Guest Speaker: Peter Harding—Rotary Foundation

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

Peter has done a great job of representing the Rotary Foundation and today we hear a little more. Much of what we hear is the Permanent fund, noteworthy as it doesn't pay out from capital, only from proceeds. Much of our general relationship is with the share program and polio plus programs, which have very specific mandates.

The distributed funds come back to the club level; 50% goes to district designated funds, 50% of that for local projects. With Global grants there is a project 30k minimum. This will get matched at least 15k up to \$200. Priorities are: peace and conflict resolution, child health, education, economic development.

Our club has a guideline; Every member every year- 100\$ per member. This would equal \$7,500, and we met \$10,000 last year. (Comfortably better than average).

Recognition of support for the foundation is the Paul Harris Fellow, self or designate for donations equal to \$1,000USD. There are multiple programs around this and I really recommend that you should have a personal chat with Peter about unique ways to participate. There are also higher levels of participation such as major donor, and the Arch Klumph society.

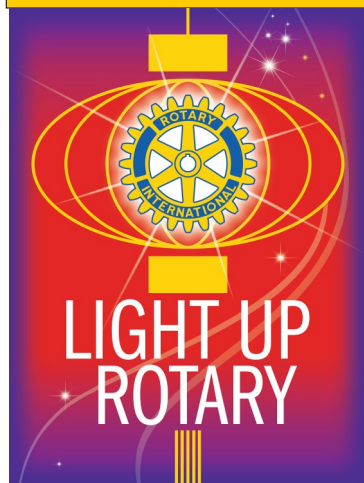
Rest In Peace. By designating 1 k you can become a benefactor, or bequeath as a society member for 10 k.

Rotary International District Grants

District grants fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs in your community and communities abroad. Each district chooses which activities it will fund with these grants.

What they support

You can use district grants to fund a variety of district and club [projects and activities](#), including:

- Humanitarian projects, including service travel and disaster recovery efforts
- Scholarships for any level, length of time, location, or area of study

Vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about a particular field or to learn more about their own

How to use them

You have a lot of freedom to customize your service projects. There aren't many restrictions, as long as your district grant supports the mission of The Rotary Foundation. Districts must be [qualified](#) before they can administer district grants.

How they're funded

Districts may use up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund to receive one district grant annually. This percentage is calculated based on the amount of DDF generated from a district's Annual Fund giving three years prior, including Endowment Fund earnings. You aren't required to request the full amount available.

You'll receive this funding as a lump sum and then distribute it to your clubs.

How clubs request funds

Clubs work directly with their district to get funding. Your district governor or Rotary Foundation chair should be able to tell you when to submit a request and whether you'll need to meet additional district requirements, such as reporting or training.
