# Rotary Club of Jamestown Community Service Fund

## **Annual Report 2023**

#### **Summary**

The RCJCSF board of directors scheduled meetings for 2023-24 are on the following Tuesdays: July, 11, 2023, October 24, 2023; January 16, 2024; and April 16,2024. Traditionally, the RCJCSF meets, at a minimum, to approve a budget and vote on projects approved by the Rotary Club of Jamestown's Vision Committee.

The 2023-24 budget addressed (1) how much RCJCSF wants to keep in reserves? (2) a standard allocation method for the Vision Committee's budget and (3) how much RCJCSF should invest to take advantage of higher interest rates on Certificates of Deposit. On July 11, the board voted to approve the transfer of \$20,000 from the RCJCSF savings account into a 24-month CD at Southern Chautauqua Federal Credit Union (SCFCU) with the caveat that no penalty would be charged for early withdrawal.

On July 24, the RCJCSF board met and approved its 2023-24 budget. FINAL RCJCSF BUDGET 2023\_24.

7.24.23 The board's approval of the budget included the following actions:

- Reserving \$20,000 for any large, unexpected community project the Club may want to help fund
- Annually allocating the balance of reserved funds in the checking account to new projects for the Vision Committee budget. The Vision Committee budget shall include funding:
  - New local and international projects
  - Inbound/Outbound youth exchange

- O RYLA and RYLA, Jr. scholarships
- O Revenue from the annual payout for the Johnson Endowment Fund held at CRCF
- Investing \$20,000 in a 24-month CD at 5% interest at the SCFCU

On October 24, 2023, the Board approved a Conflict of Interest policy Rotary Club of Jamestown Community Service Fund Conflict-of-Interest Policy (1) in compliance with the Consolidated Laws of New York CHAPTER 35 Not-for-Profit Corporation ARTICLE 7 Directors and Officers Section 715-B. The board also discussed a proposed revision to the RCJCSF Mission Statement. A new mission statement is expected to be voted on at the January 3, 2024 board of directors meeting.

Following is a bulleted summary of our accomplishments:

#### Mary Grow family donation of books

July -Steve Sandberg (along with his wife Pat) sorted, boxed, and delivered approximately 1000 donated books into storage at Allied Alarm for distribution through our Laundromat Libraries. Mike Roberts generously donates storage space for surplus donated books.

#### Partnership with DEI Committee

July – along with members of the DEI Committee, attended Chautauqua Day at Chautauqua Institution to hear a lecture by Linda Villarosa, author of Under the Skin: The Hidden Toll of Racism on American Lives and on the Health of Our Nation.

### JPS Summer LEAP (Learning Enrichment and Academic Progress) Program Way (August 12 voluntoers provided 24 hours reading books to students at Love

July/August - 12 volunteers provided 24 hours reading books to students at Love Elementary School.

## Implementation of our Early Literacy Initiative, Read to Me, Book and Bib Project Project Goal - to support and promote the importance of early literacy. Reading to babies

builds language, literacy, and social-emotional skills that last a lifetime. August

Delivery of a two year supply of a bilingual book (Goodnight Moon) and baby bib inscribed "Read to Me" along with the Rotary logo received and placed in the Rotary Office at Allied Alarm.

September - Rotary Literacy Month

Successful implementation of the Book and Bib Project at UPMC Chautauqua Maternity.

October – Notified of a grant opportunity through NorthWest Bank. A grant request was submitted for the purchase of a gift incentive when a library Card application is turned in to the Prendergast Library. A response to the grant request has not be received.

Since implementation 608 Book and Bib Gift Bags have been assembled and 162 gift bags delivered to UPMC Chautauqua.

#### Laundromat Libraries - providing free books to the community

Utilizing attractive book shelves (designed, built, and installed by David Troxell), we continue to meet a genuine need providing free books to community members. Each book includes a Rotary bookplate.

July through December - 676 books (300 adult/376 child); averaging 113 books/month

#### Youth Services Report YTD 2023

The Clubs Youth Services committee had a busy "rebuilding" year in 2023. We had a great year with Joah Molhom from Denmark. He was an exemplary inbound and many of the club members spent time with him. He will be returning to Jamestown with his family in the summer. Thanks to his host families, the Cama's, the Anderson's and the Kidder's.

Unfortunately the club did not sponsor an outbound student of our own this year, as there was no interest during recruitment last fall. Luckily the Brantford, Canada club had an "extra" applicant last year, which allowed us to host an inbound here in Jamestown! Esme Germann Hind and her Club's YEO Aad Vermeyden joined us via Zoom last spring to say hello and thanks! Esme is currently studying in Denmark - hopefully she has had a chance to reconnect with Joah!
