Specifically, the function is to handle the physical preparations for, and the mechanical part of, a meeting and, unobtrusively, to guide its general conduct. As Sergeant-at-Arms, you play an important role in the overall success of each weekly meeting. Because of the duties you perform; the club president is free to concentrate on conducting the meeting. Also, what you do determines the ease with which the operational aspects are carried out. Frequently, you can give some special assistance that helps to make guests feel "more at home." But more important is the manner in which you carry out your duties. It can directly influence your clubs attendance record. And one cardinal rule is to always arrive 15-20 minutes ahead of time
