**Tanya McCready from Winterdance Dogsled Tours.** Tanya is a wonderful storyteller and hers IS a wonderful story. They visited her three days straight and fell in love. After watching Race Across Alaska, they realised that huskies do better with a friend. They're pack animals. They added another. More mayhem and then another and another to make 4. That's a team. Added a 5<sup>th</sup>! A friend suggested that if they loved the dogs so much, they should figure out a way to make money with the,. Their business plan took them to 30 banks and 30 refusals. A friend sent it up to Huntsville and they were given the loan. Buying their property and arranging for a house and kennel, etc., they found nothing was ready. Attention was paid to the kennel and they ended up spending the first winter in the kennel.

From their move to Haliburton to their growing of a team and teams, to their 2010 trip to Anchorage with 4 kids and their team, to Hank's adventures and Tanya's support (big time) to the major lesson learned:- no matter how much you love your team, if you don't take care of yourself, you aren't taking care of your team, it's a moving story of their love for the cross Alaska race, for their dogs, for their lifestyle. Supported byt their maple syrup business, by cabins in the woods rentals and of course their 'drive your own dogsled' opportunities, they have the means to continue the adventure, fulfilling in so many ways, of dogsledding at its best. WOW!
