President's Report, Correspondence and Announcements. Troy

5. **Guest Presentation: Darren Fry, Walker Industries** introduced by **Lance**. OnE of our New Pillars is the Environment. Darren is a lifelong resident of Niagara who traveled throughout the world and came back to Niagara where Walker Industries hired him. They've done a lot of forward thinking in the environmental aspect of their industry.

Presentation: Darren said he was aware of and thankful for the work Rotary does. He applies Duty of Care to his Employer and to Community, sharing the knowledge. He was brought up in Chippewa and has a longstanding connection to the Welland River. 25 years later, he's spent 20 years with Walker Industries. He has 10 slides and said to feel free to jump in at any time. It started with single cut stone 140 years ago. Today - **REACH – Resilience Environment Accountability Community Humility. This is the 5th generation of ownership and that Humility drove their decision making.**

Aggregates are here in Niagara and also Windsor, Goderich and Collingwood. Emulsions are the yellow green stuff around plywood – it protects it.

Resource Recovery – food waste, grease trap cleaning for example. The vision is that nothing's a waste. We really grew 12, 15 years ago. Vancouver to Halifax. 1200 employees at the time. The 6 environmentalists on staff were now 400! The traditional approach to handling waster was the take, make, use and dispose method. Now, we use the **Circular Eco Model.** Take, make, use and then dispose OR recover and then repurpose and make OR recover and use and dispose OR recover, and back to make! Paper has 6 lives. Aluminum lasts forever!

Organic Processing and Composting. AllTreat. GroBark – green roof designs. Over 70,000 pallets of garden soils and mulches annually are produced the size of a soccer field. 1 million cubic metres of bulk horticultural products!

Grease Trap Services Serve over 11,000 Canadian locations. Collect it, remove oil and water, Bring back and it decants in a week – clean H2O now can be turned into energy and heat.

We work with large grocery chains. **Food waste can be recycled**. Dirty wood – laminate, painted, railway ties all make low carbon alternate fuels. Creosote leftovers applied to railway ties. Creosote can go back into woody waste. It helps reduce coal combustion

There are materials we can't recycle. **Modern landfills** are there for when we can't manage residual waste. It will break down into methane. We can change it into power – landfill gas. We can turn it into electricity. Large engines can power 3-4000 homes. Perforated pipes get connected to larger pipes. Then, drill into ground and gas is sucked into the pipes. We powered a paper mill for 15 years = all its heating needs. **Glendale GM plant** interested and we're now powering it. It's **a renewable energy** source.

From Landfill Gas to Energy. This \$50 Million project takes contaminants out, etc. so pine methane gas (purer than natural gas) will heat 15,000 homes around campus. Moose Creek Energy sends recovered land fill gas up into the Ottawa area.

Today, there are 45 job postings looking for talent – HR and Environmental Engineers.

Troy wondered about designing for the environment. Packaging for instance with toys, etc.

Darren. Now, makers are responsible for designing recyclables.

Paul The system from us to you is not as efficient as it could be. **Darren**. Often there's conversation at the front end. Coming together is important.

BLUE BIN 20% gets recycled. The whole thing gets rejected if ketchup and peanut butter are still in the bottles. Black plastic often doesn't get seen – often rejected.

Recycling works if cost is lower than customer awareness or replacing peat with recycled material. How is Canada doing with waste management compared to the world? **Darren.** Generally speaking, we're not doing great. We're doing the worst. The reason is our culture. Waterways and plastic is problematic. There's so much value in plastic – it's not evil.

Raising awareness is very important. Thank you again for this opportunity.
