4. Introduction of Guest Speaker Shannon MacPhee by Mel Groom.

Shannon MacPhee is a Biologist with Fisheries and Oceans Canada where she has been working on research and monitoring programs in the Canadian Arctic since 2012. Her work included being part of a team to establish the first integrated offshore fisheries sampling program and working as a science advisor to advance Arctic marine conservation initiatives in the Canadian Beaufort Sea. More recently, Shannon has coordinated a research team focused on the health and ecology of Eastern Beaufort Sea beluga whales using methods including harvest-based sampling, use of passive acoustic monitoring, drones and tagging in partnership with Inuvialuit. Through this work she has gained significant experience collaborating with co-management partners and building relationships with Indigenous Knowledge holders in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region. Normally dividing her time between Winnipeg, MB and Inuvik, Northwest Territories, Shannon is currently based in Fonthill while on assignment as a senior advisor to a Regional Director of Science. Shannon will share information and photos on some of the work that she has been a part of in Canada's beautiful Western Arctic.

Guest Speaker Shannon MacPhee

I'm going to share a sampling of my work. Normally I'm in the Beaufort Sea. Our team is based in Winnipeg, Manitoba. It takes 2 days to get there by charter helicopter. We work with locals on their boats, with helicopters. From the mountains to the west to the Yukon border, to the wide belt by the McKenzie River to the wide Delta. It encompasses 6 communities, 6 distinctive communities. They rely on the land for food. Right now that is the geese, the migrating birds! Cariboo are important. There's a lot of diversity with the whales, seals, often from Alaska! Inuvialuit Settlement Region – they maintain their language and participate in the

economy and the society. Belugas are the most important thing to them. 1000's immigrate to the Beaufort Sea and follow Bowheads. They can break through ice. One island is receding at a rate of 3 metres/year!

There's a 20% increase in traffic. The permafrost is melting. You can hear it..

There's a Pan Arctic disturbance of Beluga whale. Of their stock population, some are healthy but at risk. About 450 Belugas left.

We do aerial count of animals and camera imaging to corroborate what we see. We have to correct the river bias with satellite tags. It translates information to satellite receiving station. We can look at their social interaction. The harvesters find whales and tag the,. It's a sensitive subject. We collect blow in Petri dishes and take a blood sample. We're learning the migration route changes, dive information.

Our information is on males – hunters didn't want to approach the females.

There are males making repeated dives and striking the bottom. They are here travelling, here feeding and foraging. We're mapping the prey distribution. We're monitoring Beluga health with Inuvialuit harvesters. We work collaboratively with the harvesters. You are what you eat!

Whales have different languages. They know of places to go. They learn from the mother where to go.

How long are you gone for? June 5-August 5. We're on the ship 4-5 weeks.

The narwhal is in the Baffin Bay area. Orcas, killer whales, kill Narwhals. These Orcas are just coming in.

What is your education? My educational background is a Masters in Biology; I'm a biologist working for my PhD at Guelph and Queens.
