great group of people.
