



THE DRUM: LIVING TRADITIO

(3-DAY WORKSHOP AUGUST 31 - SEPTEMBER 2)



This unique, three-day experience gives you the chance to take part in the living traditions of Aboriginal drum making, drumming and song. Renowned Cree Ojibwa Metis drummer, singer, storyteller, artist and educator Chantal Chagnon will lead you through the process of creating your own drum. You will also come to understand the importance of drumming and song within Aboriginal culture. It is always Chantal's aim to create bridges between cultures and people and to facilitate journeys of self discovery as well. It is in that spirit that we offer you this opportunity.

Friday, August 31, 6 p.m. - 9:30 p.m. We will begin with a blessing ceremony and smudge. This first evening will also include an introduction to traditional teachings followed by cutting of the hides in preparation for the making of the drum.

Saturday, September 1, 11 a.m. - 5 p.m. After the opening prayer, blessing and smudge, the second day features stories, legends and history of the drum. Then, you'll string and make your own drum.

Sunday, September 2, 11 a.m. - 5 p.m. We open this final day with an opening ceremony and create our drumsticks. We will then smudge and beat the drums which will be followed by a traditional feast. The rest of the day will be devoted to drumming and singing. You'll take part in a group drum circle. Finally, we'll move to Heritage Park's First Nations' Encampment for a public session of singing and drumming. All Park visitors will be welcome to join.

All materials are included: rawhide [deer, moose, elk or buffalo for the drum face], precut rawhide lacing, yellow cedar drum rounds [8", 10", 12", 14"], natural branches for drumsticks, deer leather/ suede for the drumstick heads, wool stuffing and sinew for stitching.

Light refreshment will be provided on August 31 and September 1, with a traditional feast on September 2. Please see website for details.

Natural Resource Area Restoration and Development Project

eritage Park Historical Village is undertaking a new restoration and development project this summer. Construction is officially underway on the redevelopment of the Park's Natural Resource Area.

The Natural Resource Area will be dedicated to sharing Alberta's energy story – past, present and future, and will be completed in two phases. Phase I involves the restoration of numerous exhibits and creation of immersive and engaging programs and experiences. Plans include restoring the #1 Dingman Discovery well and oil storage tank, restoring and reopening the coal mine as an immersive, hands-on exhibit and the restoration of the Park's original 1885 Miner's Cabin and water wheel. During the research phase of this work, staff discovered Heritage Park's Trapper's Cabin was actually a Park Warden's cabin, therefore it will be restored to reflect this recent discovery. Restoration plans also include reestablishing one kilometre of nature trail along the perimeter of the Glenmore Reservoir. Guests will be able experience the life of a coal miner, watch the water wheel in action, and gain a deeper understanding of the history and inner workings of an oil well. This phase of the restoration is set to be complete during the summer of 2019. Phase II involves the creation of a brand new, 4500 square foot Natural Resource Interpretive Centre. This state-of-the-art building will demonstrate new green technologies that are being integrated today, and will provide visitors with a glimpse into future advancements in the energy industry through the use of virtual and augmented reality. Phase II has a targeted completion date of 2020.

The fundraising goal for this project is \$10 million. Heritage Park is a charity that relies on the support of its stakeholders and donors. The Park is grateful to Mr. Bob Brawn and the Brawn Family Foundation for their lead gift to support this project.

"I am honoured to partner with Heritage Park to make this important and timely project happen," says Bob Brawn. "If you don't learn history you're bound to repeat it – the bad parts, not the good."

"As a living history museum tasked with the education, preservation and presentation of the facts, it is important that we tell a balanced story of Alberta's energy sector," says Heritage Park's President and CEO, Alida Visbach. "Does our next generation understand how their actions today will impact their lives tomorrow? Our role is to present the facts, based on science and history and allow people to draw their own conclusions."

CONNECTING TO THE COMMUNITY THROUGH VOLUNTEERISM

want to become more involved with the community, and Heritage Park has welcomed the help of these enthusiastic volunteers at some of our major events.

"Many of these youth feel isolated within their community," explains Catherine Nguyen, YMAP Program Coordinator. "They are interested in learning more about Canadian culture and giving back to the community. They are so appreciative for the support to do things they might not do by themselves."

Volunteering, philanthropy, and commitment are not a given with these students. Laura Haugseth is a team leader who works with the youth on a weekly basis, then accompanies them to volunteer projects, like Day Out With Thomas at Heritage Park. "We focus on topics like how to use transit, teamwork, job applications, English, and financial issues," she says, "and then students volunteer once a month."

A YMAP team volunteered at Heritage Park for the first time during Once Upon A Christmas 2017, where some of the youth experienced



Canadian Christmas traditions – and snow – for the first time. At Day Out With Thomas, the youth enjoyed a busy day helping with children's crafts and temporary tattoos. "I've met a lot of different people that I normally wouldn't talk to," says Saad, a Grade 12 student originally from Pakistan. "I visited Heritage Park once before with my family," he says, "but wanted the experience to return as a volunteer." Saad graduated from the YMAP program this spring and is grateful for the variety of skills he learned.



Kanchan and Kushum are sisters from Nepal who had great fun tattooing young Thomas fans in May. "We enjoy learning about Canadian culture and applying what we've learned," says Kanchan, while Kushum adds that it's interesting learning where other kids in the program are from. "But our biggest challenge," says Kanchan, "is getting to Heritage Park." It took these youth 90 minutes on two trains and two buses to get to the Park!

It may take a little while for newcomers to understand the value Canadians place on volunteering, but they soon develop dedication and enthusiasm that brings great energy to our events. Thank you YMAP!

Crates of sweet red peppers, hundreds of juicy watermelons, endless flats of strawberries and potatoes as far as the eye can see... there's a reason why so many people mark their calendar's each September and head to Heritage Park bright and early with wagons, dollies, bins, bags and anything else they can get their hands on and their produce in! The Calgary Produce Marketing Association Harvest Sale has been running for over 35 years now and anyone who's attended in the past knows that this sale is a must see and do! Shoppers are guaranteed to find great deals, a huge selection of produce to choose from and have a lot of fun! The Harvest Sale is perfect for the home canner, salsa maker, or anyone looking to fill up their fridge with a wide array of fresh fruits and vegetables. Plus, they can feel good while they're doing it.

In the beginning, the Harvest sale was a charitable event where local farmers in Southern Alberta sold a portion of their crops, and donated the proceeds to charity. The first sale was run by 7 or 8 people and had a few tables of produce. Today, it takes a small army of volunteers over 500 hours of planning and 1500 hours of execution to pull off this two-day charity sale. It's a heartwarming sight to watch an average of 12 to 14 semi-trailers unload their produce, which has been donated for the event from all over the globe. This year's sale proceeds will be allocated to the following charities and causes:

Alberta Children's Hospital Foundation

The hospital is an amazing facility that performs miracles every day to keep children healthy. The CalPMA recently surpassed the \$1,000,000 lifetime contribution point, and have now joined the Alberta Children's Hospital Foundation "Thanks a Million" club.

Calgary Community Kitchens

The community kitchens program is a one-of-a-kind organization that focuses on providing nourishment to families, and specifically children in Calgary. They have a number of youth programs to educate and get children excited about consuming fresh produce. They operate CalPMA education programs in schools across the city and feed underprivileged children fresh produce daily.

Calgary PMA Community and Educational Programs

Calgary PMA staff and volunteers are out in the community and in the schools year round to support the message of increasing consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables.

Heritage Park Historical Village

Heritage Park is a registered charity with a mandate of connecting visitors to the settlement of Western Canada. Nearly 65,000 school children learn invaluable lessons about our history every year through immersive and unforgettable education programs.

The Calgary Produce Marketing Association is non-profit group of industry professionals comprised of membered companies from across Canada and the United States, who do business in the Prairie Provinces. The association is run by a volunteer board of directors. First established in 1974 as the Calgary Fruit Wholesalers, the board was brought together to help promote the increased consumption of fresh produce. In 1991 the group became incorporated and changed its name to the Calgary Produce Marketing Association. Their membership continues to grow with a variety of produce industry related companies including: growers, distributors, wholesalers, retailers, food service, transportation, warehousing, packaging and supply companies.

The Cal PMA's mission is to inspire the community to have fresh fruits and vegetables on their plates with every meal by enhancing the marketing of produce and produce related items, and acting as responsible advocates in the community.

STEPPING STONES

Create your own beautiful stepping stone for your yard or garden! You'll need Mom or Dad's help with this one.

Step by Step:



① You can use a store bought form, old baking dish or plastic bucket for this project.



② Plan your design ahead of time. Use pretty rocks, glass beads, or even recycled jewelry or other elements from your home. Organize them before you mix your binder.



③ Line the form with wax paper and use a non-stick spray. For the body of the stepping stone, use either white outdoor cement, some concrete and gravel, or some mortar. Fill the form with the cement [or whatever you are using]. You will have a short window of time to transfer your pattern into the top of the cement.



- ④ Press down the rocks or beads so they will not fall off once the cement sets. Let it sit overnight before removing it from the form.
- (5) You will need to wait 48 hours before placing it outside so the cement can cure properly.
