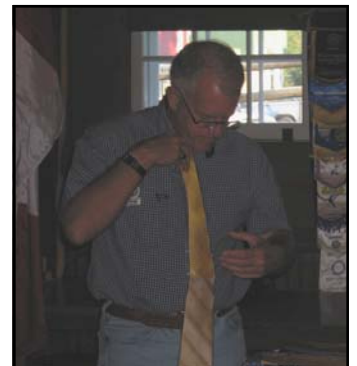

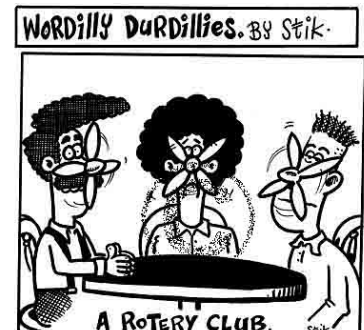

Dear fellow Rotarians,

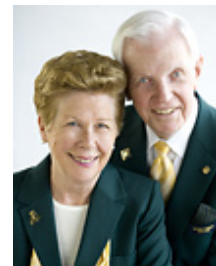
Yes, I will turn that idea into a project, and I will lead the project to completion.
