Cluster Grant (International) that we are part of this year is an Xray Machine for a hospital in Bolivia where Lezlie Murch was a TE Student way back.

Discussion about Kinsmen's Home Show. Board approved participation IF we get enough volunteers to staff it. It's the first weekend in April, the 6^{th} and 7^{th} . If we don't get enough, we won't do it. We could talk about the Tree Planting. We could have Satoka there with her blazer! We could have a mirror with question over it – 'Do You See Yourself in Rotary?' Etc.

Satoka is here because it's still a school holiday.

There was a District campaign for all Interact and EL Crossley Interact won \$100!

7. Introduction of today's Speaker. Mike Taylor introduced Nancie Taylor, all the way from Sault Saint Marie. Nancy wanted to explore where she'd like to volunteer and found her place with Food4Kids.

Nancie. Food4Kids is for the severely undernourished. There is a growing list of need alongside higher costs. Cathy McCann first talked of Foos4Kids and the little biy waiting outside school an hour before the breakfast program. When asked why he was so early, he replied that he hadn't had anything to eat all weekend. That was its start.

We provide healthy packages, pack it and get volunteers to deliver it to the participating schools. We received a lot of gift cards during Covid. It's available to kids from K to 8.. Two new schools this year; they can come from all over the region- sometime 1 or two students, sometimes 10 students – it varies. We have 500-1000 on our waiting list. There are at present 500 being served every weekend. It costs \$15/week for each child and costs \$600/year for each. The summer program is separate from the school year.

We're holding a **fundraiser this month – a Paddle Party on January 24!** You can buy a ticket for \$15 or by a table. When you get your ticket, you get the number of your paddle. Welland Jackfish tickets, Wine Tours, Raptor tickets – for example.

Volunteers. Some try it to see how they like it, some are regular, some are on call. At our free skate, Nancie could publish a list of what's most needed. People could drop off at the skate. Head Office is at 115 Cushman Road # 27A.

Lance. How is your financial situation? **Nancie.** We're doing well. We have an amazing Executive Director.

Hugh. What's the cause of the wait list of 500-1000? Nancie. It's more that we don't have funds for them. Executive Director approaches a school, talks to the Principal and Vice Principal. The Principal and the Vice Principal talk to teachers and parents. One of our new board members was a teacher. Niagara Falls and Prince Colborne bought into the concept and Welland followed.
