- 7. Today's Presentation David Sherlock needs no introduction. Suffice it to say he made this presentation a month ago at the Pelham Historical Society and was warmly received.
 Railways in Pelham! Using photos and stories, David took us through the history of the Pelham Railway. The first image is of the CLOCK that came out of Pelham Station.
 The NST Train came through Fonthill. It's now the Steve Bauer Trail. In 1897, the Michigan Central, TH & B came out of Toronto to Buffalo. It was mostly passengers.

Fenwick and Chantler. You could get on a **sleeping car to NY City with no changing!**There was a little Branch Line that went up to Ridgeville. Also, Chantler – Sumbler –
Canboro Rd – Hipwells. At the Quarry and nurseries, cow manure was off loaded. The grade at the top end was quite heavy. It was hard to maintain that grade. They changed to Ridgeville. There were two pieces of metal of **small gauge** in the 1890's. **There's an early picture of a train going through the Fenwick station!**

Station Chandler – no one has a picture. There IS a drawing.

At the Church St crossing, there's a fruit shed and a loading ramp for stock cars plus a maintenance shed with a little rock garden by it. There were outhouses too! Station stayed operational till 1976!

Ridgeville- Chandler – Fenwick stops in 1930. The track lasted to 1935.

There's a wartime photo – with two additions including a flag so trains would stop. Diesel trains carried express mail and had sleeper cars that went to Boston, Cleveland, Pittsburgh and NY City. St Ann's and Smithville had a commuter type schedule! Hamilton Station then is still there; it ran till the mid 50's. Famous people rode the trains like FDR to High Pointe on the Hudson or north of Manitoulin to fish. Winston Churchill's daughter wanted to see Niagara Falls and there's a photo from the top of Clifton Hill

After Queen Elizabeth's coronation, passenger side of the trains started to drop. On March 1, 1966, the Fenwick Station closed.

WT Robins. Freight went to Smithville. Passengers went from 10-1 and the train would still stop for them to get off or on. Up for sale – purchased by farmer and moved, they still handled freight. Teams of horses would bring it from Toronto to Buffalo and then it was transferred to the NY train.

Fenwick was included in the reservation system. **April 5, 1981 was the last trip. They** added a car because lots of folk wanted to take the last run.

There was the Fonthill, St Catharines and Toronto Railway. There was a 1907 track built from Fonthill to Port Colborne. On a 1911 map, there was a proposed Fonthill -St Catharines – Toronto route parallelling Hwy 20. The CN Track was dug for 1920. Rice Road crossing Hurricane and Station Street towards Welland.

There's a photo of the trestle looking NW across the street to the Cannery in 1958. Looking south, the town bought STN – Public Works. One is the former station. Photo of the interior of a typical streetcar. **One of the electric freight models ran till 1961.** There was shelter at the Emmett Street crossing. There was a 6 am0midnight schedule till 1959.
