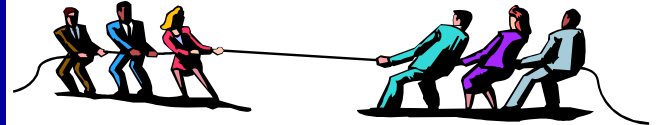
Al Black is organizing our annual ditch cleaning. Lots of fun and a nice mornings walk in the country.

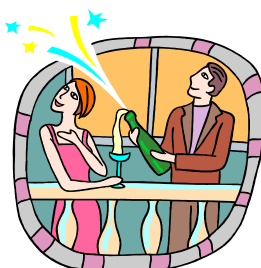

Everyone is welcome even if you have not read the book! Don't forget your toonie for Literacy in Africa.

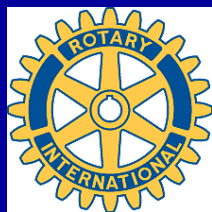

- #3 notify Peter if you have sold a table so we can get your name recorded on it. It is your Wine Festival, enjoy it and thanks for all your support.

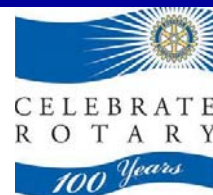

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Launched in 1947 it has snowballed into the world's largest privately funded international scholarship program.

OBJECTIVE:

- Send Ambassadors of goodwill to improve international understanding within the context of the high ideals that Rotary embodies.
- To impart skills and educate scholars.
-

TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS:

- One year academic scholarship US\$ 25,000.
- Two year multi-year scholarship US\$25,000 (over 2 yrs)
- 3 month cultural scholarship US\$12,000
- 6 month cultural scholarship US\$19,000
- 3-5 month grant for university teachers US\$ 12,500
- 6-10 month grant for university teachers US\$22,500

Japan scholarships started as a pilot program to bring students to Japan, extended to 2004-2005 and paid for by the Japanese share funds.

ELIGIBILITY:

- Candidates should be citizens of a country in which there is a Rotary Club.
- Should have completed at least 2 yrs of post secondary education
- Should be of high academic standing
- Should exhibit leadership qualities.

Rotaractors are eligible and are encouraged to apply.

Scholars may site their preferences but all candidates are matched to a particular institution by the board of Trustees of TRF.

The money advanced periodically, is proportional to the economics of the institution and the city. They receive up to a maximum of US\$25,000. If the entire amount is not spent, TRF returns the money to the district.

DUTIES:

During their stay abroad, the scholars are expected to speak at least 15 Rotary Club meetings about their hometown, its people and their culture.

Similarly, on return to their hometown, they are expected to speak to clubs about the country they lived in.

Our district sets aside US\$25,000 to pay for one scholar every year. All eligible applicants should submit their application to the district committee through a sponsor club by October 1. The selection is made by March/April for the term starting the following September.
