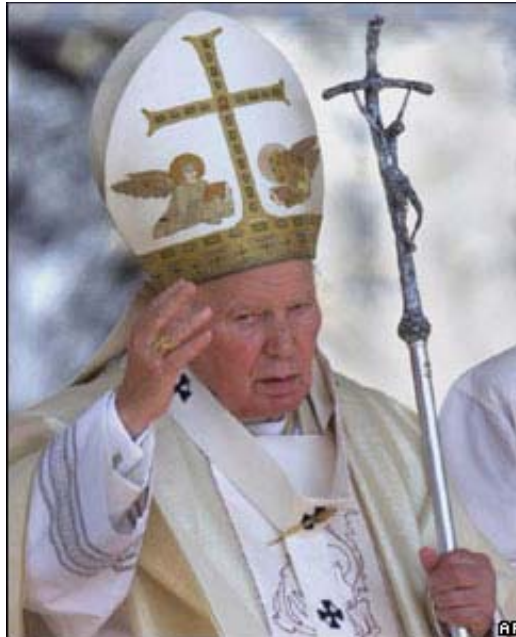

BETHANY CARE SOCIETY

This week speaker, Laurie Wallis, was introduced by Peter H. Laurie is a fund-raiser with the Bethany Care Foundation, a not-for-profit provider of health, housing and community support services for seniors and persons with disabilities.

The Bethany Care Society's roots go back to 1945 when members of the Danish Evangelical Church in Calgary saw a need to provide a caring home for seniors who could no longer care for themselves. Today, the organization has grown to offer long-term care, residential care, assisted living, home care, support systems, and rental housing options.

The programs offered are equally diverse. The Continuing Care program offers 24-hour professional support to provide nursing and personal care, pastoral care, therapies, social work, food services, housekeeping and linen services. Through its Community Living program, Bethany offers self-contained suites for seniors looking for a maintenance-free independent lifestyle in established communities.

Bethany also provides a range of services for seniors who live in the community through its Community Services program. These services include the Adult Day Support Program, offer-

ing recreational, social, leisure and personal care opportunities; Bethany Lifeline, providing around-the-clock support services over the telephone; Bethany on Route, providing fee based services such as housecleaning, meal planning and preparation, and companion care; and the Parish Nurse program which provides faith-based consultation.

Bethany receives its funding through a variety of sources with 60% of its funding is provided by the provincial government and regional health authorities, 30% provided by client charges, and 10% provided by other income sources. The Bethany Care Foundation was established in 2004 to ensure stable, long-term support of Bethany through fund-raising efforts. It also manages the endowed funds and other reserve funds held in trust by the Society.

Over the past year, the Foundation has spearheaded a number of initiatives that have raised funds to cover the replacement cost of equipment and furnishings not covered by government funding. These efforts will continue into the future as some of its Calgary facilities are aging and in need of capital re-investment.

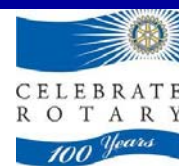
