Many a cycle has been done for Polio Eradication over the years and most recently, his trip to France to ride for Wounded Warrior Canada.

Frank. I rode with my nephew in the 'Battlefield Bike Ride' for Wounded Warriors Canada. It supports returning veterans with PTSD. Starting this year they're including Fire/Paramedics now. The photo shows 85 of us in front of 'The Abbey.' It's been 10 years since the beginning – all Canadian and from Victoria to St John. I went with my nephew Craig who was with the RCAF and NORAD and retired at age 43. He's back working with the forces. There's a picture of the 5 landing sites and the 60th Anniversary of D Day picture. I was there with my dad those 10 years ago.

This year we did different beaches each day. We started in Caen which was 2 ½ hours away from Paris. There were flags for Britain, France, Canada and US along the route. We were very appreciative. Bayeux was a huge cemetery. Painted in shop windows were officers and flags. The Radar Museum was on itinerary for us as my nephew had taken care of the computer side of radar. We saw the Pegasus Bridge and the PB

Museum which featured glider planes (carried jeeps, machine guns) between paratroopers and that's how they got in!

Sword Beach has Piper Bill Millin Memorial. The British didn't allow bagpipes! Lots of poppies and flags there! At Juno Beach, it was primarily a Canadian landing. There's a Canadian House which was the first house to be liberated. 340 were lost with 1000 injured. We were there June 11th and June 6th was Liberation Day. The Juno Beach Museum was built entirely by Canadians with a few Rotary Memorials. The German Cemetery was a large one with austere dark granite. 80,000 lost lives. At

this site, 21,000 are buried plus a no name burial hill. Benny Sur Mer is a Canadian Cemetery. The entrance way is very peaceful. In the Caen Museum, there is an entire plane hanging in it! Hill 67 overlooks Caen. The Germans held this hill position. 315 of the 325 were killed (Blackwatch). 20 Canadians were captured on June 6th and were murdered at The Abbey. The lead Major was charged at Nuremburg and served 9 years, then let go.

We went to Omaha Beach. Brettville-Sur Mer Canadian Cemetery – 5000 died there.

British War Memorial – 30 million pounds. There's a list of all Brits killed in France. It's the 72nd anniversary. 1000 figures represent those killed in war. There are plaques in front of each grave.

We cyclists were fed all along the route!

Omaha Beach – the guns of Pointe du Hoc were at Omaha Beach. The American Cemetery there has white crosses – no flowers. For the many operations in Western Europe, there are monuments at Omaha Beach. The Polish Cemetery – many ended up in England. Lots of graves – it was a large part of the battle of Caen. All graves are maintained by the Commonwealth. Roses are in front of each grave.

Many that rode did so with a lot having issues with PTSD. Those riding ranged from ages 32 – 79.

We raised \$450,000.
