Foundation leadership changes

Trustee Chair Bhichai Rattakul has announced that he will resign as chair of The Rotary Foundation Trustees on 1 August but will continue to serve as a trustee this year. "I made this difficult decision to resign as chairman because of issues related to my health and that of my wife," he said. "I deeply regret any inconvenience this unanticipated change will cause." All of the chairman's speaking engagements after 1 August have been canceled.

In keeping with the Foundation Bylaws, Trustee Vice Chair Robert S. Scott, of the Rotary Club of Cobourg, Ontario, Canada, will be trustee chair from 1 August through 30 June 2008. A past RI vice president and director, Scott has served RI and the Foundation in many capacities over the years, most recently on the International PolioPlus Committee, which he will continue to chair. He also succeeded Herbert A. Pigman as volunteer director of the highly successful 2002-05 polio eradication fundraising campaign.

In assuming the new leadership role, Scott plans to continue the focus on the 2007-08 Foundation goals to eradicate polio, support the Every Rotarian, Every Year initiative, show that peace is possible through support of the Rotary Centers for International Studies, and reconnect with Foundation alumni. "I worked closely with Chairman Bhichai when he developed these goals, and I strongly support all of them," Scott said.

Spread the word about Rotary with a PR grant

Help spread the word about Rotary's good works in your area. The RI Board of Directors has approved the continuation of the PR grants pilot project at the district level for the 2007-08 Rotary year.

The grants are designed to assist districts in reaching the general public by promoting Rotary and improving its public image. They'll help districts place RI-produced television and radio public service announcements, billboards, banners, and newspaper supplements throughout communities in the district. Districts are strongly encouraged to use Rotary's Humanity in Motion materials to help convey a consistent message.

Only one application per district will be considered. Though grants will be awarded at the district level, district governors are encouraged to work with interested clubs and the district's public relations committee to create a PR grants project plan. Rotary club members who have professional media or public relations experience could also help governors draft a proposal that represents the best PR plan for the district.

For 2007-08, grants of up to US\$6,000 per district will be available. This parameter will ensure fairness and an equitable spread of Rotary promotion around the globe. Districts must contribute at least one-third of the total PR grant amount requested and provide a detailed description or visual representation of any proposed artwork with their applications. District governors must submit PR grant applications to RI headquarters by 1 October.
