Her presentation concentrated on how Rotary International's Action Plan applies to the District, Clubs and Rotarians as "People of Action". There were four main areas:



Food4Kids Food Drive Raises Over \$6700!

The Rotary Club of St. Catharines Lakeshore recently held a Food Drive on Friday October 22 to assist the Food4Kids Niagara Program. Club members staffed collection bins at two No Frills stores in St. Catharines from 1 to 5 p.m. After sorting and counting at Food4Kids, the Community responded by donating almost \$5700 in requested food items and an additional \$1050 in monetary donations. St. Catharines Lakeshore would also like to make a special shout-out to St. Catharines South for their \$1600 value Food donation to the Drive!

Food4Kids provides packages of healthy food for children up to 14 years with limited or no access to food each weekend. The food packages are assembled by volunteers and delivered to schools each Friday to ensure children have nourishment over the weekend. <u>There are over 1500 children in Niagara</u> <u>struggling through each weekend without enough food.</u> Rotarians passed out lists of most needed items to create these packages to customers as they entered each of the two No Frills stores located at 581 Lake Street and at 525 Welland Avenue on Friday.

It's hard to believe children in our very own community go hungry, but it's a reality faced by children each and every day. It's not that parents do not want to feed their kids....they can't. The worsening economy, job loss, working poor, illness, mental health, marriage breakdown and those fleeing their home country to seek safe refuge in Canada, are some of the reasons a parent will turn to Food4Kids for support. Food4Kids is funded through donations or one-time grants. While hunger exists around the world, it is their hope to address hunger in our home community.

World and Community Spotlight Club Helps Fund Cystinosis Research



Cystinosis is a rare, genetic disease that affects 1 in 100,000-200,000 live births in the United States (and Canada). It is a disease

that hits particularly close to home with our Club as Bob Miller's granddaughter suffers from Cystinosis.

Cystinosis is a lysosome storage disorder caused by a mutation in the CTNS gene on the 17th chromosome, which encodes a protein called "cystinosin." This protein's function is to transport an amino acid called cystine out of an intracellular compartment called the lysosome. If the cystinosin protein is absent or dysfunctional, cystine accumulates within the lysosome and forms crystals, which kills the cells. Cystinosis slowly destroys the organs of the body including the kidneys, eyes, thyroid, muscles, liver, pancreas, gonads and brain.

It is an autosomal recessive disease, which means both parents are carriers of a cystinosis mutation. Parents do not exhibit any symptoms of cystinosis. In such couples, the odds that each of their children will have cystinosis are 1 in 4. Cystinosis is considered an "orphan" disease because it affects fewer than 200,000 people. With such a rare disease affecting such a small population, money for cystinosis research is scarce. And yet research on complex diseases like cystinosis often leads to advancements in other rare diseases. Research on cystinosis has already led to advancements in Friedrich's ataxia, Danon disease and Dent's disease.



The Cystinosis Research Foundation is dedicated to finding better treatments to improve the quality of life for those with cystinosis and to ultimately find a cure for this devastating disease.

CRF is committed to finding a cure through an aggressively funded research

agenda. CRF issues research grants bi-annually to accelerate the research process and to ensure that there is never a gap in funding new cutting-edge research ideas. We are focused and determined to improve the quality of life for our patients and to find better treatments, including a cure, for our adults and children living with cystinosis.

THIE CONVERY CHALLENGES DISTRICT CLUBS TO MATCH \$60,000 U.S. FOR POLIO

As announced at the District 7090 Conference, Thie Convery will match funds raised by the District for the Polio Plus campaign (up to a total of \$60000 US) by December 15 2021.

Thie, an Honorary Member of the Rotary Club of Dundas Sunrise, has been one of our District biggest supporters to keep our minds on our number one Rotary International priority - to Eradicate Polio. We are excited that only two countries and two cases this year have been reported and the Taliban is working with the Polio Team to immunize their children in Afghanistan. But we are not done yet.

We need 35 clubs to donate \$1725 to achieve our \$60,000 goal. However, donations can be by individuals or clubs. With matching, \$60,000 from the District, Thie and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation becomes \$360,000 for Polio Plus!
