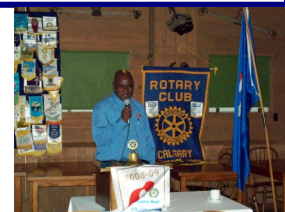

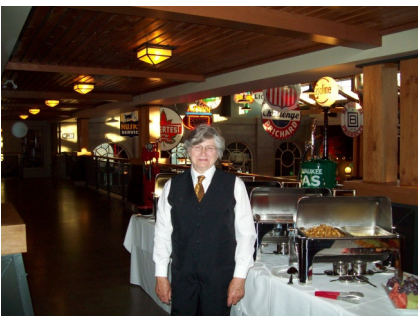

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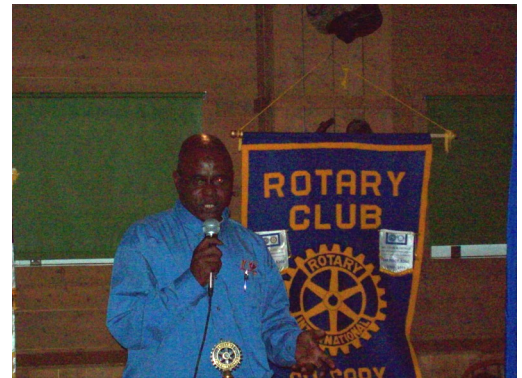
Walter thanked Rambo.

Any who won the 649 - \$1 million.



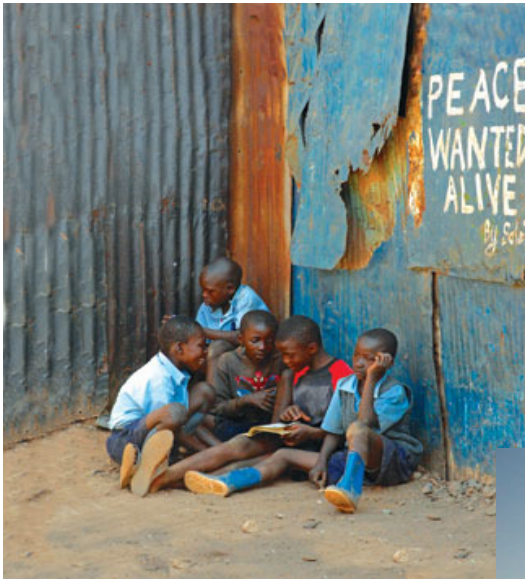
50/50 JACK POT

Rotary Photos from around the world



First place. Steve Baroch, Rotary Club of Castle Rock High Noon, Colorado, USA. "The writing on the wall has everything to do with what makes this photo. And each of the kids has a different emotion going on. A lot of the kids in this school are orphans, and some came from an orphanage that was burned to the ground in the post-election violence in 2008. Our club is supporting the school with books through a nonprofit called Transafrika Cultural Institutes." Giboux: "I like the composition, the way the children are in it. 'Peace wanted alive' is very dramatic, yet the picture is very peaceful."

Honorable mention. Nick Phillips, Rotary Club of Eshowe, South Africa. "When brush fires devastated the Mhlathuzana community in August, more than 50 families lost their homes. Many people had only the clothes they were wearing. The Zulufadder NGO [nongovernmental organization] and clubs in District 9270 responded with food, blankets, clothing, and money. Resigned but not defeated, these women were making their way over the scorched earth toward their burnt-out homes. Today, all the houses that were burnt have been rebuilt, and it is impossible to see where the fires occurred." Giboux: "The shoe is telling. When I see this, I want to know more."
