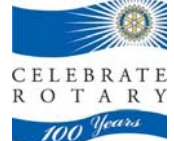

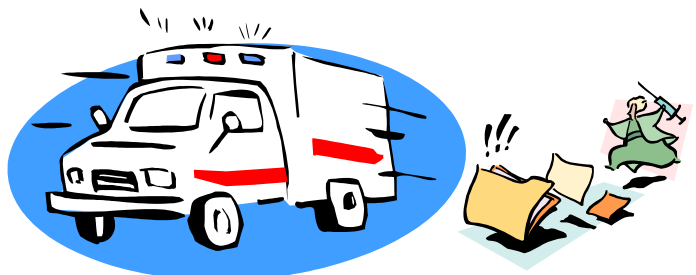
CAPSULE OF LIFE

Ray Gosselin introduced guest speaker John Hein who spoke to us regarding the EMS service for Calgary and surrounding communities.



John pointed out the EMS services over 600 square miles and over one million people. They have 44 ambulance units and have a 10 minute response time 90% of the time. The EMS utilizes the firefighters who have the basic training for life support and as such can assist in emergencies until EMS arrives. The response time for the firefighters is 4 minutes. John pointed out that one of the concerns is the waiting time at the hospitals. Half the time spent is waiting

at hospitals. Having said this, John does point out that we do have a "Cadillac" service in Calgary and surrounding area.

It is a program where people put medical information in a vial and store it in the refrigerator. It is used by people who cannot provide their own medical information and is used by senior citizens, chronically ill people and those who live alone. It is stored in the fridge because this is where EMS looks should they come to your residence in an emergency. In addition to medical information, the vial should contain any personal directive the person may want.

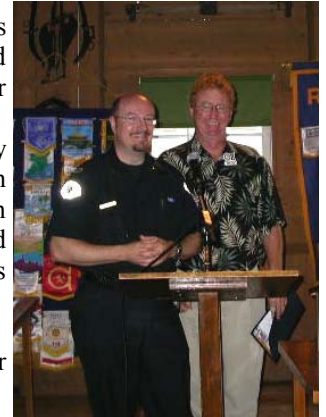
The program is funded by donations through the EMS

The sunshine report was presented by Doug Hood.

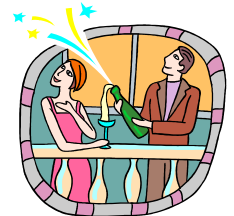

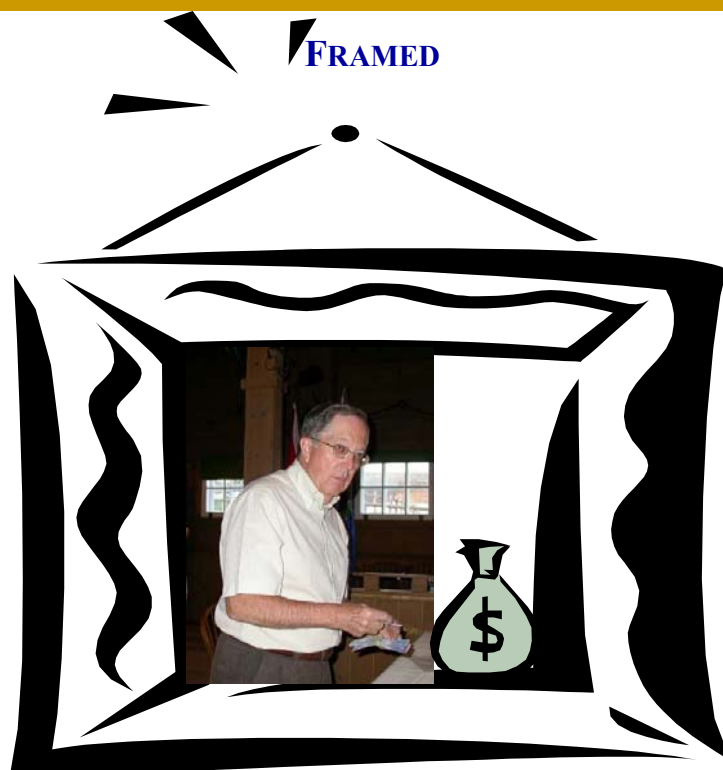

Operation Eyesight - Address by Nag Rao

Dr. Nag Rao is the President-elect of the highest international body concerned with vision health - the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness. As such, he is one of the world's foremost authorities on global blindness. Dr. Rao left a successful medical practice in Rochester, New York to realize a personal vision - that all people would have access to high-quality eye care, regardless of the ability to pay. He returned to India to establish a world-class eye treatment, research and training facility that covers the whole range of services from eye surgery to blindness rehabilitation. The L.V. Prasad Eye Institute, centred in Hyderabad, India, is one of only ten World Health Organization Collaborating Centres for the Prevention of Blindness. The Institute has pioneered and tested a model for self-sustaining vision centres in the developing world, offering high-quality, comprehensive eye care with long-term results. This sustainability model offers hope to areas severely threatened by blindness
