7. Speaker: Kalynne Nguyen – Rotaract Niagara

Introduction: Ann

Our guest speaker today is Kalynne Nguyen, a student at Niagara College who is taking this semester off for a 'Big Adventure' including lots of maple syrup. Kalynne believes in the magic of kindness. She is presently the VO of Rotaract Club of Niagara, a community based Rotaract club as opposed to a post-secondary one, and she was President of of St Catharines Collegiate Interact Club. Ann says she can't wait to turn it over to Kalynne!

Kalynne. Honoured to be here today. An international student in Canada, Kalynne is from a Village (Hue) in central Vietnam. Her father is a fish & shrimp farmer. I want to tell you a small story. There was a tiny frog living in a well. A bird came along and picked him up then dropped him outside. There was so much there! That was Kalynne. Canada is her second home. Coming to Canada, Kalynne looked for opportunities to bring kindness. She joined the St Catharines Collegiate Interact Club. 'I'm so grateful to Rotary – I've been given so many opportunities. When I joined Interact, they were doing a project for community care. I felt it was a duty. We distributed food for the homeless. For community care in Niagara – it was one big international family and I felt at home. It was an opportunity to meet friends and mentors, an opportunity to bring the word to others, a desire to help others. I connected to the community, I connected to me, I connected with people around the globe. Being in Rotary, I was inspired to be a better me. As of last week, I am also a Rotarian. I'm still a Rotaractor. Every day. Everywhere, Rotary is doing something. Service Above Self. I love this motto.' Frank. I'm curious about your life in Vietnam. Kalynne. My family lives in Hue, My dad is a farmer in fish and shrimp, I lived with my grandmother. Ann. A great start to our day – all that energy is wonderful. Dave. We need ideas from people like you how we can work more with Youth. Kalynne. Youth have some problem with commitment. I saw that when I was asking people to join Rotaract. They need to see it as a platform for themselves, to do 'good' in society. Mike. Rotaract went to a low point in Covid. Kalynne brought life back to it and they have a few new members.

Kalynne. I took Business Accounting at Niagara College. I'm going to take a Master's Degree in Business in the future. Real Estate is my dream but you need to be Canadian to get a license and that takes 7 years to get the citizenship first. **Frank.** There are a lot of business people in the club who could be mentors. **Gail.** Welcome Kalynne. **Lisa**. KaLynne. There is no Rotary Club in Vietnam. Maybe I'll start one. **Frank.** Tell us about your experience with SlapShot. **Kalynne**. It was a weekend at Canterbury Hill in Hamilton. We were divided into different houses. Lots of activities, games- physical- and sitting down and sharing ideas- thoughtful. Someone there had messaged Kalynne just yesterday – lovely chat – great connections made.
